## **Brevard County Board of County Commissioners**

### Staff Recommended 2023 Legislative Initiatives

### **Utility Services**

#### Infrastructure Optimization

- SUPPORT Fixed Capital Outlay funding for a new Advanced Wastewater Treatment plant to serve the growing population of Port St. John. Aging infrastructure and projected population growth in Port St. John require the construction of a new 1.5 million gallon per day (MGD) advanced wastewater treatment plant to service the area's needs. Providing advanced treatment and increasing capacity for septic to sewer projects reduces nutrient loading to the Indian River Lagoon, thereby minimizing negative impacts to the already-burdened ecosystem. Passage of the Clean Waterways Act in 2020 and the Reclaimed Water Bill in 2021 is indicative of future trends towards environmental protection in state of Florida and highlights the need to provide advanced wastewater treatment throughout the County.
- SUPPORT Fixed Capital Outlay funding for new Advanced Wastewater Treatment and Potable Water Treatment plants to serve the growing population of South Brevard. Aging infrastructure and projected population growth in South Brevard require the construction of a new advanced wastewater treatment and potable water treatment plants to service the area's needs. Providing advanced treatment and increasing capacity for septic to sewer projects reduces nutrient loading to the Indian River Lagoon, thereby minimizing negative impacts to the already-burdened ecosystem. Passage of the Clean Waterways Act in 2020 and the Reclaimed Water Bill in 2021 is indicative of future trends towards environmental protection in state of Florida and highlights the need to provide advanced wastewater treatment throughout the County. The ability to provide the highest quality drinking water will help Brevard to remain attractive to new development. Upgrades to the drinking water system will ensure that this vital service is delivered in the most cost-effective and environmentally friendly manner.
- SUPPORT Fixed Capital Outlay funding for the installation of a new second Underground Injection Well to provide essential effluent disposal at the South Beaches Wastewater Treatment Facility. Passage of the Clean Waterways Act in 2020 and the Reclaimed Water Bill in 2021 is indicative of future trends towards environmental protection in state of Florida and highlights the need to provide additional disposal before the 2032 zero discharge requirement, which reduces nutrient loading to the Indian River Lagoon, thereby minimizing negative impacts to the already-burdened ecosystem.
- SUPPORT Fixed Capital Outlay funding for a water treatment plant expansion and the addition of
  new potable water wells. Foreseeing issues related to salt water intrusion and its impact on
  diminishing the raw water integrity of our existing surficial wells will require new wells and
  technology better equipped for converting brackish water into potable water. These improvements
  will benefit the integrity of the potable water supply in North Brevard and allow for future
  development.

## **Transportation Infrastructure Priorities**

#### **Ellis Road Widening**

• SUPPORT funding for the construction and widening of Ellis Road to four lanes. Improvements include the widening of Ellis Road to four lanes for 1.7 miles to Wickham Road. East of Wickham, Ellis Road becomes NASA Blvd which is already 4 lanes. NASA Blvd serves Melbourne Orlando International Airport (MLB) and the numerous businesses on and around Airport property. Strategic Intermodal System designation granted in 2016. National Highway System Designation on August 2, 2022. This is the Space Coast Transportation Planning Office's (TPO) number one transportation priority and is a critical component for the continued growth and economic expansion of our community. Project supported by Brevard County, West Melbourne, Melbourne, Melbourne Orlando International Airport (MLB) and Florida Department of Transportation. Right of way is fully funded. Design completed in 2022 by Brevard County (Federal Funds). Updated construction costs \$52.71 million, including construction engineering inspection. Partially funded at \$30.8 million. Need an additional \$21.91 million.

### **Natural Resources**

#### Indian River Lagoon and St Johns River

- SUPPORT state cost-share for Water Projects that reduce pollution sources, remove legacy loading, restore critical ecosystem functions and provide sound, applied research for the Indian River Lagoon, St. John's River Upper Basin and Lake Washington. Water Project funding encourages local governments and agriculture to improve stormwater and waste water treatment, remove legacy loads or restore critical ecosystem functions. Recurring funds are critical to the Indian River Lagoon National Estuaries Program.
- SUPPORT algal bloom and PFAS monitoring and remediation. Harmful algae (super blooms, brown tide, red tide, and blue-green cyanobacteria) continue to bloom in the Indian River Lagoon and St Johns River, annihilating seagrass habitat, releasing toxins and occasionally creating hypoxic fish kills. Research is needed on the causes and remediation options for harmful blooms. PFAS are a class of chemical contaminates that pose a health risk to humans and wildlife. Action is needed to track sources and develop cost-effective remediation options.

#### Resiliency

- SUPPORT dedicated state funding sufficient to sustain sand on Florida's beaches. The Legislature
  has supported a dedicated funding level of \$50 million for cost share grants to maintain sandy
  beaches. Brevard will be seeking cost share to address erosion caused by Hurricanes Ian and
  Nicole. Healthy funding levels for this cost share program are critical to support the state's tourism
  brand, economic well-being, and in Brevard, our globally important sea turtle nesting beaches of
  the Archie Carr National Wildlife Refuge.
- SUPPORT funding to elevate roads over the lagoon and allow for causeway removal. Existing
  causeways interfere with natural circulation patterns in the lagoon. High residence time and
  stagnant waters contribute to harmful algae blooms. Elevating the roadways will improve resilience
  to storm events and allow for causeway removal to restore natural circulation and flow.

#### Waterways

SUPPORT funding for aerial surveys for manatee population and habitat assessment. Manatee
surveys are needed in response to the extensive loss of seagrass in the Indian River Lagoon that has
reduced the carrying capacity for manatees and contributed to unprecedented starvation. The
aerial surveys will inform risk assessments and help to prioritize urgent habitat restoration.

## **Transportation Planning Office Projects**

- **SUPPORT** funding for the project development and environment (PD&E) phase for the SR405/South Street Widening Project (North Area).
- **SUPPORT** funding for right of way for multimodal safety improvements from Long Point Road to George King Boulevard in Cape Canaveral for the <u>SR</u> A1A Project (Beachside).
- SUPPORT funding for the design update and right of way for the SR 501 Clearlake Road Widening Project (Central Area).
- **SUPPORT** funding for the design from St. Johns Heritage Parkway to Minton Road for the Malabar Road Widening Project (South Area).

## **Brevard Zoo Aquarium Project**

• SUPPORT additional funding from the state for the Aquarium Project. The East Coast Zoological Society of Florida (ECZS) dba Brevard Zoo's Aquarium Project will play a major role in restoring the health of the Indian River Lagoon (IRL) as one of four designated IRL Restoration Infrastructure centers, as a dedicated funding source delivering an estimated \$500,000 to the IRL National Estuary program each year, and as an educational facility impacting over ½ million people annually. In addition, it will help drive tourism to Brevard County resulting in an annual economic impact of \$85.5 million and supporting 937 new jobs. The ECZS launched the funding campaign for the Aquarium Project last December and to date \$53 million of the \$100 million campaign has been committed. That includes \$950,000 of state funding that was approved last year and \$15 million of Brevard County Tourism Development Office (TDO) support.

#### **Veterans Memorial Amphitheatre Project**

• SUPPORT Local Funding Initiative Request for up to \$1,000,000 for The Amphitheatre at Veteran's Memorial Park located on Merritt Island for the anticipated cost increases since the initial project design. The Amphitheatre will be an outside venue with an acoustically engineered band shell of approximately 8,000 square feet and an amphitheater with an open spectator area of two-and-a-half acres accommodating 5,000 spectators situated in the center of the newly expanded 66-acre Veterans Memorial Park. The Amphitheatre will contain a performance stage, green room, vendor docking, and storage facilities, electrical infrastructure and stage lighting, and digital performance-level sound production. In addition, the project will include concession facilities and picnic seating, parking walkways, and restrooms. The Veteran's Memorial Amphitheatre was conceived through a partnership in the late 2000s after Brevard County Parks and Recreation Department received an \$800,000 grant from the State of Florida Communities Trust for Veteran's Memorial Park Improvements, and the Merritt Island Redevelopment Agency contributed \$400,000 towards the expansion. Most recently, Merritt Island Redevelopment Agency successfully obtained a \$1.3 Million Grant from the Brevard County Tourism Development Tax, matched by a \$1,000,000 investment from Merritt Island Redevelopment Agency, to complete the Amphitheatre project.
