Requested Action:

It is requested that the Board of County Commissioners review the applications for the North Brevard Hospital District Board, Seats 8 and 4, and approve the appointments. The appointment for Seat 8 is a joint approval and will go to the Titusville Council on December 14, 2021

Summary Explanation and Background:

The Board of County Commissioners must make two appointments to the North Brevard Hospital District Board. One appointment is to be made by the Board of County Commissioners (Seat 4) and one appointment is made by the Board of County Commissioners and confirmed by the Titusville City Council (Seat 8).

Hospital Board Members must reside within the boundaries of the Hospital District Board and are appointed for four-year terms.

The application deadline was set for noon, November 19, 2021. As in the past, the Application Advertisement (attached) includes several questions, which each applicant is required to respond to. Staff advised the City of Titusville that the Board of County Commissioners will review applicants for the joint appointment at this meeting and advised them of the selection as the City will make their confirmation vote at their December 14, 2021 meeting.

1. What do you feel the public's rights are in observing, monitoring and participating in the activities of the Hospital Board, and particularly the expenditure of funds?

I think the public should be interested in all of the above. The public has the right and an obligation to know of any decisions and expenditures of funds made by the Board. Since the meetings are held in the Sunshine, the public can and should attend meetings, speak and ask questions if they so desire. I take into consideration any suggestions from the public that might further the positive objectives of the hospital.

I believe that the public is entitled to be present and heard anytime there is a meeting of the Board and a committee. It is the hospital Board's responsibility to approve a budget and ensure that prudent business practices are involved in establishing pricing for goods or services. The first time the public has the opportunity to comment is when the budget is being considered. The decision for all significant expenditures has the benefit of citizen input during our monthly meetings under the public comments section of the agenda.

2. What is your philosophy on how citizen boards for publicly owned facilities should conduct their business?

All business that is conducted by the hospital board is governed by the Florida Sunshine laws, and therefore everything that is done must be in the Sunshine, except for litigation, peer review and strategic planning. I

strongly support the need for the District to gather information from the public.

One of the basic responsibilities of any Board, whether public or private, is to ensure the financial stability of the organization while meeting the needs of the community. In addition, since we are a health care organization, our greatest responsibility is to our patients and the community. As a result, one important issue that I strongly support is the board's current physician recruitment policy. The physician manpower plan, that includes the physician recruitment policy, are public documents and are included in the board book each month, and available to anyone in the community who requests a copy. The physician manpower plan is developed in conjunction with the medical staff. Physicians are interviewed by an independent third-party as one component of determining physician needs in the community.

3. Have you ever served on a hospital board or any other board of directors?

Yes. In addition to my current service on the Parrish Medical Center Board of Directors, I have served 44 years on the City of Titusville Housing Authority Board. For many of these years (including currently) I have served as Chairperson. 1. What do you feel the public's rights are in observing, monitoring, and participating in the activities of the Hospital board, and particularly the expenditure of funds?

I believe in the requirements of the Florida Sunshine Law, which protects the public's rights to observe, monitor and participate in the activities of the hospital hoard. Board members have a duty to give proper consideration to public input. Hospital boards must ensure the public is involved and heard on all activities with the exception of executive sessions which are allowed by law and are necessary on select sensitive topics. Board members are responsible to the people of the District to ensure expenditures are properly administered.

The public has an inherent right to information regarding the expenditure of public money. It is the board's responsibility to make available audited financial statements to the public on at least an annual basis. Financial statements are presented at the monthly board meetings and made available to the public. This is done by posting updated copies on the hospital's Internet and placing copies in the board books on a monthly basis. Board books are also distributed to County and City management.

2. What is your philosophy on how citizen boards for publicly owned facilities should conduct their business?

Citizen boards should not only conduct their business in compliance with Florida's Sunshine Law, but should work cooperatively as a team. I believe our board of directors is diverse, and works together well as a team on behalf of the citizens we serve.

Public hospitals, as well as other hospitals, have many major business issues to address; two of these are: physician recruitment and self-pay/charity as follows:

To insure that the community has access to medical care, the hospital has an important responsibility in recruiting physicians. New physicians help replace physicians who are retiring or physicians in the community whose practices are growing and need assistance to meet the needs of our community. Therefore, it is our board's policy to recruit doctors in all

necessary specialties and to help the current active members of the medical staff recruit to fill their needs and to help their practices expand. That is why I support the recruitment policy and believe that the hospital should take the initiative of finding doctors for our community based on our board-approved physician manpower plan. A disadvantage in the State of Florida is the Three Strikes law. That is why many doctors are shunning this state, especially in specialties such as neurosurgery, anesthesiology and orthopedics. In addition, malpractice insurance costs are extremely high not to mention that this is a litigious state. Many more doctors now prefer to be associated with public hospitals for these reasons. Parrish Medical Center competes with all hospitals to attract doctors to North Brevard. This is an expensive undertaking, however it is important for the board to continue this initiative.

Hospitals across the country are closing and going bankrupt due to the overabundance of patients seeking care without the ability to pay or without health insurance. By law, hospitals are required to treat anyone who presents in the hospital's emergency department regardless of their ability to pay. PMC accepts all patients coming into the emergency department without question, treats them, and subsequently checks for verification of ability to pay or insurance. PMC's credit and collection methods have created very few complaints about which we take great pride. Interview processes are conducted in a friendly and compassionate manner and completed in such a way that patients do not feel demeaned. Our attempt is to first help patients medically and secondly with their financial situation. Not attempting to collect bills is unfair to all patients. Uncollected bills that could have been collected increases costs.

I am currently a Brevard County Board appointee (Seat 4) of Parrish Medical Center as well as on the board of the Marine Resource Council, Space Coast League of Women Voters Board of Directors, and the Port St. John Library Board. It is the hospital Board's responsibility to approve a budget and ensure that prudent business practices are involved in establishing pricing for goods or services. The first time the public has the opportunity to comment is when the budget is being considered. The decision for all significant expenditures has the benefit of citizen input during our monthly meetings under the public comments section of the agenda.

2. What is your philosophy on how citizen boards for publicly owned facilities should conduct their business?

All business that is conducted by the hospital board is governed by the Florida Sunshine laws, and therefore everything that is done must be in the Sunshine, except for litigation, peer review and strategic planning. I

strongly support the need for the District to gather information from the public.

One of the basic responsibilities of any Board, whether public or private, is to ensure the financial stability of the organization while meeting the needs of the community. In addition, since we are a health care organization, our greatest responsibility is to our patients and the community. As a result, one important issue that I strongly support is the board's current physician recruitment policy. The physician manpower plan, that includes the physician recruitment policy, are public documents and are included in the board book each month, and available to anyone in the community who requests a copy. The physician manpower plan is developed in conjunction with the medical staff. Physicians are interviewed by an independent third-party as one component of determining physician needs in the community.

3. Have you ever served on a hospital board or any other board of directors?

Yes. In addition to my current service on the Parrish Medical Center Board of Directors, I have served 44 years on the City of Titusville Housing Authority Board. For many of these years (including currently) I have served as Chairperson. Through applying for and receiving grants, as well as through help from the City, we have converted our senior housing into an independent and assisted living facility. This board has been especially busy for the past few years setting up our home-based operations.

4. Do you have any experience reviewing corporate or governmental budgets?

Yes, I review governmental budgets both as members of the Parrish Medical Center Board and as a member of the City of Titusville Housing Authority.

5. Do you have any business affiliations with individuals or organizations in the medical community?

I have listed and sold property for individuals in the medical community.

1. What do you feel the public's rights are in observing, monitoring, and participating in the activities of the Hospital board, and particularly the expenditure of funds?

I believe in the requirements of the Florida Sunshine Law, which protects the public's rights to observe, monitor and participate in the activities of the hospital hoard. Board members have a duty to give proper consideration to public input. Hospital boards must ensure the public is involved and heard on all activities with the exception of executive sessions which are allowed by law and are necessary on select sensitive topics. Board members are responsible to the people of the District to ensure expenditures are properly administered.

The public has an inherent right to information regarding the expenditure of public money. It is the board's responsibility to make available audited financial statements to the public on at least an annual basis. Financial statements are presented at the monthly board meetings and made available to the public. This is done by posting updated copies on the hospital's Internet and placing copies in the board books on a monthly basis. Board books are also distributed to County and City management.

2. What is your philosophy on how citizen boards for publicly owned facilities should conduct their business?

Citizen boards should not only conduct their business in compliance with Florida's Sunshine Law, but should work cooperatively as a team. I believe our board of directors is diverse, and works together well as a team on behalf of the citizens we serve.

Public hospitals, as well as other hospitals, have many major business issues to address; two of these are: physician recruitment and self-pay/charity as follows:

To insure that the community has access to medical care, the hospital has an important responsibility in recruiting physicians. New physicians help replace physicians who are retiring or physicians in the community whose practices are growing and need assistance to meet the needs of our community. Therefore, it is our board's policy to recruit doctors in all

necessary specialties and to help the current active members of the medical staff recruit to fill their needs and to help their practices expand. That is why I support the recruitment policy and believe that the hospital should take the initiative of finding doctors for our community based on our board-approved physician manpower plan. A disadvantage in the State of Florida is the Three Strikes law. That is why many doctors are shunning this state, especially in specialties such as neurosurgery, anesthesiology and orthopedics. In addition, malpractice insurance costs are extremely high not to mention that this is a litigious state. Many more doctors now prefer to be associated with public hospitals for these reasons. Parrish Medical Center competes with all hospitals to attract doctors to North Brevard. This is an expensive undertaking, however it is important for the board to continue this initiative.

Hospitals across the country are closing and going bankrupt due to the overabundance of patients seeking care without the ability to pay or without health insurance. By law, hospitals are required to treat anyone who presents in the hospital's emergency department regardless of their ability to pay. PMC accepts all patients coming into the emergency department without question, treats them, and subsequently checks for verification of ability to pay or insurance. PMC's credit and collection methods have created very few complaints about which we take great pride. Interview processes are conducted in a friendly and compassionate manner and completed in such a way that patients do not feel demeaned. Our attempt is to first help patients medically and secondly with their financial situation. Not attempting to collect bills is unfair to all patients. Uncollected bills that could have been collected increases costs.

3. Have you ever served on a hospital board or any other board of directors?

I am currently a Brevard County Board appointee (Seat 4) of Parrish Medical Center as well as on the board of the Marine Resource Council, Space Coast League of Women Voters Board of Directors, and the Port St. John Library Board. I am a former member of the Port St. John Special District Dependent Advisory Board, the Port St. John Homeowner's Association Board of Directors, a founding member of the United Scleroderma Foundation, Brevard County Chapter Board of Directors, Natural Resource Council, Turtle Coast Sierra Club, Brevard County Charter Review Council, Brevard County Redistricting Committee and the Port St. John Special District Planning and Zoning Board.

4. Do you have any experience reviewing corporate or governmental budgets?

As a current member of the Parrish Medical Center Board, I participate in reviewing and approving the annual capital and operating budgets. As a member of the Brevard County District 1 Transportation Advisory Committee I reviewed funds and voted on the distribution of tax money for roads and bridges funding in North Brevard. As a member of the Port S. John/Canaveral Groves MSTU Committee I was involved in the distribution of funds from the Special Tax District. In addition, as a member of the Charter Review Commission (1997 – 1998 and 2002 – 2004) I reviewed in detail the budget and financial aspects of Brevard County.
