

Speak Up Brevard 2024 - Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) Submissions

Fiscal Impact:

Requested Action:

It is requested the Board of County Commissioners review citizen recommendations submitted through Speak Up Brevard and vote to accept the recommendation; accept the recommendation with revisions; or reject the recommendation; as is required under the County Charter.

Summary Explanation and Background:

Brevard County Home Rule Charter, Section 2.9.10, specifically provides 'citizens':

"a mechanism for an individual, or an organized group of individuals to submit a formal written recommendation for the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of County government to the County Commission on an annual basis."

In calendar year 2023, the County received 59 citizen recommendations.

The submission period for 2023 was scheduled beginning December 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023. Staff was notified on December 31st that the software program shutdown at 5:00 a.m. on December 31st. All CEER recommendations that were received either through the Speak Up Brevard Software Program or via email prior to 5:00 a.m. on January 1st have been included. Submission dates and times have been corrected in the Speak Up Brevard/CEER software program.

Attached is a spreadsheet which identifies each citizen recommendation, the County Department that reviewed the recommendation and a staff recommendation to either accept, accept with revisions, or reject each citizen recommendation. Also included in the attachments are the details of each citizens' recommendation, and staff input relating to each recommendation.

Staff is requesting that the Board approve staff recommendations in a single motion for all the citizen recommendations. The Board may choose to pull those items from the staff recommendations that the Board would like to discuss and/or take alternative action on from the staff recommendation for particular Speak Up Brevard recommendations.

Staff Analysis:

Invasive plant removal on public lands is valuable, as is the rehabilitation of inmates. Natural Resources Management Staff (NRM) has sporadically utilized inmates for land management. However, these efforts mainly involved hand-weeding and less intense physical activities. Removal of invasive plants, such as Brazilian pepper, typically involves chain saws or heavy equipment, and herbicides to stump-treat for the prevention of regrowth. Specialized licensing is required to oversee the use of these herbicides. NRM does not have appropriate oversight staffing to train and supervise inmates in these intensive efforts. NRM will continue leveraging partnerships to ensure the most effective utilization of available resources.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendation.

CEER #2024002 was received by the County from Kevin Shropshire on 12/13/2023.

Citizen Statement:

I'm not sure if this is county-wide, but our Port St. John public library has very limited hours. Working parents have very limited ability to use library services for their children, or themselves with the current limited hours of operation. Here are the current hours of operation of our library. As a working parent, with 2 children in elementary school, please tell me how I/we can utilize our library more than a few hours per week, when these are the operational hours?

Citizen Recommendation:

I know we all have "staff shortages" and "budget cutbacks". But now we're affecting the knowledge base and learning sector. Our public libraries should remain open into the evening, every evening. If we have county funding to keep handing out as incentives to new developers and businesses, we have money to support learning. We need to increase funds to our local libraries, or find sources (possibly tourist dollars). I would recommend changing the operational hours to the following, at the least:

Sunday 12PM-5 PM Monday 11 AM-7 PM Tuesday 11 AM-7 PM Wednesday 12–8 PM Thursday 11 AM–7 PM Friday 11 AM–7 PM Saturday 10 AM–6 PM

The only increase in hours would be extending Saturday, and adding Sunday.

Staff Analysis:

The Library System has five larger regional libraries open seven days a week. When evaluating operations, the libraries closer in proximity to those regional libraries will have different hours to offer library patrons, allowing access to morning and evening hours.

When determining operating hours for the Port St John Library, we evaluated several factors.

The **Catherine Schweinsberg Rood Library** in Cocoa is open seven days a week. It is 9.7 miles south of the Port St John Library, has more meeting rooms and computers, and has a larger capacity for collections and programming. The Catherine Schweinsberg Rood Library is open on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

The **Titusville Library** is also open seven days a week and is 9.5 miles north of the Port St John Library. It, too, is open seven days a week and has more meeting rooms, computers, and a larger capacity for collections and programming. The Titusville Library is open Monday and Tuesday evenings.

Within the approximate 10-mile range of the Port St John Library are two libraries open seven days a week. Between the three libraries, evenings are available until 8 pm, four nights a week.

If Saturday and Sunday hours were added to the Port St John Library, as the CEER recommends, the action would add 9 additional weekend hours. The Port St. John Library plans for at least four staff members in the building to cover the work and breaks. We also need additional staffing to help cover vacations, illness, etc. In preparation for operating the library, we have staff in the building before we open to the public, which brings the hours to 12 additional hours of full staffing a week, which is 48 staff service hours.

The total increase required to the Library Services Department budget would be at minimum \$96,310 a year, which requires an approximate .0016 increase to the Library District millage rate.

Staff will continue to evaluate operational hours for each library.

It is recommended that CEER # 2024002 be rejected by the Board of County Commissioners.

CEER #2024003 was received by the County from Kristin Lortie that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Citizen Statement:

In 2022 Brevard County received only (1) submission for Speak Up Brevard, and which was a statement opposing a local development. This submission was voted on during the non-discussed consent agenda, making the process invisible to county residents. This is unacceptable for a county of over 600,00 residents.

- In 2023, as of December 13th, despite receiving an emailed citizen request from me on December 3rd and 4th, Brevard County has declined to put out a press release or to post the event to Facebook or other social media channels that are readily available to county personnel. The request was sent directly to the county manager, the assistant county manager, with follow-up with the communications director (copied to all commissioners), yet the county has declined to initiate any publicity for the event.
- The county Speak Up Brevard website currently has no open or close dates for the event, so residents who do locate the event are unaware of the one-month timeline. I was recently contacted by a confused resident asking if I happened to know the timelines.
- I have had to personally notify other residents of the event and personally request media attention from Florida Today to write the article that was just released today. Residents should not need to work this hard to publicize a county event whose purpose is to solicit resident input.

Citizen Recommendation:

1) Immediately update the Speak Up Brevard website with the beginning and ending dates of the program so that residents are notified of the deadline to submit for the annual program.

- 2) Immediately publicize the event through posting on the county Facebook page, the county main webpage, and other social media channels by submitting a press release similar to other county press releases;
- 3) Announce the event at the county's public meetings in December this year (and November and December of subsequent years) so that those attending or watching the meetings are aware of the event.

What are the benefits of implementing my suggestions?

The benefits that publicizing and informing the public would provide are to offer the public an opportunity to participate in the event and to easily see the deadline parameters. Residents cannot participate in an event they are unaware of. Resident participation has the potential to result in receiving the cost and efficiency saving suggestions the program is intended for. The current invisibility of the event sends the message to residents that the county is not interested in our participation or our ideas, and that the process is only a token process required by the county charter.

Attached are:

- 1) The county press release from 2019 showing that the county has previously publicized this event;
- 2) My suggestions submitted to the county manager's office by email on December 3rd, and re-sent on December 4th (copied to all 5 commissioners) after receiving Mr. Walker's response which declined to adopt any of the suggestions submitted.

Staff Analysis:

Section 2.9.10 of the County Charter provides for an annual filing date for a citizen or a group of citizens to submit a formal written formal recommendation for the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of County government to the County Commission on an annual basis. Under BCC-95, the annual filing date for submission date is January 1 of each year. County staff has annually extended the submission date from the January 1st date to include the entire month of December. Additionally, while the Charter provides for "a citizen or a group of citizens to submit a formal written formal recommendation for the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of County government to the County Commission on an annual basis" staff has historically accepted multiple recommendations from a single citizen or group of citizens to maximize recommendations that are eligible for review and consideration.

As in previous years, this program was initiated and posted on the County website under the e-Government tab on December 1, 2023. In the future, as recommended in this CEER, the specific timeframe for accepting a formal written recommendation for the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of County government to the County Commission will be posted online and will include any CEER recommendation received during the posted timeframe, including January 1st.

During 2023, 59 CEERs were received for review. Significant staff time has been utilized to carefully review and consider each recommendation received. Staff recommends that during 2024, the Board update and consider any revisions to BCC-95 it deems appropriate.

Additionally, staff will continue to publicize how citizens can submit CEER recommendations under the **e-Government** tab as well as publicize other ways how citizens can provide feedback and recommendations throughout the year to the Board by using a **Provide Feedback** link that's available 24/7 on the County website, by requesting a Commissioner to sponsor an agenda item, or by attending and speaking during the public comment period during a Board of County Commissioner's meeting and requesting the Board to consider a specific recommendation the citizen is seeking the Board to consider.

In an article published and posted on the Florida Today website on December 13, 2023, under the headline, **County seeks resident suggestions through annual Speak up Brevard program**, the County's Public Information Office provided information consistent with the various ways citizen input and recommendations can be provided to the Board as outlined above. Staff recommends continuing a similar course of action in the future.

Problem Description:

- In 2022 Brevard County received only (1) submission for Speak Up Brevard, and which was a statement opposing a local development. This submission was voted on during the non-discussed consent agenda, making the process invisible to county residents. This is unacceptable for a county of over 600,00 residents.
- In 2023, as of December 13th, despite receiving an emailed citizen request from me on December 3rd and 4th, Brevard County has declined to put out a press release or to post the event to Facebook or other social media channels that are readily available to county personnel. The request was sent directly to the county manager, the assistant county manager, with follow-up with the communications director (copied to all commissioners), yet the county has declined to initiate any publicity for the event.
- The county Speak Up Brevard website currently has no open or close dates for the event, so residents who do locate the event are unaware of the one-month timeline. I was recently contacted by a confused resident asking if I happened to know the timelines.
- I have had to personally notify other residents of the event and personally request media attention from Florida Today to write the article that was just released today. Residents should not need to work this hard to publicize a county event whose purpose is to solicit resident input.

My recommendations are the following:

- Immediately update the Speak Up Brevard website with the beginning and ending dates of the program so
 that residents are notified of the deadline to submit for the annual program.
- 2) Immediately publicize the event through posting on the county Facebook page, the county main webpage, and other social media channels by submitting a press release similar to other county press releases;
- 3) Announce the event at the county's public meetings in December this year (and November and December of subsequent years) so that those attending or watching the meetings are aware of the event.

What are the benefits of implementing my suggestions?

Thank you for your response and for listing the ways that residents can interact with the county throughout the year. As noted in my email, my current inquiry is limited to the annual Speak Up Brevard event which just opened on December 1st

Regarding your responses to my (3) inquiries, I noted the following:

- December 31st is the cutoff day for the Speak Up Brevard process. The county will not be updating the website with this date so that residents the view the website are aware of the cutoff date. This leaves residents uninformed.

My request is for the county to add the December 31st cutoff date to the Speak Up Brevard website page.

- the county does not intend to publicize this annual event on its Facebook page, social media channels, press releases, newsletter, announcing it at county meetings, etc.

Thus, the only way a citizen can actually locate the information is by locating the information on the specific portion on the county website dedicated to this topic. I did just go to the main website page and there is no information noted on the main county page.

In my opinion this isolated action does not meet a basic definition of "soliciting public comments/suggestions/concerns."

My request is for the county to publicize the event through the counties publicity channels noted above.

- the county does not have any specific areas identified to solicit public input on, and that could perhaps result in more relevant citizen suggestions being submitted this year.

My suggestion is for the county to identify and share any current areas of interest and opportunity that may result in more relevant feedback being obtained from citizens for the commissioners review.

I am disappointed that the county is unwilling to do more to promote this annual event and to actively encourage and solicit citizen participation. If I recall correctly, for the 2022 year there was a single citizen email that made up a 2023 consent agenda item for the entire Speak Up Brevard annual event.

Based on the current invisibility of the 2023 Speak Up Brevard program it does not appear that the county values citizen input in this important annual process required by the county charter. Adopting the above reasonable and pragmatic suggestions may help to shift that perspective.

Thank you for reaching out to the County Manager's Office concerning Speak Up Brevard. As the County's Public Information Officer and the County Manager's ombudsman, I'm responsible for reviewing and addressing your inquiry. Speak Up Brevard, as provided for on the Brevard County Charter, solicits public comments/suggestions/concerns during the month of December. As you know, each item of correspondence received through Speak Up Brevard is reviewed and brought before the Commission for input and direction. The Board reviews each and every item submitted to the County through Speak Up Brevard and, as you noted, many of the items brought to light require little to no action because they are either already in progress, they are beyond the scope of County services (although we do provide the information received through Speak Up Brevard to other governmental agencies that would be responsible to take any necessary action,) or the resident's requested item isn't fiscally feasible or prudent.

Beyond Speak Up Brevard, there are many additional ways throughout the year to interact with the County to share one's concerns or suggestions. For example, on our website, www.brevardfl.gov, and under the e-Government tab, and under the title of "Provide Feedback" there are options to provide feedback directly to County Departments, to provide input on the County budget, feedback on Space Coast Area Transit, to "Provide Feedback - Any Subject," and to comment or raise issues related to various other County services, including Parks and Preserves, Public Safety, the Sheriff's Office and other departments, agencies or charter offices. All of the suggestions, comments, complaints received through these channels are reviewed by County staff and are responded to in a timely manner.

Public Comments, which are entertained at every Board of County Commissioner meeting.

Alternatively, any resident can interact with their District Commissioner or any other

Commissioner to ask them to sponsor an agenda item they would like to have the Commissioner consider. Our website also includes contact information for each County department and each Commissioner office. As provided for by Charter, Speak Up Brevard is posted on the County website from Dec. 1 through the end of the month.



Staff Analysis:

Brevard County has had a tree ordinance in place for decades. Chapter 62, Article XIII, Division 2 of Brevard County Code is entitled Landscaping, Land Clearing, and Tree Protection (LLTP). The LLTP regulations include canopy preservation and planting requirements that vary depending on the size of the area of alteration and land use. Trees must be preserved or relocated on-site during development to the greatest extent feasible and replacement of protected trees is required if minimum canopy thresholds are not met. If specimen trees are removed, they must be replaced regardless of canopy threshold satisfaction. Where adverse site conditions make

the removal of a protected or specimen tree necessary and cause the site to fall below the minimum required canopy preservation percentage, an Alternative Landscape Enhancement Plan is required that demonstrates the adverse site conditions and provides a planting plan that exceeds the minimum landscape and canopy standards.

For vacant parcels, land clearing is prohibited without Natural Resources Management review and approval with few exemptions (bona fide agricultural use pursuant to F.S. Ch. 163.3162(4), emergency removal of a dead or seriously damaged tree that poses an immediate threat, removal of nonnative invasive or undesirable plants, etc). For parcels that are already developed, minimum landscaping and canopy preservation requirements must be maintained in perpetuity, after the issuance of certificate of occupancy.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendation as a tree ordinance has already been implemented.

Staff Analysis:

Through a strong partnership with Brevard Public Schools' Career Technical Education (CTE) program, we offer paid internships to junior and senior students. This valuable initiative allows students to gain real-world work experience while earning compensation and opportunities to earn service hours for the Bright Futures program. Interns have worked with County Staff in Human Resources, Public Works, Central Services, Planning & Development, Communications/SCGTV, Information Technology, and Solid Waste Management. Students can devote 15-20 hours per week during a semester to delve into the intricacies of the public sector, boosting their knowledge and skills. During their internship, students receive regular evaluations from staff, ensuring that they receive valuable feedback on their performance. Brevard Public Schools CTE Coordinator and school staff also take time to visit the student interns on-site, further enhancing their learning experience. Several Student Interns have in fact secured County employment after their internships.

A partnership between Brevard Schools, Brevard County Fire Rescue, and Eastern Florida State College created the Brevard Public Schools Fire Academy, which began classes in August 2022 at Palm Bay Magnet School. In addition to this program, BCFR's implementation of a sponsorship program to award scholarships to students pursuing studies in Fire Services has resulted in hiring numerous scholarship recipients.

Brevard County BOCC and Brevard Public Schools have joined forces to co-sponsor a student job fair in April 2024. The collection point of any solid waste to be collected is defined by both Section 94-1 of the Brevard County Code of County Ordinances and Section 6 Paragraph C of the current contract with Waste Management to be a point within five feet from the curbline or paving line of the nearest public street. Section 94-47 of the Code of Ordinances further states that solid waste and receptacles shall be kept upon property in ownership or tenancy of the person generating the waste, and that waste and receptacles shall be placed so as to allow convenient passage of persons and conveyances. Section 94-49 of the Code of Ordinances and Section 6 Paragraph A of the current contract with Waste Management state that any yard waste not containerized must be stacked in a uniform direction, limited to four feet in length, 24 inches in diameter, and 50 pounds in weight, and that for any yard waste not meeting these limits the customer must notify the collector to schedule a special pickup.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024006 as the issues raised are already addressed in County Code of Ordinances 94-47 and 94-49 and Section 6 A of the County's contract with Waste Management.

Citizen Statement:

Trash (contained in the large green containers) is picked up at my address TWICE as week – Mondays and Thursdays. Quite frequently. I do not put trash out for pickup on Monday because the container is less than one half full. Also, on Thursday, I seldom put out the trash for the same reason. As I look down the street at other residences, I see others doing the same. It appears to me that the county could save a considerable amount of money by picking up trash only ONCE a week as they do with recycles and yard waste. I made this suggestion in the past when the new budget was being considered but apparently it was either rejected or not given consideration.

Citizen Recommendation:

Cost Savings!

Staff Analysis:

When the Board of County Commissioners solicited a Request for Proposals for Solid Waste Collection in 2019 there were four weekly collection options available for pricing: Option 1) trash 2x, recycling 1x, yard waste 1x (unlimited quantity); Option 2) trash 1x, recycling 1x, yard waste 1x (limited to 10 cubic yards); Option 4) trash 1x, recycling 1x, yard waste 1x (limited to 10 cubic yards). Based on the proposed pricing for each option provided by bidders, the Board directed staff to negotiate with the lowest qualified bidder, Waste Management. Staff Analysis:

Windblown debris from vehicles that have not fully secured their solid waste load is a continuing roadside litter challenge. However, it is important to note that State Road 524 and Adamson Road are the two roads used by nearly every vehicle that accesses the Central Disposal Facility for solid waste disposal. This means that these roads are used not only by Waste Management vehicles contracted for collection service in unincorporated Brevard County, but also by collectors contracted by municipalities, construction and demolition debris contractors, roofing contractors, landscapers, and citizens hauling their own solid waste for disposal. Chapter 316.520 of the Florida Statutes provides the requirements for all vehicles carrying loads on roads and highways. Solid Waste Management Department personnel regularly clean up litter along Adamson Road and regularly remind solid waste haulers, including Waste Management, of the regulations concerning loads on vehicles. 

WHAT IS STRATEGIC PLANNING?

Strategic planning is the ongoing organizational process of using available knowledge to document a business's intended direction. This process is used to prioritize efforts, effectively allocate resources, align shareholders and employees on the organization's goals, and ensure those goals are backed by data and sound reasoning.

Citizen Recommendation:

Suggest that the county initiate a 5-year strategic planning effort that includes multiple components (Values, Vision, SWOT, Resiliency, Community Participation, etc). A 5-year plan would provide a more cohesive vision for Brevard residents, employees, businesses, and elected officials, and should be created in collaboration with citizen participation in the goal-setting for the county.

A 5-year strategic plan would be appealing to new businesses and residents, to know that Brevard County acknowledges itself as a growing county that wants to serve it's residents and stakeholders through its planning efforts.

Attached are samples of current strategic plans from Orange and Leon Counties. Many others are available via simple google search. It's time Brevard County had our own 5-year Strategic Planning that is easy to locate on our county website!

Staff Analysis:

The County's annual budget plan, including an annual Budget Message, as approved by the Board of County Commissioners, sets and continues initiatives that target both long-range and short-term strategic priorities, including public safety, infrastructure, employee compensation, recruitment, retention and environmental resilience. Brevard County departments have many long-range plans that include, but are not limited to, expansion and upgrades to utility services and infrastructure, roads and bridges paving, maintenance, replacement and reconstruction, Indian River Lagoon restoration, solid waste disposal, and emergency response services. Such long-range plans include but are not limited to:

- Public Work's cornerstone plan is a 5-year and beyond plan for road resurfacing, reconstruction and preservation across the county. Serving effectively as a report card, a Pavement Condition Assessment is routinely performed by an independent consultant. It helps guide the County on which roads need attention, and each year the list of actual streets that will be addressed in the following year are revisited by staff's visual inspection. As such, specific roads are adjusted accordingly based on need, potential conflicts, and available funding.
- Public Works also has a 5-year Bridge Plan. Bridges are inspected either by Florida Department
 of Transportation or by one of the County's consultants. Based on criticality and available
 funding, Public Works has focused its efforts into maintenance, rehabilitation, and
 replacements.
- Public Works also has over 80 active large-scale maintenance or capital improvement projects in either the planning/feasibility, design, or construction stage. Based on available funding, these projects are planned out over many years and are often impacted by permitting, citizen support, and Right of Way impacts.
- Each year during the budgeting process, the current year's efforts are reviewed and compared to projections and adjusted accordingly. Smaller maintenance projects, largely driven by citizen complaints, are tracked but are typically completed within 1-2 years. As projects are completed, it serves as the bench and a strategic plan/roadmap for future projects if newer projects aren't deemed more critical.
- Solid Waste Management currently has both short-term and long-term Capital Improvement Programs that set forth the projected needs of the Solid Waste Management system for the immediate future and subsequent 25-year planning period. Revenue and expenditures are mapped out over a 30-year period to ensure that adequate funding is available to facilitate the Department's mission of providing a dependable, cost-effective, and environmentally sound Solid Waste Management system. The plans include landfill expansions and closures, facility

maintenance, new facility construction, equipment replacement, and environmental compliance.

- Brevard County Fire Rescue has a long-term plan to invest in personnel, infrastructure, and capital to address the needs of Brevard County citizens and visitors. Long-range planning continues to be updated as time progresses to remain consistent with the needs of the County and its residents and visitors.
- Natural Resources Management has several long-range initiatives in the County's Comprehensive Plan. The state requires an Evaluation and Appraisal Report (EAR) of the Comprehensive Plan every seven years.
- The Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan is a 10-year plan that is updated annually.
- The Capital Improvement Plan for NRM is a 5-year plan for capital projects.
- Beaches has a 50-year agreement with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.
- Boating and Waterways has a Comprehensive Maritime Management Master Plan and a Manatee Protection Plan.
- Utility Services has invested in many efforts since 2000 to establish a long-term implementation plan on current and future services. Utility Services developed a long-term plan to identify treatment plant and pipeline expansion needs that was based on a 2035 population projection analysis. Assessment of all County water and wastewater assets are near completion to program replacements as part of a long-term plan.

Suggest that the county initiate a 5-year strategic planning effort that includes multiple components (Values, Vision, SWOT, Resillency, Community Participation, etc). A 5-year plan would provide a more cohesive vision for Brevard residents, employees, businesses, and elected officials, and should be created in collaboration with citizen participation in the goal-setting for the county.

A 5-year strategic plan would be appealing to new businesses and residents, to know that Brevard County acknowledges itself as a growing county that wants to serve it's residents and stakeholders through its planning efforts.

Attached are samples of current strategic plans from Orange and Leon Counties. Many others are available via simple google search. It's time Brevard County had our own 5-year Strategic Planning that is easy to locate on our county website!

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I. Executive Summary

Community Action Agencies (CAA) are required to complete a community needs assessment to gather information for a community action plan as a condition to receipt of Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) funding.



In this 2020-2025 Strategic Plan (hereafter referred to as The Plan), Orange County Community Action (OCCAA) outlines critical community Agency characteristics and needs based on a Community Needs Assessment which guides the development and innovation of the agency's anti-poverty programming over the next three to five years. The overall purpose of this strategic plan is to identify resources which will improve the quality of lives for the citizens in Orange County served by the Community Action Agency. The goals, objectives and strategies presented in the plan focus on improving the agency's overall effectiveness and efficiency toward serving Orange County and its low-income individuals and families.

The OCCAA strategic planning process included; committee/management team meetings; board community needs assessment review, member/client surveys, and staff input. In addition, community stakeholders were engaged for their perspective on the agency's strategic approach, implementation, and community impact results in light of its stated mission. The process was intentional about gathering information from a variety of sources to help provide insight into outlining Orange County Community Action's future direction.

From this input emerged a strategy to move Orange County Community Action Agency toward having a greater family and community impact and the ability to sustain high performance in an ever-changing economic and social climate.


II. Strategic Planning Process

The essential tasks of coordination, facilitation, research, analysis and developing the Plan were completed amongst the staff with active participation of the board members. The Strategic Plan's needs assessment analysis provided qualitative and quantitative data. Survey responses received from the survey tools were analyzed and several other reports and documents were utilized.

The primary instruments included:

- 2020-2023 Community Needs Assessment
- 2020-2022 CARES Act Funding Needs Assessment Plan
- SWOT Analysis Survey
- Agency Review Survey
- Local Theory of Change Brainstorm Exercise
- **Board Assessment**

The process in the development of the Plan for implementation included four phases:



Phase I initiated the assessment phase by identifying our service area and poverty population; assessing customer and community needs, and analyzing both quantitative and qualitative data to determine priority needs that should drive the agency work.

Phase II continued the assessment phase by identifying the agency's internal strengths and weaknesses and external opportunities and threats, while the Board reviewed the Mission and explored a Local Theory of Change exercise for an in-depth agency review. The management staff conducted discussions of the SWOT Analysis responses to brainstorm on strategic issues and actions for the agency. Board members, agency staff and stakeholders were surveyed during this phase.

Phase III involved identifying critical issues facing the agency after review of the findings from the Needs Assessment Report, SWOT Analysis, Agency Review and Local Theory of Change Brainstorm Exercise. Representation from the Community Action Board, staff and stakeholders framed strategic issues to address what potentially may affect the Agency's community impact in effective delivery of its programs and services.

Phase IV involved the Management Team drafting the Strategies and Objectives based on all feedback as the final component of the Strategic Plan and presented the recommendations to the Board for approval to complete the planning process.

III. Organizational Mandates and Accountability

This Strategic Plan recognizes and utilizes the elements from Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) to preserve the anti-poverty focus of Community Action Agencies. Strategic Planning is the second phase of ROMA and each phase of the ROMA cycle will be explored at various times during its lifecycle.

Performance Based Management System:

In 1998, the Community Services Block Grant Act was amended and Community Action was mandated to implement a comprehensive performance-based management system, across the entire community action network identified as "Results-Oriented Management and Accountability," or ROMA.

Organizational Standards:

The Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families Office of released Information Services Community Memorandum (IM) 138 which established Organizational Standards for CSBG eligible entities. Under Section 678B of the CSBG Act, State Lead Agencies are to establish "performance goals, administrative standards, financial management requirements and other requirements" that ensure an appropriate level of accountability and quality among the State's eligible entities.

National Performance Indicators: Community Action agencies are required to utilize National Performance Indicators to evaluate attainment of National Goals across three key areas: Family, Community, and Agency.

The vulnerable population footprint reflects there are a total of 484,192 people 37.6% of the total population are below 200% of the FPL and 11.51% or 101,305 individuals have not attained a high school diploma. B. Community Needs Assessment of Poverty Needs and Conditions

Community Assessment Response

Priority Needs Based on Community Needs Survey Responses - The survey responses align with the statistical data in supporting the priority of need for employment in Orange County. Due to the high unemployment rate, loss of jobs and wages, families are struggling to meet their basic needs. The lowincome community and those households living in poverty are experiencing the hardest impact. Those daily challenges to sustain their household supports the need to also prioritize Housing and Utilities as an identified need among families. The coronavirus pandemic raises health concerns all across the country. Health and Safety is a community priority need to slow down the spread of the virus.

Considering the overwhelming number of job losses in Orange County (200,000 plus jobs) and the 208,224 re-employment/unemployment claims filed, there is an emergent need to get individuals employed and/or re-employed in an industry that can withstand COVID-19. The need will require retraining in target high demand industries along with job placement.

Top Community Needs Identified:

- Employment affordable wages in COVID-19 sustainable industries
- Housing ability to meet basic housing needs
- Job Training/Retraining high demand industry certifications
- Health Services access to health services due to pandemic
- Food Insecurities ability to meet basic household needs

CEER #2024014 was received by the County from Kristin Lortie on December 15, 2023.

Citizen Statement:

This recommendation is submitted as a related Recommendation to #2024003 regarding the current lack of county-initiated publicity for the Speak Up Brevard event.

Currently Speak Up Brevard is not publicizing the event nor publishing annual metrics for the event. While each recommendation and general outcome can in general be viewed under the search, there are no roll-up metrics currently provided by the county. Additionally, while residents may be notified of the meeting where the commissioners will vote, they may not be directed or provided with the department staff recommendations, as evidenced by one comment received already this year on not knowing what happened to their prior suggestion.

For example, regarding publicity the only Facebook press release findable in an online search was in 2019-20, when the county received 72 distinct recommendations as denoted by the line items for that year. In 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23 the county received only 10 for all (3) cycles combined. These results indicates a direct correlation between the lack of publicity and diminished public participation. Lack of participation defeats the purpose of the program.

This year a citizen stepped in to initiate several actions to promote the program, and which has already resulted in a significant increase in participation for the 2023-24 cycle.

Citizen Recommendation:

I suggest that Speak Up Brevard publish an annual metrics statement on the Speak Up Brevard website that includes the following:

- Specific actions the county took to publish the event (press release, county website update, email alerts, announcing at county meetings, etc.)
- Total number of recommendations received for the year

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem concerning "Our water supplies are finite. The demands on our aquifer increase every year. Every effort to conserve should be promoted especially on public lands"

CEER #2021001 goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, "It should be mandatory all sprinkler systems on public land should have rain sensors. It is a terrible waste how much water, reclaimed or otherwise, is lost over the course of a year watering during rain stoms. Also, possibly offer some incentive to residents to do the same, maybe a one time \$10 credit on their reclaimed water bill or some such thing?"

Staff offers the following:

• It appears that this CEER is seeking an ordinance for it to be mandatory for all public lands in Brevard County to install rain sensors on their irrigation systems

The Brevard County Utility Services Department constantly reviews ways of efficiency, in particular with the environment. Rain sensors have been assessed in a manner as described in the recommendation. However, we have found that rain sensors do not have the reliability we would require. Issues such as not turning on during no rainfall events, being damaged / tampered due to the above ground exposure, and maintenance costs are some of the reasons of not utilizing this on public land. We have considered utilizing meters where reclaim water is used for irrigation on private property. This method would bill each person monthly based on their usage. This method makes each individual accountable of their usage. In order to implement such, this will require funds to purchase and install meters along with staff to download usage data. This option is being considered and based on State grants for environmental conservation, could be implemented in the future.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification, CEER #2021001. Modifications would not include mandatory rain sensors but rather implementation of metering reclaimed water of properties on County-Owned sewer systems subject to funding which is being sought, but is without a time frame for available funding at this time.

Bike Lanes - Pinehurst Avenue

DATE:

Question:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Ms. Erica Schwarz as follows:

"Side lanes for cyclists to ride safely are conspicuously absent from this country in general, and Suntree in particular. Even the now "finished" Viera Blvd has a bike lane on only 1 side and then even that goes away closer to Route 1. We have a huge cycling community and their safety should have been taken into account in road planning, but it wasn't and that should be remedied. Putting bike lanes (both ways) on North and South Pinehurst all the way to Rockledge Drive would be a start as this is an extremely popular route."

Analysis:

In Florida the bicycle is legally defined as a vehicle and the bicyclist as a driver. As such, bicyclists have the same rights to the roadways and must obey the same traffic laws as the drivers of other vehicles, such as riding with the flow of traffic and yielding the right-of-way when entering a roadway. The dilemma faced by both the bicyclists and motorists is the disparity between their speeds. Even on a road with a 25-mph posted speed limit, the majority of the most enthusiastic cyclists are unable to safely maintain a higher speed and may be at risk for an incident with a motorist. While the cyclist can consider using alternative paths, such as an adjacent multi-use path or sidewalk, the ultimate solution is to create a wider pavement to improve safety of bicyclists using the road. Transportation funds are currently not budgeted for this purpose; however, we recognize the increased safety that bike lanes can provide for cyclists.

Phone (321) 617-7202 • Fax (321) 617-7208 Website: brevardfl.gov At the time most of the roads in Brevard County were constructed, planning for preferential or exclusive space for bicycle travel along a street was not considered in the design process. In fact, it was not until 2009 that the Florida Department of Transportation (F.D.O.T.) developed the first engineering standards for bicycle lane markings where a designated bike lane may be desirable. Brevard County strictly adheres to the F.D.O.T. standards for engineering design and construction of roadway improvements. While dedicated bicycle lanes are not required, Brevard County has been including paved shoulders and multi-use sidewalks on all new road construction projects to allow for use by bicyclists.

In review of the suggestion to provide bike lanes on North and South Pinehurst Avenue, it was revealed that 1.1 out of the 2.9 miles of Pinehurst Avenue already has a paved shoulder that may be used by cyclists. The remaining 1.8 miles of Pinehurst Avenue does not have a paved shoulder, but is improved with a 6-foot to 8-foot wide sidewalk on one or both sides of the road. The north and south segments of Pinehurst Avenue are described in more detail below.

North Pinehurst Avenue extends north from Wickham Road to Holiday Springs Road and is approximately 1.8 miles in length. The posted speed limit is 30 mph. A third (0.6 miles) of N. Pinehurst Avenue is a divided 2-lane road with a wide (10'-12') paved shoulder on each side of the road that may be used by bicyclists. North of Spyglass Hill Road, North Pinehurst Avenue transitions to an undivided 2-lane road without a paved shoulder, but with a 6-foot wide sidewalk on one side. The road was built more than 25 years ago and the sidewalk was added several years later.

South Pinehurst Avenue extends south from Wickham Road to St. Andrews Boulevard and is approximately 1.1 miles in length. The posted speed limit is 25 mph. About half (0.5 mile) of South Pinehurst Avenue includes a paved shoulder on each side of the road, which was installed to accommodate users of the Suntree Golf Course and may be used by bicyclists as well. The remaining half (0.6 miles) of S. Pinehurst Avenue has a 6-foot or 8-foot sidewalk on one or both sides of the road.

The cost of installing a bike lane can range from approximately \$5,000 to \$50,000 per mile for a simple rural roadway cross section that does not have other roadway features in conflict. The costs can grow exponentially depending on right of way acquisition costs, the condition of the pavement, whether the pavement needs to be widened, the type of drainage system that exists, the extent of removing and repainting lane lines, and other factors.

In the case of North and South Pinehurst Avenue, it is estimated that the installation of bicycle lanes where a paved shoulder does not currently exist may cost \$250,000. An additional \$150,000 is estimated to extend these bicycle lanes from N. Pinehurst Avenue, along Holiday Springs Boulevard, and then along Viera Boulevard, to US Highway 1 where bicyclists can then travel on the existing bike lanes to get to Rockledge Drive. It is estimated that the cost to place dedicated bike lanes throughout the entire route would be around \$400,000.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification, CEER #2021002. It is desirable to provide a preferential lane for bicyclists to travel; however, it may or may not be feasible and we currently do not have designated funds for bikeway improvement projects. It is suggested that transportation funds be allocated to investigate the feasibility and cost for this improvement, as this route is heavily used by the cycling community.

Question:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Ms. Rebecca Roberts as follows:

- a. "Brevard County does not crown the roads. They are washboard[ed] and filled with mud holes most of the time. This encourages four wheeling of ATVs and 4x4 vehicles causing property owner damage...."
- b. "... Now there are vehicles driving on grass around signs and bypassing roads. Latest solution to cut on two foot drain points from road to ditch. All are bandaids."
- c. "Consider actually repairing the road and enforcing speed and laws on Hammock to reduce further damage of road. Or pave road."

This office has been tasked with providing input as to the comments and recommendations received regarding the condition of Hammock Rd as identified by items a, b and c above.

Analysis:

Item a. Crowning of Roads

Proper dirt road maintenance consists of three elements: a crowned or elevated driving surface, a shoulder area that slopes directly away from the edge of the driving surface, and a ditch. The primary goal is to keep the water drained away from the roadway. Standing water on the roadway is one of the major reasons for distress and failure of the road.

Washboarding and potholes are problematic characteristics of a dirt road, and are common complaints. There are four primary causes of washboarding: driving habits of people (speeding and aggressive braking), lack of moisture, poor quality of road material, and lack of crown or elevated road surface. The first cause is the major reason for the washboard conditions. Driving a dirt road at high speeds (above 20mph) can destroy a smooth road surface and turn it into a washboard mess, sometimes in a very short amount of time. The cause of washboard comes down to basic physics and natural movement of materials. Wheels rolling over the dirt/shell road surface shifts the aggregate and it begins to settle in a pattern of ripples; the faster the vehicle speeds, the more movement occurs.

Brevard County Public Works (Road & Bridge) maintains approximately 85 miles of dirt roads; 80% are located in District 1. County dirt roads are typically crowned in the centerline or elevated with a 2% slope that allows water to run off the road and into a roadside drainage system, generally a swale or ditch. The motor grader operators must constantly focus on maintaining the proper crown or elevated surface of the roadway, not allowing the shoulders to build up and prevent the flow of road runoff. The Road & Bridge maintenance team completes a grading cycle about every 4-6 weeks depending on weather conditions, road conditions, staffing, and equipment failures.

Hammock Road is approximately 5.5 miles long, located in District 1 (Mims), and constructed with a crown or elevated side along different sections of the roadway. Based on a 2019 evaluation, most of this dirt road needs rehabilitation. The road base needs to be remixed with the proper ratio of materials, the crown restored and the high shoulders regraded to allow proper drainage. The cost to rehabilitate the entire road is estimated at \$1.1 Million and the cost to pave is \$4.4 Million. Due to funding constraints, Hammock Road was placed on a 7-year rehabilitation schedule; approximately 1/2 mile to 1 mile of roadway will be rehabilitated each year. This schedule started in 2020. The completion date may vary based on available funding or unforeseen circumstances.

Item b. Two-foot Drains Cut into Side of Road

These two-foot drains were selectively cut into the shoulder of Hammock Rd in low areas as a temporary solution. As noted by the citizen, this is to drain water off the road as the shoulders are indeed too high. The shoulders need to be cut and regraded to allow road runoff to flow into the drainage ditches. This will be addressed during the road rehabilitation process.

Item c. Consider Repairing Road, Enforcing Speed or Pave Road

While there is not a recurring funding source to pave dirt roads, Public Works continues to look for viable solutions to improve dirt road conditions through maintenance activities. Case in point, the section of Hammock Road from Lionel Road to Irwin Avenue (0.5 miles) was recently rehabilitated by Road & Bridge Construction. As previously stated, paving all of Hammock Road is estimated to cost \$4.4Million. The planned cost includes surveying, engineering, permitting, acquisition of drainage easements and rights of ways, utility relocation, and construction.

Problem Description:

The Sebastian Beach Inn shut down several years ago. The inn has some interesting history as it is housed in Brevard County's last remaining coastal watch station that served dating back to World War II. The watchtower itself blew down in a hurricane in 2004. A movie producer named Bert Green took over the site in the 1950's and invited many of his Hollywood friends to come and party overlooking the turquoise ocean.

I think the county should purchase the property and rebuild the tower. They could keep the existing restaurant and add a museum celebrating the history.

Recommendation Description:

The museum and restaurant would make a great tourist attraction - particular with the expected large influx of UK tourists coming in 2022 (thanks to the deal with TUI Group). This is expected to add an additional 126,000 beach tourists each year. The county would own the property but could lease out the restaurant. This would likely cover operating expenses. So the county would get a great tourist attraction and preserve a historic landmark. Otherwise the FLU is single family. If it is sold it will likely be leveled.

Staff Analysis:

Unfortunately, the County, nor the Tourism Office, have the funds to purchase a property like this. Further, the Tourism Office does not create attractions, museums, etc. Its role is to market the destination and provide information about activities to do and places that people can go. The Space Coast Office of Tourism will continue to support private businesses that create great experiences for visitors. Should a private business want to create a museum or something similar to the one described, we would promote that through our website and on our social media platforms. It is possible we would include them in our publicity efforts and possibly our advertising if it made sense. It is also possible that a venue like this would be eligible for a capital facilities grant, but they would have to go through the application process and get the Tourism Development Council Capital Facilities Committee to vote to support it before it would be brought to the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners for their consideration. Also, the Tourism Office would only provide a percentage of the total project cost, as grants are contingent on matching funds.



Staff Recommendation:

The Space Coast Office of Tourism recommends that the Board of County Commissioners accept this recommendation with noted modifications.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem regarding:

"Affordable housing for low-income citizen who are trying to live into places they can not afford and having to work 2-3 jobs to make it (minimum wages). Citizen need to be able to work one job like middle class citizen so they can be home with family and less stress. Low-income house for senior so family members will not have to give them money to live monthly due they are taking most of their benefits to live. Thank you"

CEER #2021005 does not contain any recommendations as a potential solution.

Staff offers the following:

It appears that this CEER is seeking to address a lack of affordable housing for low-income residents of Brevard County.

The Florida Legislature, per Florida Statute 420.6015, determined that "decent, safe, and sanitary housing for persons of very low income, low income, and moderate income are a critical need in the state" and "new and rehabilitated housing must be provided at a cost affordable to such persons in order to alleviate this critical need". In order to facilitate this legislative finding, the State Housing Initiatives Partnership Program (SHIP) was created (Florida Statute 420.9072). SHIP provides sustainable homeownership and rental housing for Florida's workforce, helps prevent homelessness, and provides emergency repairs and disaster recovery for Florida's most vulnerable residents, including the frail elderly, persons with disabilities, and veterans.

SHIP distributes trust funds to counties and eligible municipalities. In Brevard the five recipients of that funding are Brevard County Government (administered through the Housing and Human Services Department) and the municipalities of Palm Bay,

Melbourne, Cocoa, and Titusville. This funding has been significantly reduced by the state over the last several years and was eliminated entirely for State Fiscal Year 2020-21.

The County and these municipalities also receive allocations through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development's (HUD) HOME Investment Partnership Program. These funds also are limited and while more reliable than SHIP, are still subject to Congressional and Presidential approval.

The lack of affordable housing is a substantial issue across the Country, not just in Brevard County. Compounding it is the rebounding housing market and increasing cost of labor and materials, which restrict the purchasing power of the limited funds that are received.

• It appears that this CEER also seeks to address affordable housing as it relates to income, specifically the minimum wage.

The setting of the minimum wage is beyond the purview of the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners. However, during the last election an Amendment to raise Florida's minimum wage was approved by residents. This amendment will result in the statewide minimum wage being raised to \$15 per hour by 2026.

Staff recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept the portion of the Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) 2021005 regarding the creation of additional affordable housing and direct Department staff to work with our State and Federal lobbyists to advocate for more funding.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem regarding:

"Centers for programs and transportation in the area for seniors"

CEER #2021006 does not contain any recommendations as a potential solution.

Staff offers the following:

Since the recommended title (from the citizen) for this CEER is "Affordable Housing for Seniors (HUD)" it appears that this CEER is seeking to address a lack of congregate living with amenities for seniors in Brevard County.

Brevard County and the four main municipalities (Titusville, Cocoa, Melbourne, and Palm Bay) receive both State and Federal funds to support the creation and maintenance of affordable housing. However, the State funding has been significantly reduced over the last several years and was eliminated entirely for State Fiscal Year 2020-21 and while the Federal funds are more reliable than State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP), they are still subject to Congressional and Presidential approval.

The lack of affordable housing is a substantial issue across the Country, not just in Brevard County. Compounding it is the rebounding housing market and increasing cost of labor and materials, which restrict the purchasing power of the limited funds that are received. Additionally, even pooled together, all the funds received in Brevard County (including the municipalities) would not be sufficient to acquire or create the type of congregate housing referred to in this CEER.

However, the Florida Housing Finance Corporation offers a Low Income Housing Tax Credit Program, which can be used for these types of facilities. It utilizes funds from the Federal level which are generated through a dollar-for-dollar reduction in federal tax liability that for-profit and nonprofit organizations can utilize to provide equity financing for the rehabilitation (with or without acquisition), or new construction of low and very low-income rental housing units. Qualifying buildings include garden, high-rise, townhouses, duplexes/quads, or mid-rise with an elevator. Ineligible development types include hospitals, sanitariums, nursing homes, retirement homes, trailer parks, and life care facilities. These funds require an investment from local government for a developer's application to be accepted. Brevard County and the municipalities have supported this program and local development for many years. All five local governments have processes in place to review, vet, and approve the expenditure of our limited affordable housing funds for the large-scale creation of housing through this Tax Credit Program.

Staff recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) 2021006, as there is already an avenue to address this suggestion.

Should a private business want to create a venue or something similar to the one described, we would promote that through our website and on our social media platforms. It is possible we would include them in our publicity efforts and possibly our advertising if it made sense. It is also possible that a venue like this would be eligible for a capital facilities grant, but they would have to go through the application process and get the Tourism Development Council Capital Facilities Committee to vote to support it before it would be brought to the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners for their consideration. Also, the Tourism Office would only provide a percentage of the total project cost, as grants are contingent on matching funds.

Brevard County Parks and Recreation Department will continue to enhance the quality of life by providing many types and levels of service, including recreational opportunities to the community at its parks and community, nature and education centers. Recommendation Description:

Promote tourism and help us sell the county to northerners.

Staff Analysis:

The Tourism Office targets drive markets within the state of Florida such as Orlando, Tampa, Miami, Palm Beach, Jacksonville, as well as the Southeastern United States including markets like Atlanta and Charlotte. The majority of visitation to the Space Coast comes from 300 miles away and less. Other markets outside of 300 miles that our origin markets for visitors are New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, DC, and Detroit.

The Space Coast Office of Tourism is responsible for marketing the destination and does promote that we are "Orlando's Closest Beach", among other things. Advertising runs mostly in Orlando and Tampa, as well as other Florida markets so residents would not always see them. We are spending approximately \$4.5 million on advertising this fiscal year. We will continue and expand this initiative as additional dedicated funding becomes available.

Staff Recommendations:

The Space Coast Office of Tourism recommends that the Board of County Commissioners accept this recommendation with the noted modifications.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Ron Rincones that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem:

- a. "(Babcock Street) From Palm Bay Road, to Malabar Road, each afternoon is a traffic jam. From Malabar Road, each afternoon is a traffic jam on a 2-lane road, outdated for more than 10 years. Please do what you can to increase the priority and timeline for correcting the problem."
- b. "I-95 Malabar Road, southbound exit. Each evening traffic backs up for more than a mile trying to exit onto Malabar Road. This creates a very dangerous situation for drivers who are stopped in the travel lane on the right. This must be addressed by the agency responsible now!"

Recommendation: "Commissioners must enhance the priority of scheduled projects. I know Commissioners are all aware of these problems, I am just trying to inject some urgency."

Staff Analysis:

Item a. Traffic congestion on Babcock Street between Palm Bay Road and Malabar Road

Babcock Street between Palm Bay Road and Malabar Road is also known as State Road 507 and, as such, the road is under the jurisdiction of the state, specifically the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District Five. This segment of Babcock Street is not under Brevard County jurisdiction.

Phone (321) 617-7202 • Fax (321) 617-7208 Website: brevardfl.gov FDOT completed a Project Development & Environmental (PD&E) Study which resulted in the recommendation to widen the roadway from the existing four lanes to a six-lane, divided roadway, based on the traffic demands. The proposed improvements include updated traffic signals, bridge replacement and bridge widening over the Melbourne-Tillman Canal, and also multimodal enhancements consisting of bicycle accommodation and the addition of sidewalks. FDOT's engineering consultant then completed preliminary design plans. FDOT has advised that this project is not currently funded for the right of way acquisition that is needed or construction, which they previously estimated at \$45 Million and \$25 Million, respectively.

Item b. Traffic congestion on the I-95 Southbound Exit at Malabar Road

Interstate 95 (I-95) along with its interchange ramps at connector roads is under the jurisdiction of the state, or FDOT specifically. Brevard County is aware that FDOT has previously evaluated this interchange for operational improvements, along with all interchanges in Brevard County, as part of an I-95 Systems Operational Analysis. However, we have not been informed of the specific findings or recommendations that resulted from this analysis.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification, the identified items (a) and (b) of CEER #2020001. While these road segments are not under the jurisdiction of Brevard County, staff will continue to provide input through the Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) and to the FDOT regarding the possibility of raising the priority of both of these items, compared to other needed transportation projects.

Indian River Lagoon Problem

RECOMMENDATION: Accept CEER 202002 items a., b., and c. with modifications that acknowledgment and confirm that similar actions are underway as approved and directed by the County Commission, and reject item d. due to lack of local authority.

Question:

The following suggestions were received from Ron Rincones:

Problem Description.

The Indian River is polluted in several areas. Studies have been going on for years and for some reasons, continue on, when the problem and solutions are well known, have been over studied!

Recommendation Description

I believe the solutions to cleaning up the Lagoon are:

- a. Septic tank leaching instead of spending millions on muck removal and other worthy efforts. Spend some on the millions on helping citizens to connect to sewers. Make this the number one priority.
- b. You cannot allow sewer systems, to discharge untreated effluents into the Lagoon every time there is a heavy rainfall. Put some of the millions into enhancing the sewer system's ability to treat effluents before any reached the Lagoon. Or better, terminate any discharge of effluents into the Lagoon.
- c. Run off is still a problem and must be addressed with either holding ponds, and some way of removing any organics or nitrogen from reaching the Lagoon.

d. Sea Cows discharge tons of dung each winter day into the Lagoon. Commissioners, stop the politically correct nonsense, and figure out how to wean them from the warm water discharge into the Lagoon, each winter. Do not allow

Analysis:

The intent of the proposed solutions are already planned or underway.

a. The first recommendation was "HELPING CITIZENS TO CONNECT TO SEWERS" to address "SEPTIC TANK LEACHING. MAKE THIS THE NUMBER ONE PRIORITY." The 2019 Save Our Indian River Lagoon Plan has \$113.8 million dedicated to the highest priority septic system projects. The Citizen Oversight Committee recommended increasing this allocation by \$55.1 million in the 2020 Plan Update, making this the number 1 priority in terms of funding allocation. The allocation includes funds to pay for citizens to hook up to sewer. If you visit the Maps section of the Save Our Lagoon website at https://www.brevardfl.gov/SaveOurLagoon/maps and click on "View the Project Story Map," and click layer "5 Sewer Quick Connects" shows the locations of lots near an existing sewer line who are able to take part in this program immediately. Layer "4 Septic to Sewer Conversions" shows all the areas where sewer lines are being extended and hookup costs will be covered to provide sewer service to additional high priority neighborhoods currently dependent on septic systems. Layer "6 Septic System Upgrades" is currently under construction, but will show the lots where sewer service is not available and not feasible, therefore septic upgrade grants are available to reduce septic leaching.

The amount of funding allocated to muck related projects was reduced by \$100 million in 2019 with wastewater projects receiving an increase of \$30 million and stormwater receiving an increase of \$27 million. As noted above, new septic and sewage related projects that were submitted for funding in 2020 will receive most of the remaining decrease in muck funding, if approved by the Board of County Commissioners in February. Muck removal will remain in the lagoon plan since it is the single largest source of excess nutrients that feed algae blooms and turbidity that blocks light from reaching the seagrass beds.

b. The second recommendation was "PUT SOME OF THE MILLIONS INTO ENHANCING THE SEWER SYSTEM'S ABILITY TO TREAT EFFLUENTS BEFORE ANY REACHES THE LAGOON. OR BETTER YET, TERMINATE ANY DISCHARGE OF EFFLUENTS INTO THE LAGOON." There is currently \$27.6 million aimed at sewage effluent treatment projects, with the Citizen's Oversight Committee recommending an additional \$7.3 million in the 2020 Plan Update. This is to reduce the pollutant load in effluent that is reclaimed and used for irrigation. Wastewater Treatment Plants have not been allowed to discharge directly to the lagoon on a daily basis since implementation of the Indian River Lagoon Act in the 1990s. Direct discharges currently occur in response to discrete events such as breaks, power failures, and overflows. To reduce the likelihood of these occurrences, the current plan allocates \$1 million to smoke testing and the repair of private line breaks while the Citizen's Oversight Committee recommending an additional \$0.5 million in the 2020 Plan Update. This is in addition to \$134 million funded by Brevard County Utilities to reduce the risk of sewage discharges and millions more being spent by city utilities to improve public infrastructure.

- c. The next recommendation was "RUN OFF IS STILL A PROBLEM AND MUST BE ADDRESSED WITH EITHER HOLDING PONDS, AND SOME WAY OF REMOVING ANY ORGANICS OR NITROGEN FROM REACHING THE LAGOON." There is currently \$40 million aimed at stormwater treatment projects, with the Citizen's Oversight Committee recommending an additional \$0.6 million in the 2020 Plan Update. This is in addition to about \$3.5 million funded annually through the Brevard County Stormwater Utility to retrofit stormwater infrastructure plus millions more being spent by city stormwater programs. Due to flood control projects creating over 1500 outfalls to the lagoon in Brevard, the plan includes hundreds of small projects distributed county-wide to treat discharges from the worst outfalls.
- d. Unfortunately, the County does not have authority to "WEAN THEM FROM THE WARM WATER DISCHARGES" because manatees are protected by state and federal laws. While manatees do convert the nutrients from seagrass into more bioavailable forms that can feed blooms, this is recycling of nutrients that are already in the lagoon, not addition of excess nutrients from sources outside the lagoon, such as septic, sewage and stormwater contributions. Nonetheless, the County has conveyed its concerns to the federal and state agencies on multiple occasions regarding the lagoon's carrying capacity for manatees and the unintended consequences of artificial warm water outflows.

Recommendation:

Accept CEER 202002 items a. b. and c. with modifications that acknowledgment and confirm that similar actions are underway as approved and directed by the County Commission, and reject item d. due to lack of local authority.

Build An Outdoor Public Gun Range

Recommendation: Reject

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) #2020003 was submitted by Mr. Kris Hiatt and identified the following problem: "No public outdoor shooting ranges. I have been traveling to Indian River County to their public range to hone my rifle and shotgun marksmanship skills. I know there are two private outdoor ranges here, but you have to meet certain criteria and join a yearly service."

CEER #2020003 goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, "Build a pay-as-you go outdoor public range. Try to have it centrally located in the county. This might curtail people from just going out into the back areas of Brevard County and shoot randomly. Would stop the littering of these back areas. Research Indian River County for how they started it, paid for it, built it, and continue to support and fund this enterprise. Shooting matches could be held there bringing in tourist money."

Staff offers the following:

The Indian River County Public Shooting Range is a 318-acre facility and is constructed on State-owned land. It was developed through funds made available from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. It opened in 2001 and is operated under a concession lease with the Florida Wildlife Conservation Commission. It operates as an independent County department and staff report to the Assistant County Administrator. There are daily rates available for the public to utilize the facility and range rents space to various community organizations for training and education.



Parks and Recreation Administration

The Brevard County Parks and Recreation Department owned a public access gun range in Titusville. The range was operated under contract to the Titusville Rifle and Pistol Club since 1980 at a lease cost of \$1 per year. On July 25, 2017, the Board of County Commissioners approved Resolution 2017-129, authorizing the sale the property to the Titusville Rifle and Pistol Club, Inc. The deed associated with the sale of the properties stipulates that the public access gun range be open to public use at least one day per week. According the Titusville Rifle and Pistol Club's website, three shooting ranges are available to the public six days a week (Tuesday through Sunday) – 100-yard rifle range, a seven-yard pistol range, and a 50-yard shotgun/pistol/pistol caliber carbine (PCC) range. The cost to the public is \$15 per day.

The Parks and Recreation Department has not been acquiring lands to develop additional parks and/or facilities. The Department focus has been the maintenance of facilities and transferring of facilities to municipalities where appropriate.

The current zoning code requires a conditional use permit for the establishment of a privately-owned range open to the public pursuant to Section 62-1921 Brevard County Code, Commercial entertainment and amusement enterprises.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness (CEER) # 2020003 as the Parks and Recreation Department remains focused on maintaining existing properties and is not positioned to acquire additional land for a gun range that would compete with the private sector.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified several problems and recommendations. This Department was tasked with analyzing and responding to CEER #2020004 regarding Nuisance Houses.

The problem description is as follows:

Enforcing the current statutes in Brevard County and the State of Florida would help reduce costs in the following ways:

- Reduce the number of EMS and Fire Rescue calls to drug houses for overdose and Narcan calls.
- Reduce the number of investigations from the Sheriff's Department for overdose, suspicious activity, theft, vandalism, and safety.
- Reduce the need for repeated citations issued by Brevard County Code Enforcement and Barefoot Bay Code Enforcement for health and safety issues as well as appearance.
- Return the Nuisance House to a safe and secure, tax paying status and to protect property values and homeowner rights.

CEER #2020004 goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, the following:

- Fewer calls for EMS service for those drug houses with overdose issues.
- Fewer calls for Sheriff service in unincorporated Brevard County for drug use and other investigations related to those living in the houses.
- Nuisance houses frequently also fall into Code Enforcement concerns with health and wellness issues as well as houses not being maintained.
- Legal action for owners who do not live in the area that something can and will be done to individuals living there and creating the nuisance.

As a result of legal action to declare nuisance houses, the property owners living in the area will see action that will protect their property, their rights and their safety. It will also serve to

reduce activity from other drug users who frequent the property. For verification of above concerns, please search records for 915 Wren in Barefoot Bay for Sheriff calls, EMS calls and Code Enforcement actions. It took many years of complaints and investigations from all those concerned to finally rid the neighborhood of this Nuisance House.

Staff offers the following:

CEER Recommendation #2020004, submitted by Ms. Crouse, suggests that the County take "legal action to declare nuisance houses". Chapter 74, Article IV of the Brevard County Code addresses "Nuisance Abatement". The existing Code provisions in Chapter 74 establish what activities constitute a public nuisance, the process for handling such conditions, and the authority for taking corrective action. Administrative fines and other noncriminal penalties can be utilized by the County to ensure nuisances associated with certain criminal activities are handled expeditiously and effectively. The Ordinance provides that a Special Master be appointed to conduct hearings and make final determinations, which can include "closure" of the place or premises as well as assessment of fines, recorded as a lien against the property. The Brevard County Sheriff's Office has the authority to present these cases before the Special Master.

With that being said, in certain situations, the Board has authorized the County Attorney's Office to exceed the typical code enforcement process and seek an injunction against ongoing Code violations. There have been two complaints made regarding 915 Wren Circle. The first complaint was submitted in 2016 regarding alleged recycling of aluminum; this complaint was unfounded. The second complaint was made this past year and regarded failure to maintain the home as required, performing additional work on the property without required permit, junk, debris, and lack of water service at the home. This second complaint was submitted to a Special Magistrate Hearing and the Magistrate Ordered Compliance was achieved. The complaint was received on 07/11/2019 and resolved (violations corrected) on 11/01/2019 (less than 120 days). Fortunately, as a result, it was not necessary to seek an injunction in this specific case for the code enforcement issues.

House Bill 625 has been filed with the Florida State Legislature that would extend notice requirements, clarify the process, and broaden the activities considered to be a nuisance. The process clarification and the additional nuisance activities should provide a more efficient and effective abatement of nuisance properties, should it pass in the Legislature.

Since Chapter 74, Article IV of the Brevard County Code addresses "Nuisance Abatement", and the Board has previously authorized the County Attorney's Office to seek both legal and equitable remedies for ongoing code violations, the Board may wish to consider accepting the recommendation as fulfilled.

Staff recommendation: Staff recommends accepting the recommendation as fulfilled.

RECOMMENDATION: Reject. The decision-making authority for deciding the appropriate bail in criminal cases resides with the judicial branch.

ISSUE:

This Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation was received by the County from Ms. Louise E. Crouse identified as being affiliated with the Barefoot Bay Neighborhood Watch. Her suggestion is as follows:

Frequent offenders, especially in the drug violations and related charges have lower bond rates which allow the charged individual to bond out in a short amount of time. Within hours of his arrest, the offender can be back on the streets doing whatever he needs to do to continue drug use, selling, distributing and associated crimes to support himself.

If bonds were set as graduated charges it might be more difficult for a frequent offender to be released. The county would recover more money to support the court system and provide protection for law abiding citizens.

The 'areas' affected were identified as the Sheriff of Brevard County and the State Attorney. The program affected was identified as Court Programs.

This office has been tasked with providing a response as to the recommendation.

ANALYSIS:

The County, other than funding certain needs of the Court system of the 18th Judicial Circuit and the State Attorneys' Office (office space, etc.) and the budget of the Sheriff, as required by statute, has no role in directing or supervising the court system, the Sheriff or the State

Attorneys' Office or role in determining bail. The Circuit and County Court Judges, the Sheriff and the State Attorney are separately elected officials. Additionally, neither the Sheriff or the State Attorney decides the issue of bail. The decision regarding ball is made by the judiciary as provided for by Florida state statute and Florida Rules of Criminal Procedure (as referenced to below).

Bail is typically set based upon a bail bond schedule issued by the Chief Judge of each Circuit, by local administrative order. This ball schedule is used by law enforcement when 'booking' a defendant into the County jail. A defendant is seen by a judge within 24 hours of being admitted into the jail to review probable cause for the arrest and to review bail for any increase or decrease deemed appropriate by the judge. The State Attorneys' Office prosecutes criminal case — not the County. Both defense counsel and the State Attorneys' Office have the option to file motions to review bail during the pendency of the criminal charges to present their viewpoint on what a reasonable bail amount would be and any restrictions which should be imposed regarding a defendant's release. The judge, in the judge's discretion, can increase, take no action or reduce the bond based upon factors set forth in statute and Criminal Rules of Procedure.

The focus of the statutes and the rules is that whether the defendant would appear for any court appearances if released and whether he/she would pose a risk of physical harm the community.

Article 1, Section XIV of the Florida Constitution provides as follows:

SECTION 14. Pretrial release and detention. Unless charged with a capital offense or an offense punishable by life imprisonment and the proof of guilt is evident or the presumption is great, every person charged with a crime or violation of municipal or county ordinance shall be entitled to pretrial release on reasonable conditions. If no conditions of release can reasonably protect the community from risk of physical harm to persons, assure the presence of the accused at trial, or assure the integrity of the judicial process, the accused may be detained.

Per Florida Statute 903.011 "Bail" and "bond" include all forms of pre-trial release including nonmonetary bond/release.

Per Florida Statute 903.03 "..., the court having jurisdiction to try the defendant shall, before indictment, affidavit, or information is filed, have jurisdiction to hear and decide all preliminary motions regarding bail...."

Florida Statute 903.046 sets forth the factors a court is to consider when deciding whether to release a defendant on ball or other conditions, and what that ball or those conditions may be.

Subject: CEER #2020005, Increase bond costs for frequent offenders

Florida Rules of Criminal Procedure are adopted by the Florida Supreme Court (as authorized by Florida Statute 25.032). These rules govern the procedure in all criminal proceedings in state courts (Fla. R. Crim P. 3.010).

Further Florida Rule of Criminal Procedure 1.131 sets forth the process the court must follow in determining a defendant's release pending trial:

The judicial officer shall impose the first of the following conditions of release that will reasonably protect the community from risk of physical harm to persons, assure the presence of the accused at trial, or assure the integrity of the judicial process; or, if no single condition gives that assurance, shall impose any combination of the following conditions:

- (A) personal recognizance of the defendant;
- (B) execution of an unsecured appearance bond in an amount specified by the judge;
- (C) placement of restrictions on the travel, association, or place of abode of the defendant during the period of release;
- (D) placement of the defendant in the custody of a designated person or organization agreeing to supervise the defendant;
- (E) execution of a bail bond with sufficient solvent sureties, or the deposit of cash in lieu thereof; provided, however, that any criminal defendant who is required to meet monetary bail or bail with any monetary component may satisfy the ball by providing an appearance bond; or
- (F) any other condition deemed reasonably necessary to assure appearance as required, including a condition requiring that the person return to custody after specified hours.

SUMMARY: The statutes and Criminal Rules of Procedure referenced above make it clear that that the authority to set bail resides with the judiciary.

RECOMMENDATION: Accept

CEER #2020006 was received by the County from Jesus Martinez.

Problem Description:

"It seems like every year and on many occasions during the years, someone comes up with an idea that will cost the taxpayers more in property taxes. Those of us who own property in Brevard County pays the majority of the funds required to operate public schools. We also pay for services including emergency services, recreation, and maintenance of our rivers and lagoons, etc. The cities also tax us, like for example Melbourne, who is now building a new police station with taxes we will have to pay for the next 30 years.

So please, the next time a newly elected commissioners comes up with a nice to do or have project that is going to cost a tax increase for those of us who are on fixed incomes, say no. 
Staff Analysis:

Chapter 200, F.S., and Chapter 12D-17, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), state the specific requirements for establishing property taxes. Florida state laws provide for public input and for governing bodies of taxing authorities to state specific reasons for proposed changes in taxes and the budget. Brevard County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) must adopt a budget and millage rates in accordance with these laws. https://floridarevenue.com/property/Documents/trimregwb.pdf

Property taxes are based on the value of property and are geographically dependent. In his problem description statement, Mr. Martinez discussed funding for schools as well as taxes levied by cities. Neither the Brevard County Public Schools nor the municipalities such as the City of Melbourne fall under the authority of the BOCC. These entities are individual taxing authorities with separately elected officials, and the BOCC has no jurisdiction over the schools or cities.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> Accept. Mr. Martinez suggested adding an additional homestead exemption for seniors. As allowed by Florida Statute 196.075, Brevard County currently provides the Limited-Income Seniors Exemption, which provides an additional exemption for residents age 65-years and older who do not exceed statemandated maximum income. CEER #2020007 was received by the County from Aamir Khan, MD, Platinum Transaction Merchant Services.

Problem Description:

"One area that can, and should be evaluated annual is the fees paid to accept cash alternative payments. If these fees are not being reviewed then rates and fees may be increasing. These fees and merchant program must be reviewed by a 22 year experienced like myself and the detailed findings discussed openly."

Recommendation Description:

"I recommend having your merchant statements reviewed by my office and lower price points discussed and contemplated."

Staff Analysis:

Merchant fees and statements are reviewed periodically by County departments and County Finance. These statements are accessible to the public, therefore independent vendors can evaluate and provide feedback to the County at any time.

Switching merchant providers would require a competitive procurement process, to include either issuing a Request for Proposal (RFP) or piggy-backing another government entity's existing contract. There are many variables that would need to be considered prior to switching merchant providers:

 Payment Card Industry (PCI) Compliance - These standards require merchants and other businesses to handle credit card information in a secure manner that helps reduce the likelihood that cardholders would have sensitive financial data stolen.

- Transition Costs Potential costs associated with switching merchant services may include purchasing new equipment. Some locations have entered into operating leases for equipment, which must also be considered.
- Software Compatibility Vendors must have the capability to integrate with various software programs that are utilized for County operations.

Brevard County's current general banking services contract expires on September 30, 2022.

<u>Staff recommendation:</u> Accept with modifications. When the County goes out for competitive procurement on our general banking services in two years, we will include merchant services in the proposal.

Good afternoon, Frank. Please see below in response to the comment/recommendation you received;

The citizen recommendation is to renovate the plaza containing Carabba's Restaurant, generally located at the northwest corner of Palm Bay Road and Babcock Street within the City of Melbourne. While the City does not have authority over the property owner to direct a specific redevelopment of this privately-owned site, the property is zoned C-1 with a General Commercial Future Land Use that would allow restaurant uses. A conditional use approval could allow the use of the property as a bar. Based upon the zoning and future land use, the property owner could pursue a redevelopment of the property in the manner the citizen recommended.

The City of Melbourne works with various businesses that come to the City with a proposal for a specific property, but the business/developer would negotiate the acquisition of the property, not the City. The City offers an Ad Valorem Tax Exemption program for large projects that will bring a large number of jobs with above average Brevard County wages, along with a substantial capital investment. The development of restaurants and bars, however, does not fit into this type of a program. The City works with smaller projects/businesses to assist them with potential economic development incentives available from other sources. The City of Melbourne would be available to talk further with the property owner about any potential redevelopment of the site.

Current problem

Cost cutting in Brevard county.

Recommendation Eliminate redundant positions to reduce costs. All county employees to work 10 hrs./day Mon. thru Thursday with Friday's off with the exception of law enforcement & fire dept. & any other employees deemed essential by the county. Close county buildings on Friday's to save electricity & money. State & federal employees would not be affected & anyone else not on the county payroll. Pay county employees every other week to save payroll costs. Eliminate all unnecessary overtime. I understand that all county students receive free breakfast & lunch regardless of family income. Only those students whose family income is below a preset figure should receive free breakfast & lunch. All other students who want breakfast & lunch from the school cafeteria should be charged a reasonable amount. These suggestions may sound harsh but it is difficult to cut costs without offending a sector of the population.

STAFF COMMENTS:

With regard to the elimination of redundant positions, staff is directed to review and evaluate their departments staffing needs during budget preparation annually. Particular attention is given to those positions remaining vacant for extended periods of time. Department justification to retain those positions is reviewed by County senior leadership during the upcoming budget process before funding for those positions are authorized.

The concept of scheduling County employees on 4/10 hour days has been evaluated and implemented on a trial bases in the past. While the opportunity for implementing this type of work schedule is available for individual departments /offices and employees if operational requirements can still be met, implementation County wide was found to not produce the savings/efficiencies anticipated as there are a number of County functions unable to limit their hours of operation.

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The impact on customer service and the publics ability to access County offices was also a concern if all government offices were able to be closed one additional day per week. Rotating staff on a 4/10 schedule while still allowing for offices to be open 5 days a week would not allow for any energy related savings. Presently, unoccupied County Offices have reduced lighting and HVAC from Friday afternoons through Monday mornings, an additional day shutting down County Offices would not allow for significant additional energy savings as HVAC system would need to continue to operate as some level.

Currently, County employees are paid every other week with direct deposit, electronic fund transfers, being the required mechanism for payroll distribution as another means of reducing payroll costs. Overtime is closely managed by Department Directors and senior managers. No overtime is authorized without prior management approval.

School lunch programs are not within the purview of the Board of County Commissioners. This is a program managed by the Brevard County School Board and the Superintendent of Schools. County Human Resources has reached out to the School Board and obtained the following information related to that program:

All students are in fact eligible under a U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) program for free breakfast. This program has been in place for over 20 years and allows for the schools to obtain USDA subsidies in accordance with reduced pay or no pay criteria to offset the cost of that program. There is no school system wide free lunch program. Free or reduced pay lunches are only available in 5 schools under a Community Eligibility Provisions Program administered by the USDA or to individual students that meet household income eligibility requirements established by the USDA qualifying them for free or reduced cost lunches.

<u>Staff recommendation:</u> It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER 2020009.

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. David W. White that described the following Problem and Recommendation:

Problem: I think Merritt Island suffers economically from the high cost to reach the large job centers of Orlando. Eliminating the tolls for Brevard residents would make the area more affordable and attractive to people who work in Orlando. As it is, the tolls operate as an economic disincentive to live here thereby decreasing economic activity in the area.

Recommendation: Eliminate the tolls for people with verified Brevard addresses.

Staff Analysis:

The roads referred to in the Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation #2020011 are a system of 120 miles of expressway roads in the Central Florida area. The expressway roads are managed by the Central Florida Expressway Authority (Authority). The Authority is an agency of the State of Florida and according to Section 348.753(c), Florida Statutes, the Authority is required to collect toll revenues and apply such revenues to the repayment of debt. Toll revenues are a pledge revenue to secure the repayment of outstanding bonds as well as maintenance and operation of the expressway road system. There are no toll roads on Brevard County road systems. However, when a state of emergency is declared, the Governor may suspend tolls on the expressway roads for the period of the emergency.

Staff Recommendation:

Staff recommends that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2020011, because the County has no jurisdiction over the tolls levied by the Central Florida Expressway Authority.

Cleanup before mowing

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Paul A. Kamus that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "All litter should be picked up before mowing. Litter is easier to collect in one big piece as opposed to smaller multiple pieces."

Recommendation: "Ask organizations to volunteer to cleanup areas of upcoming mowing locations in an effort to reduce the amount of litter in our environment. Suggest the cleanups could be part of a team building endeavor."

Staff Analysis:

There are litter reduction efforts that are already captured in programs such as the Keep Brevard Beautiful (KBB) initiative. This includes the Adopt-An-Area program that asks organizations to volunteer to remove litter within an area, including all county roads. The sponsor coordinates cleanups with KBB in advance, and that they adhere to specific litter control activities that do not conflict with the County's mowing operations.

In response to similar requests, we have previously evaluated options for sending a crew ahead of mowers to pick up litter, including using inhouse labor resources or using Sheriff's inmates. We found that both of these options would require that we create new positions as our current labor

resources are being used to mow, clean ditches, repair sidewalks and roads, and prepare roads for resurfacing.

Utilizing inmates requires that they be picked up and dropped off daily by one of our employees. Each inmate has to be supervised and would need to be provided with the appropriate equipment for litter pickup. Each supervisor will need a pick-up truck with a utility trailer for trash removal equipment. It was estimated that the initial probable cost would be \$1.2 Million in the first year to start a countywide program utilizing inmates. There would also be a cost associated with the collection and disposal of the litter, and ongoing staffing and equipment maintenance costs.

The cost would be similar if we were to hire employees specifically for picking up trash ahead of mowers as both options require a new employee, a truck w/ trailer, and equipment. If the Board of County Commissioners gave consideration for additional funds for this purpose, staff would request that we provide additional mowing before we add litter pickup. We do receive complaints about our mowing cycles, which varies between 4-8 cycles per year, depending on position vacancies, mechanical issues, weather, and other maintenance projects. With the current staff on hand, if litter were picked up before mowing, mowing cycles would drop to approximately two per year, resulting in vegetative overgrowth in the right-of-way and along road sides.

While the County takes litter control seriously for a number of reasons, at present these aforementioned options are not currently feasible due to financial constraints for the Road & Bridge Maintenance Program. The suggestion to ask organizations to volunteer as part of a team building endeavor to clean up areas is already in place within Keep Brevard Beautiful.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification. CEER #2020012, KBB and Adopt-An-Area initiatives will strive to coordinate litter pick-up activities with County mowing operators.

Question:

The following suggestion was received from Patrick Waters:

Problem Description:

The cost of removal of derelict marine vessels in Brevard Co. waterways. Currently the County pays to have the vessels removed at great cost to the taxpayer and no cost to the responsible party. The vessels also threaten additional pollution to the lagoons with the leakage of fluids and other toxic substances, as well as a danger to other boaters posing obstructions on the beaches and waterways

Recommendation Description

Pay a bounty to a Brevard Co. pre-approved, what I would call Vessel Bounty Recovery person that identifies the owner of the derelict vessels thru record and title research and allows the County to access the vessel owner the cost of removal or mandate the resident remove the vessel. Boats that have serial numbers and licenses removed can be researched by make/year of vessel. All titles have make, model and year and other details that will allow us to identify the owner. The cost of the Bounty could be set at 25% of removal cost. So the

County would only be accountable for 25% of the removal cost vs. the current 100%

Analysis:

Efforts to recover the cost of derelict vessel removal from the owners currently occur. The removal of derelict vessels from public waters is strictly controlled by Florida Statutes. Ch. 327. Vessel Safety, Ch. 376. Pollution Discharge Prevention and Control Act and Section 823.11. Removal of Derelict Vessels.

The state Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) and local law enforcement are authorized to remove vessels that are determined through a state-mandated process to be derelict. Section 376.15(a), Fla. Stat. Local governments can partner with FWC through a grant program to manage removal of derelict vessels and Brevard County has participated in the program for several years. Section 376.15(3)(d), Fla. Stat. This grant program is funded through the Florida Coastal Protection Trust Fund. Additional funding for derelict vessel removal is provided through grants from the Florida Inland Navigation District and the Tourism Development Council. County Natural Resources Management staff provides local management of these grant programs along with the support of FWC and the Sheriff's Office.

The state grant program requires FWC or local law enforcement approval for the removal of each derelict vessel. The removal process involves a vessel registration and title records search to determine the vessel owner. FWC or local law enforcement conducts this search because access to these records is not available to the public or county staff. The qualifications of the removal contractors are established by state law. Section 823.11 (3)(c), Fla. Stat.

FWC and law enforcement are authorized to recover the cost of removal of derelict vessels from the owners. Section 376.15(3)(a), Fla. Stat. Any owner who refuses to pay for the cost of removal is prohibited from subsequently obtaining a registration for the removed vessel or any other vessel or motor vehicle until the costs are repaid. Section 823.11 (3)(b), Fla. Stat. This provision does not apply to the costs incurred by non-law enforcement local government staff.

Abandoning derelict vessels in public water ways is a first-degree misdemeanor punishable by up to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine. Sections 823.11(5), 775.082, 775.083, Fla. Stat. All repayment of removal costs can be mandated through the court

system as a judgment and associated fine/penalty. All court-mandated repayments are presently added to the County's derelict vessel removal funding account.

In addition to criminal penalties, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection has independent authority to impose civil penalties of up to \$50,000 per violation, per day for the abandonment of derelict vessels in public water ways. Section 376.16, Fla. Stat.

The derelict vessels the County removes are often owned by persons who may be considered indigent and/or homeless and in many cases are deceased, which makes cost recovery very improbable or impossible.

In conformance with the funding mechanisms for derelict vessel removal, the County maintains a competitively bid procurement contract with a derelict vessel removal contractor, a licensed marine contractor meeting statutory and grant program requirements. State grant funding, in combination with locally derived boating registration fees, usually covers the majority of contractor costs. Historically, excluding hurricane response, Brevard County has spent roughly \$40,000 per year to remove about 10 derelict vessels annually with about 75% reimbursement from State grants.

With recent changes in state law that facilitated a local ordinance change, a portion of Tourist Development Tax is now allowed to be spent on lagoon restoration, therefore through a funding partnership approved by the County Commission, a local fund of \$500,000 was established last year to increase the budget for derelict vessel removals. With these funds, the removal rate has increased to about one vessel per week, which is keeping pace with the rate that law enforcement clears boats for removal by the County.

Recommendation:

The County currently funds about 25% of the removal cost of derelict vessels, with about 75% funded through reimbursement grants. County staff work with law enforcement to recover costs, whenever possible, and to leverage local funds with grants from multiple agencies. While state law allows the County or state to issue fines and file court documents to try to recover removal costs, a private bounty hunter would not have access to this process, nor would they be able to apply for grants directly.

Question:

The citizen request received by the County from Jim L. Ridenour is as follows:

"The Board of County Commissioners consistently violates Robert's Rules by allowing agenda items to be discussed without a "second" on same. I was in attendance at one meeting where there were four motions on the floor at the same time without a second and all four were being discussed. When I brought this to a County Attorney's Associates's attention after the meeting, the reply was "we have modified rules we go by". That is totally unacceptable unless we begin each meeting with a Motion to suspend the Rules and if done, then we would be in violation with the County Charter which very clearly states that all meetings will be conducted in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order."

The recommendation from Mr. Ridenour is that the Board of County Commissioner only discuss an item after a motion and second. He further recommends that each commissioner call "Point of Order and/or move for "suspension of the rules" before allowing an item to be discussed before a motion and a second.

This office has been tasked with providing input.

Analysis:

The Board of County Commissioners adopted "Board Meeting Rules and Procedures" in BCC–97 on September 5, 2019. That policy provides in Section III (A):

Ill. Rules and Procedures

A. Robert's Rules of Order and Quorum Requirements

- 1. The Board of County Commissioners hereby adopts The Scott, Foresman Robert's Rules of Order, Newly Revised, 1990 Edition and any future editions of the same, as a guideline for conducting its meetings.
- 2. No action taken by the Board of County Commissioners shall be deemed invalid or otherwise unlawful for failure to strictly comply with Robert's Rules of Order.
- 3. To the extent of any conflict between rules or policies adopted by the Board of County Commissioners and Robert's Rules of Order, the adopted rules or policies of the Board of County Commissioners shall govern.

In addition, in Section III (K) the Rules of Procedures provides:

- K. Suspension of Rules
- 1. Any provision of these rules, including the provisions of Robert's Rules of Order as incorporated by these rules, may be suspended by majority vote of the Board of County Commissioners to the extent that such a suspension would not be inconsistent with applicable law.

The chair is given the authority to conduct the meetings in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order and BCC-97 in Section III(C) of the policy entitled Board Rules and Procedures.

Many items on the agenda are public hearings and special rules apply to public hearings; for example, in quasi-judicial matters, it would be highly improper to make a motion prior to accepting public comment.

Conclusion:

In summary, while the Board of County Commissioners could in some instances follow the approach suggested by Mr. Ridenour, rigid adherence to the Robert's Rules is not required and the Board may alter procedures as it deems appropriate, so long as due process is provided as necessary.

Question:

All the time old computers and electronics are just being tossed! Piles and piles of old electronics have thin layers of gold inside them. Gold is a conductor of electricity. The gold can be extracted by using basic science. If the city was to make an electronic scrapping department, which I'd like to lead because it's my idea, the gold that would be collected could generate major revenue. We could sell this gold to jewelers so they can make gold jewelry.

The benefits of extracting gold out of electronics that are being tossed in the trash: Major revenue for the county, new gold scrapping industry, more jobs here in Brevard.

Analysis:

Current gold market values show gold value of \$1,561.65 per ounce. Computers are estimated to contain 0.008 ounces of gold on their mother board. Given these estimates, each computer is estimated to contain \$12.74 worth of gold.

During Fiscal Year 2019 the County sold 603 surplus computers. Had the County removed the gold from each computer prior to selling, that would have netted \$7,682.22. The County received \$17,210.73 from the surplus sale of the 603 surplus computers averaging \$28.54 per computer.

The process of removing the gold from computer is tedious and time consuming. It can take several hours along with using hazardous chemicals to remove the gold from one computer. Given this information, the County would need to employ specific individuals trained in the removal of gold and use of hazardous chemicals in order to implement this recommendation. The County would also need to dedicate a clean room where working with the chemicals required is not a safety hazard. All of this would far exceed the value of recycling the gold from the computers the county sells as surplus each year.

Question:

I am a local rep and work for a global company that can do an assessment to streamline virtually any wasteful process. We supply toner on a flat rate for unlimited printing as well. Government may purchase on GPO at vastly discounted pricing. You need to at least let the consultants in and perform an assessment. These are done at no charge, but the cost is time. The assessment belongs to the County and they may shop it to other vendors. If we find nothing wrong, we will tell you as well.

Analysis:

Our current contract for Multifunction Copier/Print/Fax Device Rental provides Brevard County with an all-inclusive service that covers toner, service (maintenance and repairs), and the multifunction copier unit itself. This contract is current through March 5, 2023, and it locked in pricing for five years, which provides value against price increases in the future. We are provided this service, equipment, and toner at a per page print cost of \$0.0399 for color copies, and \$0.01368 for black and white copies. Since this is a rental contract, we are not incurring the depreciation and maintenance costs that would be required to operate a toner-only service, where we had to purchase and service our own multifunction units. If Brevard County were to implement a toner-only service, we would lose out on the repair service included, and we would have to purchase our own multifunction copier units. Implementing a toner-only service would create a greater cost and burden to the County. The value that we receive by having an all-inclusive contract greatly outweighs the potential savings on toner alone. This would also create an administrative burden by causing the County to dissolve its current contract and solicit individual services and goods to replace what we would miss out on. Furthermore, this is a vendor solicitation that would go through the competitive solicitation and this vendor who recommended would be added to the supplemental vendor list to be notified that the solicitation is advertised for bid.

In the CEER #2020020 Weekly Trash Pickup, the citizen states the following:

Current Problem

Is it really necessary to have trash picked up twice a week? I've lived in a lot of places and they're all able to get by with weekly trash pickup and monthly recycle pickup.

Recommendation

Trash pickup weekly Recycle pickup monthly Brush pickup monthly This reduces the total number of pickups in a typical month from 16 to 6, resulting in significant cost reduction.

Staff offers the following:

The Board recently solicited a Request for Proposals in which the option of once a week garbage pickup was included. These options with the associated cost were presented to the Board on November 12, 2019. Based on these results, the Board directed staff to negotiate with Waste Management on the twice a week pickup option. Brevard county residents generate a large amount of recycling materials that would not be feasible to pickup once a month. The amount of recyclables varies from resident to resident, but once a month would lead to citizens not recycling once their cart becomes full. Yard waste greatly varies depending on the size of lots and the plants that the residents have. While some do not produce much yard waste there are others that have materials that are put out for collection every week. Having yard waste collection once a month would result in a greater amount of illegal dumping.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation #2020020.

Question:

The following suggestions were received from Christopher A. Janda:

Problem Description.

- Ban plastic bags.
- B. Still offer plastic bag use for up to 6 months after ban but charge a county tax. Then eventually require companies to phase them out.

Recommendation Description

Reduce environment footprint and provide temporary revenue increase.

Analysis:

A. Ban plastic bags.

Brevard is currently preempted from passing an ordinance banning plastic bags. In 2008, the Florida Legislature enacted a ban on the local regulation of plastic bags.

<u>Section 403.7033, Florida Statutes</u>. The state statute specifically prohibits local governments from enacting any regulation "regarding use, disposition, sale, prohibition, restriction, or tax of such auxiliary containers, wrappings, or disposable plastic bags."

The statute also directed the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to issue a report and recommendations on the regulation of plastic bags. The report was submitted in 2010, but the Legislature has not taken any further action. A copy of the FDEP report can be viewed here:

There are currently two bills pending before the Florida Legislature to repeal the ban on local regulation of plastic bags, auxiliary items and polystyrene containers: <u>SB 182</u> and an identical bill <u>HB 6043</u>. The 2020 Legislative session convenes on January 14th and lasts for 60 days.

B. Impose a tax on plastic bags for a six-month grace period.

The County's authority to impose taxes is limited by the Florida constitution and state law. In other words, counties do not have inherent power to impose taxes.

Authorization to impose taxes must come from the Florida constitution or state law. Art. VII. §§ 1(a), 9(a), Fla. Const. At present, there is no legal authority for local governments to impose a tax on the use of plastic bags. Even if the preemption on local government regulation in Section 403.7033 is repealed, specific statutory authority would need to be enacted to allow local taxation of plastic bags.

Beach Nourishment

RECOMMENDATION: Reject CEER #23 due to acknowledgment that investment in beach renourishment is an investment in the quality of life of County residents and provides a positive return on investment for our local economy. Also, due to previous Board consideration and action.

Question: The citizen's request received by the County from Maria Shepard of Melbourne includes the following:

Problem Description: We are throwing money away, taxpayer money, every time you renourish our beaches. Not only does this waste money, but also time, and eventually this "sand" washes back out to sea and we are back to square one again. Leave our beaches alone.

Recommendation Description: Don't renourish our beaches. We will save manpower, money, and save our natural reefs in the process.

Analysis:

Brevard County has chosen to use beach nourishment as a management tool to protect upland infrastructure, tax base, and our tourism-based economy. Maintaining public beaches is vitally important to both locals and visiting tourists. Starting in 2000, the County Commission entered into 50-year partnership agreements with the US Army Corps of Engineers for federal shore protection (aka beach nourishment) projects that now encompass roughly 21 miles of the Brevard County shoreline. In order to get Congressional authorization for these federal projects, extensive economic analysis was completed to assure the benefit to cost ratio was positive and that projects provide a net benefit not just to Brevard County but to the nation.

The benefit to cost (B:C) ratio for the remaining life of these projects varies but is consistently over 2:1, thus demonstrating the projects are economically responsible.

In addition to federal cost-share, Brevard County gets significant cost share for our beach projects from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). To evaluate the economic return on investment of the FDEP program, an independent (from FDEP) study was completed by the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research in 2015. The study determined that maintenance of beaches through beach nourishment was extremely important to the State, both from a storm protection and recovery perspective, as well as from a tourism branding perspective. The final result of the study showed the state's investment in beach nourishment provided a positive return on investment (ROI) of \$5.40 for every \$1 of state investment. This ROI provides another example that beach restoration projects in the state of Florida provide a significant positive economic return.

Here in Brevard County our beaches are enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The B:C ratio calculated by the Army Corps of Engineers for Brevard County projects as described above is typically over 2:1. It is important to note that due to federal policy these benefits considered are primarily storm damage reduction benefits rather than recreational or tourism benefits. Brevard County funds it's cost share for beach restoration with a portion of the tourism tax, a portion of this tax is collected specifically for and dedicated to beach maintenance. Brevard County receives significant economic benefits from tourist who enjoy the beaches we maintain. In 2017 tourists spent \$2.1 billion in Brevard County, which represents 9% of the County's GDP. Studies show beaches are far and away the most common activity enjoyed by tourists, so the County's investment in beaches is important to maintaining this important part of Brevard's economy.

In addition to being economically responsible, the projects are also environmentally responsible. The image below shows that ten years after nourishment the projects provide healthy dune habitat where nesting numbers for green turtles continue to set records. The newest Mid Reach project was particular designed to minimize impact to the nearshore reef and was approved by federal and state environmental agencies.

RECOMMENDATION: Accept with modification CEER #24. The County uses a competitive procurement process that provide the least cost solution for muck removal rather than awarding work through a non-competitive, sole-source contract.

Question: The citizen's request received by the County from Mary Allbright of Melbourne, owner of NMES Global, includes the following:

Problem Description: Environmental restoration is costly

Recommendation Description: Sell the muck

Analysis:

Muck covers approximately 6,700 acres of lagoon bottom in Brevard County. Muck increases turbidity, inhibits seagrass growth, promotes oxygen depletion in sediments and the water above, stores and releases nutrients, smothers the natural bottom, and destroys healthy communities of benthic organisms including vitally important seagrass beds that otherwise support abundant fisheries. When lagoon muck is resuspended by turbulence caused by wind, waves or boats, these suspended particles block sunlight and suppress seagrass growth.

Muck deposits are not just harmful to the bottom they occupy but also harm the surrounding area through nutrient flux that feeds larger algae blooms and by resuspension of fine sediments that are transported to adjacent seagrass beds. Muck mapping and flux rates for nitrogen and phosphorus have been estimated through extensive data collection at over 200 sites in the IRL in Brevard. The annual release of nutrients from decaying muck has increased over time and is currently almost equal to the pollutant load delivered annually by stormwater.

in Brevard. The annual release of nutrients from decaying muck has increased over time and is currently almost equal to the pollutant load delivered annually by stormwater.

To stop the harmful impacts of muck and jumpstart ecosystem recovery in Brevard's portion of the lagoon, muck is being removed from the system by dredging. When muck is dredged, it is dewatered and then used as a soil amendment on agricultural lands. Lagoon muck in Brevard is about 90% water and 10% solids. The solids are typically 70% silt and clay, 10% sand and 10% to 30% organic material. On land, as the organic fraction of muck decomposes, it releases nutrients that feed crops instead of feeding algae blooms. Lagoon muck also contains very small amounts of trace minerals that are helpful to crops.

NMES Global is a company that specializes in the extraction of precious metals from mining spoils and contaminated soils. They have proposed that by extracting and selling marketable minerals from our dredged muck, the County could recover some of the dredging, dewatering and disposal costs. This would be more likely for highly contaminated industrial spoils and discharge areas rather than Brevard which has seen very little industrial pollution of our waters. Local testing continues to demonstrate low to undetectable concentrations of valuable metals.

Staff has encouraged NMES Global to reach out to dredging contractors bidding on our projects. If NMES Global has the best way to reduce project costs, then by partnering with a dredging contractor, their collective bid should be lowest and win the work. To date, we have not seen a bid include them as a sub-contractor. While we can't be certain, this indicates that the winning low bid contractors have, for one reason or another, worked out a lower cost solution than what NMES Global has to offer.

Staff Recommendation:

Accept with modification CEER #24. The County uses a competitive procurement process that continues to provide the least cost solution for muck removal rather than awarding work through a non-competitive, sole-source contract. The County will continue to encourage companies that mine spoils and contaminated soils to partner with dredging contractors bidding on our project.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem concerning "The current situation regarding the housing crisis. People are dying on the streets of Brevard County and nothing is being done to address the situation."

CEER #2020025 goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, "Increase the current finding that all the churches, the homeless coalition, and other entities the [sic] only provide food and receive massive tax break for doing so and put that money towards building transitional housing and provide better services that are currently offered by county programs."

Staff offers the following:

• It appears that this CEER is seeking to change the Federal and State tax structures to eliminate religious and not-for-profit exemptions and redirect the subsequent revenues to transitional housing and other services for the homeless.

Determination of tax exemptions are approved at the federal level by the Internal Revenue Service or at the state level by the Florida Department of Revenue. This action is beyond the purview of the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners.

Determination of the uses of tax revenue that would be generated by eliminating tax exemptions would be conducted by the United States Congress at the federal level and the Florida Legislature at the state level. This action is beyond the purview of the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners.

• It also appears that the CEER seeks to increase the availability of transitional housing and other services for the homeless in Brevard County. The most recent direction, taken by the

federal, state, and local agencies tasked with providing services to this population, has been to move away from transitional housing to permanent supportive housing. Changing these agencies current policy is beyond the purview of the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners.

The Brevard Homeless Coalition (Coalition) is the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) designated Continuum of Care Lead Agency for homeless and homeless prevention services for Brevard County, is the recipient of funding to support this population, and partners with more than 70 agencies to provide services within the County.

The HUD has adopted a "Housing First" approach which shifts away from transitional housing to permanent supportive housing. This change has resulted in the Coalition also adopting this model and moving local funding and services to support it. Per the HUD (n.d.):

Housing First is an approach to quickly and successfully connect individuals and families experiencing homelessness to permanent housing without preconditions and barriers to entry, such as sobriety, treatment, or service participation requirements. Supportive services are offered to maximize housing stability and prevent returns to homelessness as opposed to addressing predetermined treatment goals prior to permanent housing entry.

Housing First emerged as an alternative to the linear approach in which people experiencing homelessness were required to first participate in and graduate from short-term residential and treatment programs before obtaining permanent housing. In the linear approach, permanent housing was offered only after a person experiencing homelessness could demonstrate that they were "ready" for housing. By contrast, Housing First is premised on the following principles:

- ➤ Homelessness is first and foremost a housing crisis and can be addressed through the provision of safe and affordable housing.
- All people experiencing homelessness, regardless of their housing history and duration of homelessness, can achieve housing stability in permanent housing. Some may need very little support for a brief period of time, while others may need more intensive and long-term supports.
- Everyone is "housing ready." Sobriety, compliance in treatment, or even criminal histories are not necessary to succeed in housing. Rather, homelessness programs and housing providers must be "consumer ready."

- Many people experience improvements in quality of life, in the areas of health, mental health, substance use, and employment, as a result of achieving housing.
- ➤ People experiencing homelessness have the right to self-determination and should be treated with dignity and respect.
- > The exact configuration of housing and services depends upon the needs and preferences of the population.¹

Even though HUD has moved funding away from transitional housing, a search of 211 Brevard's online resource database (www.211brevard.org) for Transitional Housing/Shelter shows 16 agencies still providing those services in Brevard County.

Staff recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) 2020025.

ORGANIZATION RESPONSE:

A. The emergency response location referenced in the CEER falls within City of Melbourne's jurisdiction, and service area as first responders, who would be tasked to respond; additionally, BCFR does not show an ambulance response to that address. We are not in a position to answer for the City of Melbourne Fire Department response policy or protocols; however, we can address from a County EMS perspective. BCFR's ambulances are staffed with two persons; one paramedic and one emergency medical technician. There are occasions where one of these ambulances may have a student or observer on board which would bring the total to three. In addition, a fire engine has personnel cross trained in EMS and the same medical equipment that the ambulance carries. When the ambulances are busy and have extended response times, the fire engine personnel can oftentimes get on scene first and begin rendering aid immediately.

On the scene of an emergency, each crewmember has an assigned task. Every emergency is unique and may or may

not require all of the personnel that responded. A cardiac arrest call requires more personnel than a call for abdominal pain and a simple call for service such as a lift assist may only require a few personnel.

- B. BCFR utilizes Pro Q/A dispatch software that has the ability to triage emergency calls and align the proper resources with the call type. Depending on the 911 caller's cooperation and the information provided a fire engine and ambulance may respond, or a fire engine only, or sometimes just an ambulance. This software can also make recommendations as to mode of response required; lights and siren versus no lights and siren response. BCFR's communications center is the only fire service in the county that utilizes this software for the last 4 years. We will renew our past efforts to encourage other Fire Departments in Brevard to consider utilizing Pro Q/A or similar software to enhance their operational efficiencies.
- C. Firefighters work 24 hour shifts which is common In Brevard County and across the country. These twenty-four-hour shifts require the crews to eat their meals while on duty and get rest in between emergency calls. There is no formal meal or break period for shift workers in emergency services and these firehouses are their "homes" for twenty-four hours. In order to maintain acceptable response times as close to industry standards and best practices as possible, staffing firehouses twenty-four hours a day is required. In 2019, BCFR responded to over 90,000 calls for service. This included over 900 fire related calls (structure fires, brush fires, vehicle fires) and 3,600 vehicle collisions (some requiring extrication), and over 600 hazardous materials incidents. Fires, vehicle collisions, technical rescues and hazardous

materials incidents all require the response of a fire engine. The unpredictability of these types of emergencies make it impossible to forecast when and where they will come in; another reason we choose to staff around the clock.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

Accept with modifications. Fire Rescue has already implemented software in our communications center to address unnecessary responses. BCFR's ambulance staffing and response models limit the number of responders sent to an emergency to an efficient number depending on the situation. The County will continue to renew our efforts to encourage Pro Q/A or similar software with municipalities. BCFR's shift schedule requires the firefighters to eat meals at their assigned stations.

Good afternoon Sheriff,

It is unfortunate that the call mentioned by Mr. DeWitt was not referred to us by the Titusville Police Department as we consider loose aggressive dogs a priority complaint. We did attempt to research the call, however, after researching both New World and Chameleon data bases, we could only locate 2 contacts with Mr. DeWitt, an Andrew DeWitt, or Mr. Dewitt's address on Delespine or Polaris and they were in 2002 and 2011. I can understand Mr. Dewitt's frustration at the time, however, his statement that we do not maintain a 24/7 switchboard for residents is inaccurate.

As you are aware, our Animal Control Officers work 7 days a week, from 6:00 am to 9:45 pm. After hours we have two Animal Control Officers on call and available to respond to calls for service. To request an Officer after hours the citizen merely dials our published phone number at 321-633-2024 where they will get an automated phone tree. The first option of the phone tree states, "If you have an animal

related incident that requires an immediate response press #1". The call is then automatically routed to our 24/7 Communications Center in Titusville. The Communications Center then notifies one of the Animal Control Officers that are on call.

A Supervisor will be following up with Mr. DeWitt today regarding his complaint of a dog running at large in his neighborhood.

Pedestrian Crosswalk Ticketing Cameras

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Glen Tischner that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "Drivers ignore flashing pedestrian crossing signals almost every time crosswalk button is activated. These are drivers that have in excess of a block to stop."

Recommendation: "Crosswalk ticketing cameras and signage indicating ticketing and amounts. See France Introduces Crosswalk Ticketing Cameras https://www.thenewspaper.com/news/63/6381.asp".

Staff Analysis:

Crosswalk Ticketing Cameras is a relatively new and innovative idea that has potential to address the well-known traffic safety problem of drivers failing to yield to pedestrians in crosswalks. These cameras target drivers who roll through the pavement marking line where they are required to stop for a pedestrian who has activated a signalized crossing, such as the pedestrian actuated rectangular rapid flashing beacons (RRFB's) recently installed in many locations on Highway A1A. As A1A is a state road, it is under the jurisdiction of the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). However, local municipalities have the option of utilizing and maintaining red-light running cameras at intersections along A1A.

Prior to being introduced in France, stop sign cameras were installed in Washington, D.C., for the purpose of citing drivers who don't come to a complete stop at stop signs. They currently maintain

them at nine (9) locations but they are not able to monitor and cite drivers who fail to yield to a pedestrian. It is unknown if actual crosswalk ticketing cameras currently exist in the Unites States.

A stop line camera needs to take a photo or video of the vehicle in the crosswalk during the time that the beacon is flashing AND a pedestrian is in or entering the crosswalk. While the violation can lead to automated ticketing, where the cameras would mail tickets to the registered vehicle owner of the vehicle photographed passing pedestrians in a crosswalk, the resulting photo or video is subject to being challenged and analyzed to determine if the ticket should have been issued. And similar to red-light running camera violations, there is evidence lacking in who the offender was vs. the registered owner. Any evidence must be stored in accordance with public records laws.

The camera and automated ticketing system require a controller and software, and requires knowledgeable staff to maintain and repair the system. It is questionable whether a camera and software can make the subtle distinctions and communications that occur between a driver and a pedestrian. As an example, a pedestrian with good intentions may choose to wave a vehicle through if they don't feel they are ready to enter the crosswalk, even after pressing the signal button. The driver may understand this communication and proceed, and then get a ticket.

Supporters of the cameras suggest that they reduce serious types of crashes, such as front-into-side (T-bone) type collisions. They also say that the payments for the tickets contribute to revenue. There will be some who will consider this a revenue program and not a safety improvement program.

Opponents of automated enforcement cameras suggest that the cameras contribute to rear-end collisions caused by sudden braking and that the enforcement is not transparent. In a study conducted for Suffolk County, NY, it was revealed that the number of rear-end crashes rose at red-light camera intersections by as much as 21 percent after the camera installation.

There are data storage needs, public records requests, ticket protests, and increased staffing to support the program, which all needs to be considered. This is typically managed by a private entity. Research is needed to determine if photo enforcement of a stop sign (line) violation is legally allowed in the State of Florida. There are states that only allow red light and speed cameras. Many states that have previously allowed red light cameras have now reversed the decision to prohibit the cameras. Since 2012, more red-light cameras have been discontinued than added, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

At this time, not enough data has been collected on crosswalk ticketing cameras for it to be a viable option for use at signalized pedestrian crosswalks.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER #2020029(a), and continue researching viability of this option for use at signalized pedestrian crosswalks.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document #29 was submitted by Glen Tischner to address concerns about motorists ignoring crossing signals, putting county pedestrian lives at risk.

CEER #29 goes on to recommend crosswalk ticketing cameras and signage indicating ticketing and amounts

Staff offers the following:

- On January 7, the Board voted unanimously to approve two measures directed at getting the State of Florida to remove Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon crossing signal systems that create confusion for motorists. The Board authorized a letter to Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to direct state officials to prioritize this effort and to push for a reduced speed limit along State Road A1A in the Satellite Beach/Indialantic/Indian Harbour Beach area. The Board also authorized a letter to the County's state lobbyist requesting Florida Department of Transportation's removal of the yellow flashing light systems along roads in Brevard County. The letter recommends replacement of the flashing light systems with the HAWK system, which includes a red light that would prompt motorists to stop. That letter was shared by Commission Chair Bryan Lober with Brevard County's legislative delegation, Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Kevin Thibault, and the mayors of Satellite Beach, Indialantic, Indian Harbor Beach and Melbourne Beach.
- On Monday, January 13, and on the eve of the State Legislative Session, State Representative Randy Fine filed a "Turn the Flashing Yellow Crosswalks Red" bill, which would require all flashing-yellow Crosswalks that are not located at a road intersection to be equipped with pedestrian-activated red lights by 2024.
- Letters formally submitted by Commission Chairman Bryan Lober to state Lobbyist Ronald Book and Governor DeSantis are included here.

Supporters of the cameras suggest that they reduce serious types of crashes, such as front-into-side (T-bone) type collisions. They also say that the payments for the tickets contribute to revenue. There will be some who will consider this a revenue program and not a safety improvement program.

Opponents of automated enforcement cameras suggest that the cameras contribute to rear-end collisions caused by sudden braking and that the enforcement is not transparent. In a study conducted for Suffolk County, NY, it was revealed that the number of rear-end crashes rose at red-light camera intersections by as much as 21 percent after the camera installation.

There are data storage needs, public records requests, ticket protests, and increased staffing to support the program, which all needs to be considered. This is typically managed by a private entity. Research is needed to determine if photo enforcement of a stop sign (line) violation is legally allowed in the State of Florida. There are states that only allow red light and speed cameras. Many states that have previously allowed red light cameras have now reversed the decision to prohibit the cameras. Since 2012, more red-light cameras have been discontinued than added, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

At this time, not enough data has been collected on crosswalk ticketing cameras for it to be a viable option for use at signalized pedestrian crosswalks.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER #2020029(a), and continue researching viability of this option for use at signalized pedestrian crosswalks.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document #30 was submitted by Grace Tischner to address concerns about motorists not stopping at traffic signals, putting county pedestrian lives at risk.

CEER #30 goes on to recommend crosswalk ticketing cameras to make drivers stop.

Staff offers the following:

- On January 7, the Board voted unanimously to approve two measures directed at getting the State of Florida to remove Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon crossing signal systems that create confusion for motorists. The Board authorized a letter to Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to direct state officials to prioritize this effort and to push for a reduced speed limit along State Road A1A in the Satellite Beach/Indialantic/Indian Harbour Beach area. The Board also authorized a letter to the County's state lobbyist requesting Florida Department of Transportation's removal of the yellow flashing light systems along roads in Brevard County. The letter recommends replacement of the flashing light systems with the HAWK system, which includes a red light that would prompt motorists to stop. That letter was shared by Commission Chair Bryan Lober with Brevard County's legislative delegation, Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Kevin Thibault, and the mayors of Satellite Beach, Indialantic, Indian Harbor Beach and Melbourne Beach.
- On Monday, January 13, and on the eve of the State Legislative Session, State Representative Randy Fine filed a "Turn the Flashing Yellow Crosswalks Red" bill, which would require all flashing-yellow Crosswalks that are not located at a road intersection to be equipped with pedestrian-activated red lights by 2024.
- Letters formally submitted by Commission Chairman Bryan Lober to state Lobbyist Ronald Book and Governor DeSantis are included here.

Accept with noted modifications CEER #30(b).

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. William F. Pinnix that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "Traffic congestion at the intersection of US 1 and SR 46 in Mims has increased significantly. Lines are backed up in all directions during the morning and afternoon rush hours. Vehicles in turn lanes and/or waiting to get into a turn lane block the flow of traffic on US 1. The absence of turn lanes on SR 46 creates a similar problem in that those needing to turn cannot and must wait through an additional light cycle."

Recommendation: "Widen the entire intersection, lengthen the existing turn lanes and create other turn lanes. This will improve traffic flow, reduce congestion and lessen the probability of accidents by careless and impatient drivers."

Staff Analysis:

US Highway 1 and State Road 46 in Mims are both under the jurisdiction of the state, specifically the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District Five. These roads are not under Brevard County jurisdiction.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER #2020031. While these road segments are not under the jurisdiction of Brevard County, staff will continue to provide input through the Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) and to the FDOT regarding the need for these transportation improvement projects.

RECOMMENDATION: Reject CEER #200032(a) due to acknowledgment that investment in beach renourishment is an investment in the County's quality of life and provides a positive return on investment for our local economy. Also, due to previous Board consideration and direction.

Question:

The citizen's request received by the County from Alan Brech of Palm Bay includes the following:

Problem Description:

Budget shortfalls and inability to fund necessary infrastructure maintenance projects

Recommendation Description:

a. Stop wasting money renourishing beaches.

Analysis:

Item a. **Beach Renourishment**

Brevard County has chosen to use beach nourishment as a management tool to protect upland infrastructure, tax base, and our tourism-based economy. Maintaining public beaches is vitally important to both locals and visiting tourists. Starting in 2000, the County Commission entered into 50 year partnership agreements with the US Army Corps of Engineers for federal shore protection (aka beach nourishment) projects that now encompass roughly 21 miles of the Brevard County shoreline. In order to get Congressional authorization for these federal projects, extensive economic analysis was completed to assure the benefit to cost ratio was positive and that projects provide a net benefit not just to Brevard County but to the nation. The benefit to cost (B:C) ratio for the remaining life of these projects varies but is consistently over 2:1, thus demonstrating the projects are not a waste of money.

In addition to federal cost-share, Brevard County gets significant cost share for our beach projects from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). To evaluate the economic return on investment of the FDEP program, an independent (from FDEP) study was completed by the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research in 2015. The study determined that maintenance of beaches through beach nourishment was extremely important to the State, both from a storm protection and recovery perspective, as well as from a tourism branding perspective. The final result of the study showed the state's investment in beach nourishment provided a positive return on investment (ROI) of \$5.40 for every \$1 of state investment. This ROI provides another example that beach restoration projects in the state of Florida provide a significant positive economic return.

Here in Brevard County our beaches are enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The B:C ratio calculated by the Army Corps of Engineers for Brevard County projects as described above is typically over 2:1. It is important to note that due to federal policy these benefits considered are primarily storm damage reduction benefits rather than recreational or tourism benefits. Brevard County funds it's cost share for beach restoration with a portion of the tourism bed tax, a portion of this tax is collected specifically for and dedicated to beach maintenance. Brevard County receives significant economic benefits from tourist who enjoy the beaches we maintain. In 2017 tourists spent \$2.1 billion in Brevard County, which represents 9% of the County's GDP. Studies show beaches are far and away the most common activity enjoyed by tourists, so the County's investment in beaches is important to maintaining this important part of Brevard's economy.

Staff Recommendation:

Reject CEER #32(a) due to acknowledgment that investment in beach renourishment is an investment in the County's quality of life and provides a positive return on investment for our local economy. Also, due to previous Board consideration and direction.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified several problems. This Department was tasked with analyzing and responding to the second recommendation 2020032(b). The problems identified were 1) budget shortfalls, and 2) inability to fund necessary infrastructure maintenance and improvements.

CEER #2020032(b) goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, "Factor in long term effects and public costs of development projects and make developers pay those public costs up front (i.e. impact fees)."

Staff offers the following:

Brevard County has enacted impact fee programs for Correctional Facilities, Emergency Medical Services Facilities, Fire/Rescue Facilities, Library Facilities, Public Educational Facilities, Solid Waste Disposal Facilities and Transportation Facilities. However, the rate schedule for each of these impact fee programs as currently adopted is based on 1999 cost data and appears to undervalue the true economic costs of new development. Impact Fees must be paid prior to issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy for a development so they are in fact paid "upfront". Florida Statute prohibit local governments from collecting impact fees prior to the issuance of a building permit.

Staff Recommendations:

As Impact Fees are currently collected but cost data is potentially outdated, the Board may wish to accept with modifications CEER #2020032(b) to include researching and perhaps modifying cost data.

CEER Description:

The citizen problem and recommendation description received by the County from Alan E Brech is related to budget shortfalls and the Inability to fund necessary infrastructure maintenance and improvements. The Budget Office was tasked with preparing a response for the following.

Recommendation #3 Description: "Increase taxes on Harris Corporation."

Staff Analysis:

The County's authority to impose taxes is limited by the Florida constitution and state law. In other words, counties do not have inherent power to impose taxes.

Authorization to impose taxes must come from the Florida constitution or state law Art. VII, §§ 1(a), 9(a), Fla. Const. Harris Corporation is currently being taxed to the fullest extent allowed by these laws. However, Brevard County citizens have voted to provide economic incentives to new and expanding businesses within the County, and the Board of County Commissioners adopted ordinances in 2011 (2011-42) and in 2015 (2015-23) to grant economic development ad valorem exemptions to Harris Corporation based on the company accomplishing certain milestones including capital investments and job creation. These ad valorem tax exemptions have been granted in accordance with Florida Statute 196.012 and Chapter 102 of the Code of Ordinances of Brevard County.

<u>Staff Recommendation:</u> It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER 2020032(c) because, even with the economic incentives, on the 2019 tax bill, Harris Corporation had \$3.7 million in taxes levied by Brevard County.

Current Problem

I think there is some potential savings to be had regarding trash pickup. Currently my neighborhood picks up trash twice a week and while this is nice I notice that most people don't need their trash picked up 2 times a week most of the year. In my particular neighborhood the pickup days are Tuesday and Thursday so between Tuesday night and Thursday morning its pretty hard to generate a whole additional can of trash.

Recommendation

I would recommend keeping the twice a week holiday time trash pickup but for the majority of the year I would move it down to a once a week pickup. This should allow the town to reduce their bill to Waste Management for the refuse pickup.

Staff offers the following:

The Board recently solicited a Request for Proposals in which the option of once a week garbage pickup was included. These options with the associated cost were presented to the Board on November 12, 2019. Based on these results the Board directed staff to negotiate with Waste Management on the twice a week pickup.

RECOMMENDATION: Reject. This area is preempted by the State of Florida.

Question:

The citizen request received by the County from Ms. Cara M. Wilson is as follows:

"We need to initiate a vehicle inspection program. Start with vehicles over 10 years old. Then continue with vehicles over 5 years then all every two years. In the beginning focus on brakes, tire treadwear and emissions. Then add lights, turn signals and wipers, etc. The fee would cover the expense and our roads will be much safer."

This office has been tasked with providing input as to the legality of mandating vehicle inspections at the county level.

Analysis:

The State of Florida previously required yearly comprehensive vehicle inspections until 1981. In 1991, a more limited inspection program focused on vehicle emissions began. This ended in 2000 through the passage of Ch. 2000-266, Laws of Florida.

Motor vehicles in the State of Florida are regulated by Title XXIII of the Florida Statutes.

Under Title XXIII, Florida Statutes, the Legislature created Chapter 316, known as the State Uniform Traffic Control Law. Section 316.007 F.S., titled Provisions Uniform Throughout the State states,

"The provisions of this chapter shall be applicable and uniform throughout this state and in all political subdivisions and municipalities therein, and no local authority shall enact or enforce any ordinance on a matter covered by this chapter unless expressly authorized. However, this section shall not prevent any local authority from enacting an ordinance when such enactment is necessary to vest jurisdiction of violation of this chapter in the local court."

Subject: Term Limits and Alternative Energy Incentives CEER

Date: 1/13/20

Section 316.007 F.S. expressly preempts a local government from further regulating motor vehicles contrary to the provisions found under the State Uniform Traffic Control Law. Imposing additional requirements on motor vehicles not found under Chapter 316 F.S. may subject the county to liability, including attorneys' fees, if challenged. However, law enforcement officers may still perform inspections on motor vehicles to ensure the safety and welfare of the public pursuant to the State Uniform Traffic Control Law.

316.610 F.S. Safety of Vehicle; Inspection, currently prohibits a person from operating a motor vehicle that it is in an unsafe condition. A police officer upon reasonable cause that a vehicle may be unsafe or lacks certain required safety equipment may both stop the car and provide written notice to the owner to require repair within 48 hours.

Recommendation: Reject

The County is preempted by the State from imposing additional requirements on motor vehicles, including required vehicle inspections, that are not in the Uniform Traffic Control Law. If a law enforcement officer suspects that a vehicle is unsafe, he or she may still require the owner of the vehicle to comply with State law and obtain proper working safety equipment.

Therefore, the recommendation is for Brevard County to not require drivers to obtain motor vehicle inspections prior to registration and to reject the request. The appropriate venue for a change in law to require motor vehicle inspections would be for the citizen to request a change from their local legislator.

Question: The citizen's request received by the County from Judi Fidler of Melbourne includes the following:

Problem Description: Stop burying the reef in Satellite Beach with dirt.

Recommendation Description: It would save money and keep the beach cleaner.

Analysis:

Brevard County has chosen to use beach nourishment as a management tool to protect upland infrastructure and tax base. Maintaining public beaches is vitally important to both locals and visiting tourists. In 2016, the County Commission entered into a 50 year partnership agreement with the US Army Corps of Engineers for the Mid Reach federal shore protection (aka beach nourishment) project that is now being constructed along Satellite Beach. In order to get Congressional authorization for these federal projects, extensive economic analysis was completed to assure the benefit to cost (B:C) ratio was positive and the project provides a net benefit not just to Brevard County but to the nation. The current B:C ratio for the Mid Reach is almost 3:1, thus demonstrating the project is economically responsible and in the long run saves money.

In addition to being economically responsible the projects are also environmentally responsible. The Mid Reach project is currently being constructed with beach quality sand, dredged from the ocean floor off Cape Canaveral, which meets regulatory standards. The sand is being placed in limited volume with a specific plan to minimize impact to the nearshore reefs. The

nourishment plan and sand quality standards have been approved by federal and state environmental agencies. Brevard County nourishment projects encourage healthy and "clean" beaches, as witnessed in our other previously nourished reaches which repeatedly set all time green turtle nesting records. The image below shows that ten years after nourishment the projects provide beautiful beach and dune habitat that most people, and wildlife, would prefer to undermined structures or armor that would result if beaches are not maintained.

In addition to federal cost-share, Brevard County gets significant cost share for our beach projects from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). To evaluate the economic return on investment of the FDEP program, an independent (from FDEP) study was completed by the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research in 2015. The study determined that maintenance of beaches through beach nourishment was extremely important to the State, both from a storm protection and recovery perspective, as well as from a tourism branding perspective. The final result of the study showed the state's investment in beach nourishment provided a positive return on investment (ROI) of \$5.40 for every \$1 of state investment. Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Andre Yoshida that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "A1A is currently 5 lanes with the center lane reserved for turning onto and off of A1A. Cars can be turning from/to any of the many businesses lining the road. Pedestrians try to walk across this as well. The current arrangement results in many accidents involving cars, bikes, and pedestrians. Often resulting in fatalities."

Recommendation: "I humbly request that the county put medians in the middle lane to prevent arbitrary entry of cars. Cars would always have to take a right turn and then a u-turn at the next light if they want to go in the opposite direction. The median can be lined with palm trees or decorative shrubs to greatly improve the appearance."

Staff Analysis:

Highway A1A is under the jurisdiction of the state, specifically the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District Five. This road is not under Brevard County jurisdiction and therefore we cannot modify the median along A1A.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification CEER #2020036. While this road segment is not under the jurisdiction of Brevard County, staff will continue to provide input through the Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization (TPO) and to the FDOT regarding the need for these transportation improvement projects.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document #36(b) was submitted by Andre Yoshida to address concerns about medians on A1A and the dangers imposed for pedestrians attempting to cross the street and potential fatalities.

CEER #36 goes on to recommend medians on A1A and this recommendation has been submitted to the Transportation Planning Organization.

To specifically address pedestrian crossing issue, staff offers the following:

- On January 7, the Board voted unanimously to approve two measures directed at getting the State of Florida to remove Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon crossing signal systems that create confusion for motorists. The Board authorized a letter to Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to direct state officials to prioritize this effort and to push for a reduced speed limit along State Road A1A in the Satellite Beach/Indialantic/Indian Harbour Beach area. The Board also authorized a letter to the County's state lobbyist requesting Florida Department of Transportation's removal of the yellow flashing light systems along roads in Brevard County. The letter recommends replacement of the flashing light systems with the HAWK system, which includes a red light that would prompt motorists to stop. That letter was shared by Commission Chair Bryan Lober with Brevard County's legislative delegation, Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Kevin Thibault, and the mayors of Satellite Beach, Indialantic, Indian Harbor Beach and Melbourne Beach.
- On Monday, January 13, and on the eve of the State Legislative Session, State Representative Randy Fine filed a "Turn the Flashing Yellow Crosswalks Red" bill, which would require all flashing-yellow Crosswalks that are not located at a road intersection to be equipped with pedestrian-activated red lights by 2024.
- Letters formally submitted by Commission Chairman Bryan Lober to state Lobbyist Ronald Book and Governor DeSantis are included here.

Staff Recommendation:

Accept with noted modifications.

In the CEER #2020037 End Recycling, the citizen states the following:

Current Problem

Recycling is costly for both the environment and the county not including the time and effort of everyone who puts in recycling. Plastic waste is never really recycled and the few countries that do pick it up do so poorly with rivers and streams taking plastic into the sea. Recycling paper is almost a useless as only a few paper products are recyclable and trees are a renewable resource that get regrown like wheat or potato.

Recommendation

End the Brevard recycling program or cutting it down to just aluminum and/or scrap metal only. Unlike other recyclables aluminum has an actual cash value making the program cost neutral or even profitable. The savings would be in less time and effort along with the fuel used to transport and sort plastics and papers that will end up in a landfill anyway. This saves the County money and the environment from excess waste that rather then being immediately buried transported it to a far off land to get buried and polluting the water and land as before it finally does.

Staff offers the following:

The Florida Legislature, through the Energy, Climate Change and Economic Security Act of 2008, established a statewide weight-based recycling goal of 75% by 2020. The Act instituted the 75% recycling goal, directed the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to establish a reporting protocol and directed counties to report annually. The Legislature also established interim recycling goals: 40% by 2012, 50% by 2014, 60% by 2016 and 70% by 2018. This is what, in recent times drives the recycling collection program as one of the components used to meet the goal of 75% recycling. Brevard County was not able to meet the last goal of 70% for 2018 having recycled 57%. Recycling as much as we can find markets for greatly helps us try to meet the recycling goal required by the State of Florida.

The collection trucks used for recycling are already making routes through the residential neighborhoods thereby it makes sense to collect as much of the different types of materials that can be recycled as possible.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept with modification Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation #2020037. The County sells recycled material collected that generates revenues to off-set the County's collection costs. For example, our facilities sell metals, white goods (appliances), and cardboard which in Fiscal Year 2019 derived revenues of \$156,633.

ORGANIZATION RESPONSE:

In 2019, Brevard County Fire Rescue (BCFR) units responded to approximately 90,000 total calls for service including 3,600 motor vehicle collisions. In addition, BCFR's thirty advanced life support ambulances transported over 52,000 patients to area hospitals. The nature of the schedule and the work load on these resources means these ambulance crews must eat when they can. When these units go to the grocery store in their assigned district, they are still in service and available to respond to emergencies. In emergency services, there is not a designated meal period or break for these men and women during their twenty-four hour shift so they must buy and eat meals on-the-go or as they are returning from emergency calls. Under the circumstances, having the rescue unit be mobile many times allows for a shorter response as the unit is already deployed.

Brevard County Fire Rescue is one of the most cost-efficient EMS transport providers in the State with the majority of those costs being salary and benefits. As demand for trained firefighters and paramedics increases throughout the state, we must maintain the ability to attract and retain qualified applicants with a reasonable salary and benefit package. We hope this response addresses the concerns you brought to our attention.

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

<u>Accept with modifications</u>. Brevard County Fire Rescue's call volume and population growth does not support cutting back on the service. We will continue to use efficient ways to dispatch and deploy resources including Pro Q/A which manages the resources for various to triage EMS calls and align the proper resources.

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Ms. Kathryn A. Koines that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "Not sure why safety has not been included, but I think it is so important in our county with so many visitors. Something has to be done about the bike riders in our County. They are not following the rules of the road and so many times I have seen close calls where they should have stopped at a stop sign or even worse passing during a red light. Can you pass this on to someone because it is so important for the safety of the bikers as well as the people driving the cars that encounter this situation."

Recommendation: "I honestly don't know what can be done, but the benefits would be saving lives."

Staff Analysis:

In Florida the bicycle is legally defined as a vehicle and the bicyclist is a driver. Bicyclists have the same rights to the roadways, and must obey the same traffic laws as the drivers of other vehicles. These laws include stopping for stop signs and red lights, riding with the flow of traffic, using lights at night, yielding the right-of-way when entering a roadway and yielding to pedestrians in crosswalks.

The Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization (SCTPO) facilitates bicycle education with the primary goal of improving safety and reducing transportation-related injuries and deaths by

educating bicyclists, pedestrians, and motorists on state traffic laws and the safe use of transportation infrastructure.

The SCTPO has a variety of educational programs available to interested groups. For example, in a Bicycle Rodeo event, students are taught that bicycles are vehicles and must follow the rules of the road. Students learn to look for cars and navigate through a series of obstacles. They also offer a bicycle helmet programs in partnership with the Florida Pedestrian and Bicycling Safety Resource Center, funded by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) to promote safe pedestrian and bicycling activities for citizens and visitors, young and old, by providing educational materials and information to all interested Florida residents.

In addition, Florida's 2016 Strategic Highway Safety Plan (SHSP) identified areas which reflect ongoing and emerging safety issues, including the following strategies for the pedestrian and bicycle safety emphasis area:

- Increase awareness and understanding of safety issues and compliance with traffic laws and regulations related to pedestrians and bicyclists.
- Develop and use a systemic approach to identify locations and behaviors prone to pedestrian and bicycle crashes and implement multidisciplinary countermeasures.
- Create urban and rural built environments to support and encourage safe bicycling and walking.
- Support national, state, and local legislative initiatives and policies that promote bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept CEER #2020039.

Brevard County is a partner with safety advocates of the state and the SCTPO, along with leaders at the national and state level representing Engineering, Education, Enforcement, and Emergency Services.

The Public Works Department will continue to support this initiative by representing the Engineering behind transportation planning and development processes to ensure that safety and accessibility is a priority through the design, construction, and maintenance stages of all state and local transportation projects.

Recommendation Title: Brevard County Leads the Way Through Innovation!!

Description: The current forms of public transportation (buses and trains) are wholly inadequate. I would like Brevard County to offer more Public Transportation. The needs are far reaching: those that do not have access to an automobile for a variety of reasons (health, finances, handicaps, etc) The forms may be more Buses and in particular, Virgin Trains, making a stop in Brevard County. Currently, the train plans to ride up the coast, thru Brevard County and once it reaches near State Road 528, it would turn west and travel to the Orlando airport. I have brought this stop in Brevard County up numerous times to a variety of individuals and the reasons for the reasons for growth, expansion, increased efficiency, reduced pollution, commuters, access to the port cruise lines, etc Currently, there remains no plans. This is a mistake and VERY short sighted. I would like this project to receive priority treatment and deserves to be considered.

Analysis:

We recognize that there are citizens in Brevard County who cannot provide their own transportation for a variety of reasons. Space Coast Area Transit currently offers a number of transportation options including 20 fixed bus routes, paratransit door-to-door bus service by advanced reservation, vanpools and Volunteers in Motion. Space Coast Area Transit also provides emergency transportation to Special Needs shelters when a hurricane is imminent.

Space Coast Area Transit provided over 2,300,000 rides last year on its various services. Citizens depend on the services to go to work, college, kidney dialysis, shopping, doctor's appointments, and all other life activities. The Brevard County Board of County

We agree that Virgin Trains will bring new opportunities to our community. Virgin Trains is not technically Public Transportation. It is privately owned and funded. Should there be a Virgin Trains station in Brevard County, the location of this station will be determined by Virgin Trains. The Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization supports the efforts to bring a Virgin Trains stop to Brevard County. A resolution in 2016 was passed requesting and supporting a Virgin Trains stop in Brevard County. Should Virgin Trains determine a station in Brevard County, Space Coast Area Transit will provide a bus route to that station, and participate in a multi-modal station with Virgin Trains.

The citizens can learn more about the current public transportation system and future plans by contacting Space Coast Area Transit at 321-635-7815 and the Space Coast TPO at 321-690-6890.

Space Coast Area Transit is ready to support expansion of public transportation, where funding is available, and supports the location of a Virgin Trains station in Brevard County.

Recommendation: Accept as to item (a) as provisions are already in place, reject item (b), and accept item (c) with modifications.

Question:

The citizen request received by the County from Ms. Jackie Buscemi is as follows:

- a. "I would like the current positions to have some form of term limits (two or possibly three). A[n] individual holding a government position should not seek out the position as a life-long position. As times change, people need to change."
- b. "Ask residents how often they want pick ups (For ex. Once a week, twice a week)) and recycled (once a week, once every two weeks) The prices for this service should reflect times trucks need to pick up (taking into account the number of trucks, fuel, pollution, maintenance, etc. the labor and required)."
- c. "Offer builders additional discounts or incentives to encourage and implement other forms of power (solar?) instead of using fossil fuel."

This office has been tasked with providing input as to the questions of term limits and alternative energy incentives identified as items a and c above. Item b is addressed by the Solid Waste Management Director.

Analysis:

Item a. Term limits of elected officials

The Brevard County Charter currently imposes term limits on county commissioners.

Subject: Term Limits and Alternative Energy Incentives CEER

Date: 1/8/20

Sections 2.4 and 2.5 of the Brevard County Charter state:

Section 2.4

Each Commissioner shall be elected and serve for four (4) years, beginning on the second. Tuesday after election, and continuing after such term until a successor is elected and qualified. The terms shall be staggered as presently provided by general law. No county commissioner shall serve more than two (2) consecutive terms.

Section 2.5

Commissioners shall qualify for election at the same time and in the same manner provided by general law for county commissioners in non-charter counties. No person may qualify as a candidate or appear on the ballot for re-election to the office of county commissioner if, by the end of the current term of office, the person will have served (or, but for resignation, would have served) as a county commissioner for two consecutive terms.

Both Section 2.4 and Section 2.5 of the Brevard County Charter impose a term limit and expressly prohibit a county commissioner from serving more than two consecutive terms. Article VIII(1)(d) of the Florida Constitution and Section 2.4 of the Brevard County Charter establish a four-year term for county commissioners.

Under the current laws, a county commissioner cannot serve for more than two consecutive terms or remain in office for more than eight consecutive years.

Item b. Asking Citizens for Preference on Frequency of Garbage Pickups

The Board recently solicited a Request for Proposals in which the option of once a week garbage pickup was included. These options with the associated cost were presented to the Board on November 12, 2019. Based on these results the Board directed staff to negotiate with Waste Management on a twice a week garbage pickup.

Item c. Incentives to Encourage Alternative Energy Sources

The County currently has several initiatives to incentivize the use of alternative green energy sources. For the past two consecutive years, the Board of County Commissioners have adopted resolutions exempting permit fees for solar photovoltaic installations. This was done most recently in Resolution 19-027. These exemptions incentivize the installation of solar panels by waiving the permit fee for homeowners and contractors. In fiscal year 2018, this incentive saved homeowners more than \$90,000.

The County has also taken several steps to coordinate working and planning groups to address clean energy sources and their implementation. For more information on these steps, please refer to the response prepared by Planning and Development Director Tad Calkins.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified several problems. This Department was tasked with analyzing and responding to the third item 2020041(c): Solar power represents a very small amount of the energy required to operate homes and businesses.

CEER #2020041(c) goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, "Offer builders additional discounts or incentives to encourage and implement other forms of power (solar?) instead of using fossil fuel."

Staff offers the following:

In recent years, the Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) has approved many initiatives and partnerships that involve the promotion of clean energy sources, including solar installations. These initiatives represent Brevard County's multi-tiered commitment to alternative energy sources, sustainability and more broadly, regional resiliency. Three such programs are detailed below. Combined, they have immediate and long-term impact with regards to advanced energy technology.

- 1. On March 20, 2018, the BOCC adopted a resolution exempting permitting fees for solar photovoltaic (PV) installations. On February 26, 2019, the exemption was renewed, saving homeowners and contractors an average \$189 per permit. Since the program's inception, more than 480 applicants have received the exemption as part of the permitting process with program savings to the citizens being more than \$90,000. Lastly, PV permits increased 4% year-over-year in 2019.
- On November 19, 2019, the BOCC revised a resolution regarding the implementation of the Workgroup for Innovative Solar Energy Resources (WISER). It is anticipated that WISER will meet February – July 2020 and provide recommendations to the BOCC in August 2020 and have three main objectives pursuant to resolution 19-238:

CEER #2020041(c) January 14, 2020

- Develop a cost-benefit analysis and plan for County government to transition to clean-energy sources.
- Make recommendations on improving public access to economically beneficial clean-energy technology.
- Identify policies and practices that serve as barriers to the adoption of advanced energy technology within the County, and make recommendations on policy revisions.
- 3. On October 23, 2019, Brevard County representatives attended the signing ceremony for the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council's (ECFRPC) Regional Resilience Collaborative Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The MOU, adopted by the BOCC on September 5, 2019, recognizes that the success of a regional resilience collaborative depends on participation and commitment from cooperative networks and partnerships with local governments, federal, state and regional agencies, educational institutions, non-government organizations, businesses, and other stakeholders. The Collaborative represents more than two dozen such stakeholders focused on advancing the three pillars identified under the resilience umbrella; (people) Health + Equity, (places) Build Infrastructure + Natural Environment, and (prosperity) economic resilience. Woven throughout those pillars will be a reduction of the carbon footprint, risks and vulnerabilities utilizing emergency management, and increasing efforts toward sustainability, region wide. We are hopeful that as the Collaborative's work progresses, implementable solutions will be identified for Brevard County and other stakeholders that address encouraging solar installations and reducing barriers to similar technology.

As WISER and the ECFRPC Regional Resiliency Collaborative return recommendations and implementable solutions, it is anticipated, given the Board's previous approval of other alternative energy initiatives, that citizens will continue to realize Brevard County Government's commitment to clean energy, sustainability and resiliency.

Staff Recommendations:

Since the solar PV installation fee exemption is currently in place, the Board may wish to accept with modifications CEER #2020041(c) to include WISER and ECFRPC MOU initiatives.

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Ehren Ullein that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "Old and antiquated lighting applications (interior & exterior) that provide a poor quality of light, while consuming a high volume of wattage. On-going maintenance of said applications is wasting money, compared to quality LED lighting that saves the end-user money and pays for itself. We live in the lightning capitol of the world.....are our facilities, and the equipment therein, protected against direct & indirect strikes?"

Recommendation: "I have attached a PowerPoint presentation that expands on these points/products. We provide our clients with a free energy audit that identifies 10-yr ROI & net savings, green house gases saved, and we have LED lighting applications (interior & exterior applications, retrofit and replacement options) that have up to a 10-yr non-prorated warranty in our name. We are not an ESCO, so you keep 100% of the savings!! This information can be used to show Brevard residents current energy costs vs post-conversion energy usage (savings), as well as tout greenhouse gas savings, as this information comes directly from epa.gov. You might be able to create a savings ticker, similar to the federal debt ticker, that shows/tracks savings across all Brevard County buildings and properties. We also work with a local company that specializes in smart-city technology and our technologies are compatible and currently active in Brevard County. We have a piggy-backable contract with the School Board of St. Johns County, FL. The POM PowerGuard protects buildings/facilities from in-direct & direct lightning strikes, as well as

harmonizing power spikes and power surges. This product works incredibly well with VFD issues related with chillers and water treatment stations (letter from the City of Fort Lauderdale contained within the PP). This application also pays for itself, as it also saves energy, while protecting the facility, and its equipment, from lightning. All of our applications & partnerships revolve around and are geared toward energy savings/conservation. We are in the business of saving our clients money, by means of energy efficiency. That being said...what you do with the monies saved is up to you. Tie up pension plans, use as bonuses, off-set rising healthcare plans, etc.. that might also be something you ask residents of Brevard as well. Thank you for the opportunity and forum to share this idea. You have numerous local businesses here to help achieve and work with you regarding your fiduciary responsibility to this beautiful county."

Staff Analysis:

Brevard County presently utilizes quality, energy-saving lighting for a variety of interior and exterior applications in an effort to reduce cost and energy usage and minimize maintenance efforts. We completed a \$15 Million Energy Savings Performance Contract in 2015. Energy audits were performed on facilities throughout Brevard County covering every department in the County which represented over 3.5 million square feet of occupied space. Inventories of interior and exterior lighting fixtures, plumbing fixtures and HVAC equipment were compiled. Data was collected on temperature, humidity and occupied times.

Over 1,000 electric, water and gas utility accounts were analyzed for each facility and bills were collected for at least a full year of consumption on accounts. Energy modeling software was then used to create utility bill calibrated energy models that forecasted energy savings. Lighting was replaced or enhanced with a combination of 25wT8 bulbs & low energy ballasts, induction lighting, dual technology occupancy sensors and LED lighting. The Facilities Program within the Public Works Department has also completed several LED parking lot projects including Harry T & Harriett V Moore Justice Center, BCGC Viera, Space Coast Area Transit, Library Services and numerous other Brevard County locations.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept CEER #2020042, the County implemented an energy saving project 2015.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem regarding "... the lack of resources and facilities that are suitable for children with special needs." and that "... it is essential that these realm [sic] of services are extended throughout the county."

Staff offers the following:

It appears that this CEER, based upon its title and the narrative that was submitted, is recommending the creation of a Special Needs Daycare (Pediatric) in the northern portion of Brevard County.

Daycare Facilities of all types, including special needs, are typically owned and operated by individuals, private businesses, or not-for-profit organizations and are licensed by the Florida Department of Children and Families (providers with a religious affiliation are exempt from licensing). These facilities are not under the purview of Brevard County. No action is required on the part of the Board of County Commissioners.

Recommendation Title Felons Rehire Programs

Current problem: Brevard has a large number of felons that have completed their sentence and or currently under parole or probation that have immense difficulty finding and retaining employment which causes of domino effect on their lives. They are unable to find housing either due to their lack of income or background, unable to provide for their children and a plethora of other things. And also resulting back to their previous habits that landed them in jail or prison to begin with. Which forces allot of our natives to search for employment out of the county as well out of the state.

Recommendation: The morale and welfare improving within the community, increase in employment, decrease in criminal activity, decreased poverished households, decline in suicides just to name a few.

STAFF COMMENTS:

Brevard County does not have a policy against hiring felons that have completed their sentences or those currently on parole or probation. The County currently advertises its open positions in various venues that are accessible as well as utilizing a job service that specifically targets minority and underserved populations looking for employment, including those organizations that would target individuals released from incarceration. Brevard County Administrative Order 5 (AO-5), attached hereto, outlines the parameters utilized to evaluate a job applicant's eligibility for hire when he/she has been convicted of a crime.

Consistent with F.S. 112.011, no job applicant is disqualified from employment by the County solely because of a prior conviction for a crime. However, a person may be denied employment by the County by reason of the prior conviction for a crime if the crime was a felony or first-degree misdemeanor and directly related to the position

of employment sought when that employment brings the employee in contact with "at-risk" populations served by the County.

Title: Background Investigation Checks

I. PURPOSE AND SCOPE

To establish a consistent, county-wide procedure for conducting background investigation checks.

II. <u>DEFINITIONS AND REFERENCES</u>

Applicant – An external applicant or volunteer being considered for a position or a current employee being considered for a position with a higher security level as the result of a promotion, transfer or demotion.

- B. At-Risk Population- Children, elderly, disabled, and those whom cannot defend themselves. Example of settings in which individuals come into contact with atrisk populations include, but are not limited to:
 - Daycare: senior citizen centers and community day programs for children.
 - Group Home: placements for children under the care of the State as a result of abuse or neglect or as a consequence of delinquency.
 - Program activities involving children on school property.
 - Shelters: homeless, domestic violence or special needs emergency shelters.
 - Youth development programs.
 - Volunteer programs for the elderly or individuals with disabilities; such as, Meals on Wheels or other community/volunteer programs.
 - Library areas/programs designated for children.
 - Park areas/programs designated for children.
- C. Background Investigation Handbook a handbook with detailed information about how to complete and interpret the background checks.
- D. Background Checklist a form used to track the results of the background checks performed by the Department/Office.

E. Conviction – defined as a law violation where there has been a determination of guilt as a result of a trial or the entry of a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, regardless of whether adjudication is withheld.

NOTE: A "yes" answer to the question of law violation on the application will not automatically bar the applicant from employment. The nature, job-relatedness, severity and date of the offense in relation to the position for which they are applying will be considered.

F. Recertification – Frequency which each Department/Office reinvestigates each employee's or volunteer's criminal history.

G. SECURITY LEVELS:

High Level (Level I) – Applies to an employee or volunteer who has unsupervised access and/or contact with individuals identified as being in the atrisk population.

Moderate Level (Level II) — Applies to an employee or volunteer who has supervised access and/or contact with individuals identified as being in the at-risk population.

Low Level (Level III) — All other employees or volunteers who do not fit into the High or Moderate security levels.

- H. VECHS an acronym for the Volunteer & Employee Criminal History System at the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE). The VECHS program agreement allows Brevard County to submit state and national checks for employees and volunteers, as needed.
- I. F.S. 112.011 Felon; removal of disqualifications for employment, exceptions.
- J. F.S. 943.04351 Search of registration information regarding sexual predators and sexual offenders required prior to appointment or employment.

III. RESPONSIBILITIES

- A. Each Department/Office Director shall establish a background investigation check procedure which ensures that the guidelines in this Administrative Order are met.
- B. Each Department/Office will utilize the guidelines in this Administrative Order or will adhere to statutory/contractual requirements, whichever is more stringent.
- C. Each Department/Office shall be responsible for verifying that each applicant

meets the requirements for the job, including educational and/or licensing verification, driver's license check.

D. Each Department/Office shall be responsible for checking and documenting a total of three (3) of the applicant's employment and/or personal references. Document if the applicant has insufficient work history (i.e.; a student with no experience or someone returning to the workforce after a long absence) or is a volunteer. Due diligence must be used in obtaining these references, but if no response is received, documentation should be made of what efforts were made. Reference checks are not mandatory for those temporary employees hired on a seasonal basis.

The Background Investigation Handbook has detailed instructions and reference forms to be used in checking these references.

- E. Each Department/Office shall perform the required minimum criminal background investigation checks at the appropriate security level for applicants under final consideration and document the results on the Background Checklist, which shall be provided to the Office of Human Resources with the background documents.
 - 1. High-Level Security Check (Level I):
 - Fingerprints submit fingerprints to FDLE under the VECHS
 agreement using digital fingerprint machine or using the fingerprint
 card provided for FDLE and National FBI criminal investigation
 check.

 - 2. Moderate-Level Security Check (Level II):

 - Out-of-State criminal checks based on past seven (7) years address history (on-line checks may be done, if available), or alternatively a national background check.
 - 3. Low-Level Security Check (Level III):
 - Brevard County Clerk E-Facts: www.brevardclerk.us
 - National Sex Offender Public Website: www.nsopw.gov
 - Florida Department of Corrections: www.dc.state.fl.us
 - Out-of-Area criminal checks based on past two (2) years address history (on-line checks may be done, if available).
 - F. Applicants under final consideration for positions classified as high security level shall be subject to the following guidelines for criminal background checks.

Consistent with F.S. 112.011, a person shall not be disqualified from employment by the County solely because of a prior conviction for a crime. However, a person may be denied employment by the County by reason of the prior conviction for a crime if the crime was a felony or first degree misdemeanor and directly related to the position of employment sought.

- A prior conviction of any of the following criminal offenses, if a felony
 or first degree misdemeanor, is considered to be directly related to any
 high level security position, irregardless of when it occurred, and will
 disqualify an applicant from further consideration:
 - Child Abuse, Neglect or Abandonment
 - Extortion
 - Extreme Violence (Aggravated Assault/Aggravated Battery, Murder, Attempted Murder, Vehicular Homicide)
 - False Imprisonment
 - Hate Crime
 - Indecent Exposure if Sexual in Nature
 - Kidnapping
 - Manslaughter
 - Child Pornography
 - Illegal Possession of Guns or Weapons
 - Robbery
 - Sale of Controlled Substance
 - Sexual Offense (Lewd and Lascivious Sexual Battery)
 - Any Offense of similar nature and severity to those listed above (contact the County Attorney's Office if there is a question)
- 2. A prior conviction of any of the following criminal offenses, if a felony or first degree misdemeanor, is considered to be directly related to any high level security position if it occurred within five (5) years of the date of the background check, and will disqualify an applicant from further consideration:
 - Battery/Assault
 - Domestic Violence
 - Misdemeanor Drug and/or Paraphernalia
 - Resisting Arrest with Violence
 - Sale of Alcohol or Tobacco to a Minor
 - Contributing to the Delinquency of a Minor
 - Any Offense of similar nature and severity to those listed above (contact the County Attorney's Office if there is a question)

A prior conviction of one of the above criminal offenses, if a felony or first degree misdemeanor, that occurred beyond five (5) years of the date of the background check, shall be carefully reviewed by the appointing authority on a case-by-case basis to determine if it is directly related to a high security level position and the applicant is disqualified from further consideration.

- 3. A prior conviction for any of the following criminal offenses, if a felony or a first degree misdemeanor, shall be carefully reviewed by the appointing authority on a case-by-case basis to determine if it is directly related to a high security level position and if the applicant is disqualified from further consideration:
 - Disorderly Conduct/Trespassing
 - Driving While Under the Influence (DUI), one incident only (more than one must show proof of rehabilitation)
 - Petty Theft
 - Worthless Checks
 - Other Crimes
 - Any Offense of similar nature and severity to those listed above (contact the County Attorney's Office if there is a question)
- G. When determining whether a prior criminal conviction for any of the criminal offenses listed in Section F above are directly related to a high, moderate or low level security position, an appointing authority shall take the following factors into consideration:
 - The classification of the crime as a felony or first degree misdemeanor
 - The relationship between the incident and the type of employment or service that the applicant will provide.
 - The nature, severity, number, and consequences of the incidents disclosed.
 - The amount of time elapsed since the incident(s) occurred.
 - The applicant's efforts and success at rehabilitation.
 - The age of the applicant at the time of the incident.

If there is any question about whether the criminal offense is directly related to the position, contact the County Attorney's Office.

H. After the background investigation checks are satisfactorily completed, the Department/Office can initiate the request for the applicant to be hired to a paid position or coordinate a start date for a volunteer placement.

IV. RESERVATION OF AUTHORITY

The authority to issue and/or revise this Administrative Order is reserved for the County Manager.

(B) There are 33.5 miles of bike trails built and 363 miles of "existing" bicycle facilities such as onstreet marked bike lanes, marked sharrows, buffered bike lanes, cycle tracks and shoulders with a width of 5' or greater" in Brevard County. These mileages include the entirety of Brevard County not just unincorporated. Parks and Recreation contracts out and issues permits for water activities in certain parks. These contractors provide water activities such as non-motorized boat tours, motorized boat tours and air boat tours. We also have an agreement with Island Watercraft which rents beach /water equipment at Lori Wilson and the County has a Recreation Partner Agreement with a model sailing club.

- (C) The Brevard County Utility Services Department constantly monitors the collection system along with assessing its integrity in order to address areas of concern by either repair or replacement. In addition to our efforts of maintaining the existing system we are constantly moving forward in connecting homes currently on septic to a sewer system. This effort has been proven to improve the environment.
- (D) Through voter initiatives, the County has acquired over 2,200 acres of beach and riverfront property that is currently in the Parks & Recreation land inventory. Some of the properties were developed with amenities (parks) and some of the properties remain undeveloped. The Environmentally Endangered Lands EEL Program was established in 1990 to protect the natural habitats of Brevard County by acquiring environmentally sensitive lands for conservation, passive recreation and environmental education. This initiative was so important to the voters in Brevard County they voted to tax themselves for the acquisition and maintenance of Brevard's natural areas. The EEL currently programs - owns and/or manages over 17,000 acres of property throughout Brevard County. In 1984, the voters of Brevard County overwhelmingly approved a referendum which called for a ½ mil increase in ad valorem taxes to finance a bond issue for acquisition and subsequent development of beach and riverfront property in the County. Six categories of river access property to be purchased were identified - scenic preservation, boating access, community river park, urban district river par, river trails and conservation areas. Five categories for oceanfront land to be purchased were identified - neighborhood beach walkway, neighborhood beach park, community beach park, regional beach park, and a barrier island park.
- (E) The UF/IFAS Extension Service's Urban Horticulture Agent's programing focuses on Eco Friendly landscaping by promoting soil health to produce healthier plants, nutritious food and to protect water quality. Information on how to improve soil health, along with Florida-Friendly Landscaping (this is UF's trademarked program which teaches Eco Friendly practices) practices are disseminated and taught in multiple ways, including the following:
 - 1) A Florida-Friendly Landscaping class series (8 weeks) and the Be Healthy: Grow Your Own Food class series (4 weeks) are held every year.
 - 2) My Brevard Yard site visits are conducted at residents' homes. The site visit includes a soil test, irrigation water test if the source is a well and an irrigation zone is calibrated and all their questions are answered. When the soil test is received a fertilizer recommendation is created, based on the soil test, and additional information is provided, along with the soil test results and the fertilizer recommendation, on practices to improve and maintain soil health. The agent works with others within the county as well as the cities of Melbourne, Satellite Beach, Palm Bay and Kathy Hill of the Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program to plan and implement a free, annual event called the Florida-Friendly Landscaping Seminar. This year's event was held on Saturday, February 8th, at the Eau Gallie High School Auditorium. Both Kathy Hill and the Urban Horticulture Agent presented at this annual event.
 - 3) Soil health information, to support Eco Friendly Landscaping, is also disseminated through weekly articles in the Sunday, Florida Today paper, email questions and phone calls from residents.
 - 4) The Urban Horticulture Agent also runs the Master Gardener program. In this program area, interested residents are trained, once a year, as Master

Gardeners by attending a 10-week series of classes. Master Gardeners volunteer their time to assist residents with gardening and pest questions. A group of Master Gardeners also helps the agent by conducting My Brevard Yard site visits. The Master Gardeners also staff our Cocoa office and answer phone calls and walk-ins who have gardening/pest questions. In addition, they also staff 14 Master Gardener clinics, which are held at locations throughout the county.

(F) Pertaining to litter enforcement, the description provided relates to roadways and waterways, with litter escaping moving vehicles and boats. Law enforcement such as the Brevard County Sheriff's Office, and all municipal and state agencies including Florida Highway Patrol and Marine Patrol, are authorized to enforce state statute 403.413, the "Florida Litter Law", and would be the appropriate authority for the described concerns. Additionally, the Brevard County Natural Resources Management Department (NRMD) has a Derelict Vessel Program in place whereby the owner or lienholder is billed for storage and removal costs. Kiwanis Island Tennis Courts

Recommendation: Accept

Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document # 2020047 was submitted by Mr. Tommy Blair. Mr. Blair recommends "repair and paint" the Kiwanis Island Park tennis courts.

Staff offers the following:

Regular maintenance, such as blowing off the courts, trash removal and weed control, is performed weekly at the Kiwanis Island tennis courts. The most recent upgrade to the eight tennis courts was in June 2019. Thirty-two new LED lights, including new brackets, were installed.

Prior to the December 2019 holidays, staff and the Kiwanis Island Park contracted tennis instructor walked the tennis courts noting needed maintenance. The net stanchion poles were identified for repair. Temporary repairs were made to the net stanchion poles on January 11, 2020. On January 15, 2020 staff met with NIDY Sports – Tennis Court Construction to discuss a stanchion product that will withstand the corrosive salt environment that exists on Merritt Island. We will be replacing the poles in 2020.

Staff recognizes the need to resurface the eight tennis courts and will add the resurfacing of all eight tennis courts in the budget for Fiscal Year 2020/2021. The NIDY Sports' representative did not recommend painting the lines as he felt that the lines could not be re-painted over the

existing lines without distracting variation (they could not paint them exactly over the current lines) and recommended that the new lines be incorporated into the re-surfacing project.

Adopt a Crosswalk

Citizen Recommendation:

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) was submitted to Brevard County from Mr. Douglas Rowlett that described the following Problem and Recommendation.

Problem: "Reducing deaths that occur when pedestrians cross roads using established crosswalks."

Recommendation: "My thought would be to create an Adopt a Crosswalk Program that might be administered similar to the Adopt a Road Program. This would help create local community or neighborhood ownership in many-most crosswalks in Brevard County as well as cities-if cities did the same. Sponsors would get signs put up with their names on them-placed by each crosswalk they sponsor. Sponsors could be local businesses or non-profits, community groups, school groups etc. They might be able to raise funds locally to provide special items for their crosswalk such as the crossing flags. Maybe they would be able to raise funds to help put up the electric flashing light crossing or new reflective signs, or funds to help ensure that the sponsored crosswalk is painted often enough to be kept looking new and bright and visible day and night to drivers in vehicles. Sponsors could be sought at the same time new crosswalks are proposed which would help to enhance local support/involvement and may provide additional funds to enhance the features planned for each specific crosswalk proposed. Program could be administered by Public Safety Department or maybe even a Public Safety Group. Seems like this could save the county money in the long run by having locals keeping a watchful eye out for their crosswalks, maybe raise funds that the county would not need to to raise- to maintain or upgrade each crosswalk. It would also create local pride and likely could result in lives saved-which would be the biggest reward for sure."

Staff Analysis:

Brevard County Traffic Operations has received a few requests for pedestrian flags at existing marked midblock (uncontrolled) crosswalks on county roads as well as on Highway A1A, a state road. We currently maintain pedestrian flag installations at two marked midblock (uncontrolled) crosswalks along Riverside Drive in the unincorporated area north of Indialantic. They have generated positive feedback; however, there is concern that the future maintenance responsibility will cause a burden on staff as the program expands countywide. For that reason, we need to develop guidelines for future installations. For the two locations on Riverside Drive, it is a convenient location for us to monitor the status regularly and we have replaced the occasional missing flags. Staff is concerned about the future ongoing maintenance as the idea expands to crosswalks throughout the county and while we continue to struggle with inadequate staffing levels.

The initial installation on Riverside Drive was in August 2018 and cost approximately \$200.00 per location. The cost included orange flags on wooden dowels which we modified to add high intensity reflective material, containers with drain holes to hold the flags, and crosswalk flag instructional signage. Below is an image of one of these locations.



In the case of Highway A1A, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has advised that they will allow the County to install the flags and holders within the state road right-of-way at an existing marked crosswalk as long as there is a plan to maintain the items. There is language in Florida statutes that requires the local government to submit this type of request to FDOT and agree to accept maintenance responsibility. For example, there are locations on Highway A1A within the Town of Melbourne Beach where the town has obtained FDOT approval and agreed to maintain the flag systems.

Alternative pedestrian safety improvements could be the installation of flashing beacons; however, that solution is often determined to be cost prohibitive and the actual improvement to safety is uncertain. Brevard County Traffic Operations has previously denied the installation of flashing beacons at uncontrolled crosswalks on county roads for various reasons, including the primary concern that they give a false sense of security to the pedestrian.

Brevard County Traffic Operations has considered developing a pedestrian flag pilot program where we partner with a sponsor, similar to an Adopt a Crosswalk Program, with the understanding that they would be responsible for monitoring the flags and purchasing replacements as needed. We would provide the initial installation and would also continue to maintain the signage and pavement markings. We've received positive feedback on this idea and it is our desire to develop this idea as soon as time allows.

Highway A1A is under the jurisdiction of the state, specifically the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT), District Five. On January 7, the Board voted unanimously to approve two measures directed at getting the State of Florida to remove Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon

The Board authorized a letter to Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to direct state officials to prioritize this effort and to push for a reduced speed limit along State Road A1A in the Satellite Beach/Indialantic/Indian Harbour Beach area. The Board also authorized a letter to the County's state lobbyist requesting Florida Department of Transportation's removal of the yellow flashing light systems along roads in Brevard County. The letter recommends replacement of the flashing light systems with the HAWK system, which includes a red light that would prompt motorists to stop. That letter was shared by Commission Chair Bryan Lober with Brevard County's legislative delegation, Florida Department of Transportation Secretary Kevin Thibault, and the mayors of Satellite Beach, Indialantic, Indian Harbor Beach and Melbourne Beach.

On Monday, January, 13, and on the eve of the State Legislative Session, State Representative Randy Fine filed a "Turn the Flashing Yellow Crosswalks Red" bill, which would require all flashing-yellow Crosswalks that are not located at a road intersection to be equipped with pedestrian-activated red lights by 2024.

Letters formally submitted by Commission Chairman Bryan Lober to state Lobbyist Ronald Book and Governor DeSantis are included here.

RECOMMENDATION: Reject CEER #49 due to acknowledgment that investment in beach renourishment is an investment in the quality of life of County residents and provides a positive return on investment for our local economy. Also, dur to previous Board consideration and action.

Question: The citizen's request received by the County from Lea Williamson of Melbourne includes the following:

Problem Description: Stop dumping money on the beach to be washed into the ocean.

Recommendation Description: N/A

Analysis:

Brevard County has chosen to use beach nourishment as a management tool to protect upland infrastructure, tax base, and our tourism-based economy. Maintaining public beaches is vitally important to both locals and visiting tourists. Starting in 2000, the County Commission entered into 50-year partnership agreements with the US Army Corps of Engineers for federal shore protection (aka beach nourishment) projects that now encompass roughly 21 miles of the Brevard County shoreline. In order to get Congressional authorization for these federal projects, extensive economic analysis was completed to assure the benefit to cost ratio was positive and that projects provide a net benefit not just to Brevard County but to the nation. The benefit to cost (B:C) ratio for the remaining life of these projects varies but is consistently over 2:1, thus demonstrating the projects are economically responsible.

In addition to federal cost-share, Brevard County gets significant cost share for our beach projects from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP). To evaluate the economic return on investment of the FDEP program, an independent (from FDEP) study was completed by the Florida Office of Economic and Demographic Research in 2015. The study determined that maintenance of beaches through beach nourishment was extremely important to the State, both from a storm protection and recovery perspective, as well as from a tourism branding perspective. The final result of the study showed the state's investment in beach nourishment provided a positive return on investment (ROI) of \$5.40 for every \$1 of state investment. This ROI provides another example that beach restoration projects in the state of Florida provide a significant positive economic return.

Here in Brevard County our beaches are enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The B:C ratio calculated by the Army Corps of Engineers for Brevard County projects as described above is typically over 2:1. It is important to note that due to federal policy these benefits considered are primarily storm damage reduction benefits rather than recreational or tourism benefits. Brevard County funds it's cost share for beach restoration with a portion of the tourism bed tax, a portion of this tax is collected specifically for and dedicated to beach maintenance. Brevard County receives significant economic benefits from tourist who enjoy the beaches we maintain. In 2017 tourists spent \$2.1 billion in Brevard County, which represents 9% of the County's GDP. Studies show beaches are far and away the most common activity enjoyed by tourists, so the County's investment in beaches is important to maintaining this important part of Brevard's economy.

In addition to being economically responsible, the projects are also environmentally responsible. The image below shows that ten years after nourishment the projects provide healthy dune habitat where nesting numbers for green turtles continue to set records. The newest Mid Reach project was particular designed to minimize impact to the nearshore reef and was approved by federal and state environmental agencies.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified an issue with the Property Appraiser's Office Homestead Exemption on-line process. The Problem Description noted the lack of ability to check the status of the submitted exemption request.

CEER #2020050 goes on to recommend, as a potential solution, the following:

"Recommendation is for the web-site/sites for all county applications are redesigned, to be full purpose from start of the application process to the decision. With all applications in one area it would be quicker and easier for residents to file and have the ability to upload documents. It would also streamline paperwork for the resident and the county reducing the amount of printed materials. Ultimately this would make all residents of the county have peace of mind that all the information they could or should need is available at their fingertips now and for generations to come."

Information Technology Department staff, under the Board of County Commissioners, reviewed the recommendation extensively and concluded:

The recommendation has been deferred to the Property Appraiser's Office Information Technology Department. Although, this appears to be a process-oriented matter rather than a technical issue and thus our department can be of limited benefit to the situation. We are happy to extend any assistance to the Office of the Property Appraiser in any way possible.

Constitutional Offices, such as the Property Appraiser, operate independently of the County Board of County Commissioners. As such, their websites and applications are also independent although all offices provide cross-linking of their resources where prudent and convenient for the residents of Brevard County. 125 Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation #2020050 January 13, 2020

Brevard County Board of County Commissioners has recently updated the County website in order to promote transparency and convenience for County residents. Extensive improvements to allow easier access to resources for disabled persons has been a priority for the past couple of years and we are approaching our goal of being fully compliant with Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) 508. With ever changing technologies, websites and applications require continuous maintenance and upgrades to maintain compatibility with all the different types of devices that require access and the County is routinely applying these upgrades and testing new devices for proper operation.

The County also monitors external activity and provides quick links to most popular applications. For applications that are used less frequently, a search tool is available that will assist the user in finding the resources necessary.

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) 2020050. The County website is a dynamic application in that it is continuously changing and improved based upon user activity and feedback.

A Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) document was submitted that identified a problem regarding "The lack of affordable housing..." and that it is "...causing many seniors to live in substandard housing...". The CEER also describes the State Legislature's sweep of Florida's dedicated affordable housing trust fund over the past decade.

CEER #2020051 contains two recommendations as a potential solution. The first is included in the Current Problem section and recommends "...that the priority for distributing these funds be determined by percentage of seniors within each county in Florida or by country [sic] population." The second recommends "...action from local elected Commissioners to work with County elected House of Representatives and State of Florida Senators to develop legislation that would require the use of the Sadowski Fiund [sic] which was developed to build affordable housing to be used for the purpose intended..."

Staff offers the following:

• It appears that this CEER is seeking to address how the state calculates allocations from the housing trust fund by utilizing senior or total county population.

The current funding methodology is a part of Florida Statute 420.9073 and already utilizes population as a factor. No action is required on the part of the Board of County Commissioners.

The Florida Legislature, per Florida Statute 420.6015, determined that "decent, safe, and sanitary housing for persons of very low income, low income, and moderate income are a critical need in the state" and "new and rehabilitated housing must be provided at a cost affordable to such persons in order to alleviate this critical need". In order to facilitate this legislative finding, the State Housing Initiatives Partnership Program (SHIP) was created (Florida Statute 420.9072). SHIP provides sustainable homeownership and rental housing for Florida's

workforce, helps prevent homelessness, and provides emergency repairs and disaster recovery for Florida's most vulnerable residents, including the frail elderly, persons with disabilities, and veterans.

SHIP distributes trust funds to counties and eligible municipalities. In Brevard the five recipients of that funding are Brevard County Government (administered through the Housing and Human Services Department) and the municipalities of Palm Bay, Melbourne, Cocoa, and Titusville.

 It appears that this CEER is seeking to address collaboration between the Board of County Commissioners and State Legislators on legislation to reduce or eliminate the reallocation (or sweep) of housing trust funds to non-housing purposes.

Data for the last seven years regarding funding distributions to Brevard County (including the municipalities) indicates that only 34.9% of the available funding was allocated (see attached) and resulted in a sweep of more than \$25 million over that time period.

The Board of County Commissioners has included support for full SHIP funding in its priority list to our Legislative Delegation for most of the last decade, including the package for the 2020 legislative session. Additionally, Senator Debbie Mayfield has introduced Senate Bill 306 and Representatives David Silvers and Sam Killebrew have introduced House Bill 381, which would prohibit the State Housing Trust Fund and the Local Government Housing Trust Fund from a provision authorizing the Legislature to transfer unappropriated cash balances from specified trust funds to the Budget Stabilization Fund and the General Revenue Fund.

The Sadowski Housing Coalition (Coalition) is a nonpartisan collection of over thirty statewide organizations whose membership includes business and industry groups, advocates, government and planning organizations, and faith-based organizations. The Coalition publishes Local Economic Impact Reports on an annual basis for each legislator in the state. These reports identify the projected full funding for each county as well as the economic impact, number of homes, people housed, and jobs created. The Coalition's 2020/21 State fiscal year impact report for Brevard County indicates that full funding (including the county and municipalities) is estimated at \$6,983,692. The report estimates that these funds would result in a \$92,688,475 positive economic impact, 305 homes being built, sold, renovated, or retrofitted, 763 people being housed, and the creation of 648 jobs.

Staff Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation (CEER) 2020051. Staff will continue its efforts with the County's state lobbyist to support Senate Bill 306 and House Bill 381.

RECOMMENDATION: Reject. The purchase of the Florida East Coast Railway is cost prohibitive. It is doubtful there is a legal way for the County to raise the funds to participate in such a purchase.

ISSUE:

This Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness Recommendation was received by the County from Mr. James Walton. His suggestion is as follows:

"The railroad" (referring to Florida East Coast Railway) "running thru Brevard County does little for the residents here but for decades it has blighted what should be some of (the) best neighbor hoods and business areas for fifty miles along US 1. It has often been a danger and a nuisance that has lead (sp) to dozens of fatalities. I know its outside the box but could the counties from St. Augustine to Palm Beach work together to purchase controlling interest in Florida East Coast Railroad and shut it down? Sell off its assets and land, offering to purchase first refusal to owners of adjoining land and selling the rails for scrap. Perhaps some of the land could be used for bike paths of trolleys of some sort that benefit the area...."

This office has been tasked with providing a response as to the recommendation.

ANALYSIS:

The suggestion made is understandable in light of issues regarding noise and safety relating to the operation of the Florida East Coast Railway over the years. However, there are several practical issues - whether the County could compel a sale if Florida East Coast Railway was not willing to sell voluntarily, the cost, and assuming those first 2 issues were addressed, the source of the needed funds.

Voluntary Sale/Eminent Domain

It is doubtful that the Florida East Coast Railway would be willing to sell the railway. Brevard has recently been involved in very contentious negotiations with the Florida East Coast Railway over the railway crossing at the Pineda Causeway and the purchase of County land at Pine Street (Canaveral Groves area at State Road 528). Florida Department of Transportation has spent approximately \$23M on the Pineda Causeway flyover bridge over the Railway.

At the time Grupo Mexico's Intended purchase of Florida East Coast Railway was announced, Alfredo Casar, President and Chief Executive Officer of GMXT (the transportation business unit of Grupo), commented:

"The acquisition of [Florida East Coast Railway] FEC is an important strategic addition to our North American transportation service offering. Our acquisition of the [Florida East Coast Railway] FEC will significantly enhance the scope, scale and diversification of our service."

According to the International Railway Journal, Grupo Mexico completed its acquisition of the Florida East Coast Railway in 2017 for \$2.18². The cited article stated the acquisition positions Grupo as a "relevant player in the North American transport market, together with its current operations in Mexico and the state of Texas." It is unlikely that Grupo Mexico would have incurred that purchase price with any desire to turn around and sell.

The Brightline/Virgin USA passenger train system, owned by Fortress Investment Group and minority investor Virgin Group, also has dual ownership of the corridor and the right to operate passenger service on the tracks from Miami to Cocoa. The company is investing \$1.5 billion in track upgrades between Miami and Cocoa. The company is also currently extending the railway from Cocoa to Orlando.

Assuming Grupo/Brightline are not interested in selling, the question is raised as to whether the County could force the purchase/sale, i.e. condemnation pursuant to the various counties power of eminent domain.

The County may have the power of eminent domain over railroads³. However, the real issue is public purpose. Florida Statute Section 73.014 specifically prohibits any entity with the power of eminent domain from taking private property for the elimination of nuisances or blight. Accordingly, the purpose put forth by the citizen inquiry will not be a viable basis to exercise the power of eminent domain. Meanwhile, there is a competing public purpose, namely a functioning railway that serves the east coast of Florida with freight service and future

passenger transportation service. In addition, Brevard already has a functioning trail system installed by Florida Department of Transportation as part of the coast to coast trail that encompasses some areas of previous Florida East Coast Railway right-of-way.

Under either scenario of a voluntary sale or condemnation, Brevard would also have the issue of coordinating and negotiating with 7 other counties (Palm Beach, Martin, Saint Lucie, Indian River, Volusia, Flagler and Saint Johns) — and likely Miami-Dade and Duval given the Florida East Coast Railway runs to those counties as well. Such negotiations would ultimately be open to the public and also available to the Florida East Coast Railway/Brightline. The Florida East Coast Railway/Brightline would have access to all negotiation strategy and would likely be able to maximize the price even assuming there was a way to 'compel' a sale.

Cost

As mentioned above, Grupo purchased the Florida East Coast Railway for \$2.18. Given its continuing investment, the cost to buy/condemn the property in question would be greater. Given the intent is to purchase to shut the Florida East Coast Railway down, Grupo/Brightline would certainly negotiate for their cost in diverting rail traffic to other routes. Grupo/Brightline would certainly claim business damages. Presumably Florida East Coast Railway has existing contracts with various entities to handle the transport of their goods which would add to damages claims. Attorneys' fees, appraisers, expert costs, etc., will all add to the cost on both sides. There is a question as to whether other railways could handle increased rail traffic – well beyond the scope of this memo - but if other railroads could not handle it, that would certainly drive up Grupo/Brightline's business damages claim in terms of the need to find/build other routes.

There is additionally the difficulty of dividing up the cost among 8 to 10 counties. It is unlikely all counties would feel that the cost should be divided equally, which would create another challenge. Again, all such negotiations between the counties would be 'in the Sunshine' such that Grupo/Brightline would have access to any strategy discussions.

Source of Funds

This list is not exhaustive, but rather focuses on the common sources which raise the most revenue or are used to fund large projects.

Property/ad valorem taxes

Brevard County has several charter provisions (see for the below) which govern the imposition of ad valorem revenue. Currently, Brevard has a "charter cap" that makes ad valorem revenues an unlikely source. The Board of County Commissioners would have to raise the ad valorem rate far beyond its current rate which would take a supermajority vote.

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2.9.3.1. Limitations on growth In ad valorem tax revenues.

- (a) Unless otherwise allowed by this subsection 2.9.3.1, the Board of County Commissioners shall not impose any ad valorem tax for county purposes at a millage rate which causes the budgeted revenue there from to the County to Increase over the budgeted ad valorem revenue for the previous fiscal year by more than the lesser of: (1) three percent, or (2) the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index from the preceding calendar year, as measured in accordance with Section 193.155(1)(b), Florida Statutes (as that Section exists in 2008 or may thereafter be amended or transferred).
- (b) Unless otherwise allowed by this subsection 2.9.3.1, the Board of County Commissioners shall not impose any ad valorem tax for municipal purposes within any municipal services taxing unit, or for district purposes of any district for which the Board has the power to fix or approve the millage rate, at a rate which, for such unit or district, causes the budgeted revenue of the unit or district from ad valorem taxes to increase over the budgeted ad valorem revenue for the previous fiscal year by more than the lesser of (1) three percent, or (2) the percentage change in the Consumer Price Index from the preceding calendar year, as measured in accordance with Section 193.155(1)(b), Florida Statutes (as that Section exists in 2008 or may thereafter be amended or transferred).
- (c) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection, the Board of County Commissioners may impose an ad valorem tax for county, municipal or district purposes at a rate which exceeds the limitations in paragraphs (a) and (b), if a supermajority of the Board concurs in a finding that such an excess is necessary because of emergency or critical need. The finding shall set forth the ultimate facts upon which it is based, and shall be valid for a single budget year.
- (d) In calculating the allowable increase in ad valorem revenues over the ad valorem revenues budgeted for the previous year under paragraphs (a) and (b) of this subsection, the Board of County Commissioners shall exclude from the anticipated revenues all revenue changes from the following kinds of property not appearing on the previous year's roll: (1) new construction; (2) additions to or demolitions in whole or in part of existing construction; (3) changes in the value of improvements that have undergone renovation to an extent of not less than 100% increase in assessed value (as measured from the last year of assessment prior to commencement of renovation); and (4) in the case of municipal service taxing units or districts, any properties added since the previous year's roll by reason of boundary changes.
- (e) Nothing in this subsection shall authorize imposition of a millage rate which exceeds the rate prohibited by the constitution or general laws of Florida, or

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prohibit imposition of a miliage rate which is required by the constitution or general laws of Florida or by any final order of a court of competent jurisdiction. Nothing in this subsection shall apply to any miliage necessary to the payment of general obligation bonds in accordance with all bond covenants, or to any other miliage approved by referendum of the electors, whether before or after the effective date of this subsection. (Amd. 11-4-08)

Likewise, there are provisions in the Florida Constitution and state statutes that regulate/limit how property taxes are calculated/imposed.

Likewise, the vast majority of ad valorem taxes (also referred to as the General Fund in the County's budget), is used to fund the Charter offices, i.e. Sheriff, Property Appraiser, Supervisor of Elections, etc...⁴

Based upon the limitations on the collection of ad valorem taxes and the current expenditure of these dollars, sufficient ad valorem taxes would not be available for this project.

Bonds

Brevard County, in addition to all state laws and federal regulations relating to the issuance of bonds, has the following charter provision regarding issuing bonds to finance

5.3.1.Bonds.

In addition to the limitations on general obligation debt imposed by the State Constitution, the issuance by the County of notes, bonds or other instruments of indebtedness evidencing borrowing to be paid back in part or in full by non-ad valorem tax revenues received by the County, in an amount which, individually or in combination with other issues for the same project authorized within the preceding two (2) years, exceeds \$15,000,000.00 [On 2/15/07, the Board of County Commissioners adopted Resolution No. 07-037 amending the County's debt celling as provided by County Charter and Ordinance No. 02-\$20,220,435.] (including administrative costs of the issue), shall be authorized only after approval by a majority vote of the electors at a special election called for that purpose or in conjunction with any regular election. No proceeds of instruments of indebtedness shall be issued to finance current operations of County Government, except that part of current expenses directly allocable to capital projects. Nothing in this section prohibits issuance of tax anticipation notes payable in one year or less.

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5.3.3.Exceptions.

The limitations in the foregoing subsections do not apply to projects mandated by judicial decree, self-liquidating projects, utility or other enterprise funds, road projects funded by gasoline taxes, or to the refinancing of any existing instruments of indebtedness or certificates of participation to reduce the cost of debt service.

Given Brevard County's 'share' to buy the Florida East Coast Railway would most certainly exceed \$15M, there would be an election requirement. Even assuming there was a successful vote at election, the County would have to identify a source of funds to pay off the bonds.

Special Assessment

Florida Law does allow for special assessments purpose of providing public facilities to benefit property owners in such designated special assessment districts. And the funds from these special assessments can be used to pay off bonds.

The special assessment must peculiarly and specially benefit the property upon which the special assessments are imposed, not exceed a proportionate share of the benefits received by the property upon which the special assessments are imposed, and shall be calculated and apportioned by using any equitable means of assessment and apportionment which the governing body of a local government may prescribe including, but not limited to, square footage, front-footage, increased value, number of dwelling units, distance from the public facility, traffic generation or other impact generation factors, or any combination thereof. However, Brevard has a charter provision related to special assessments, below, which limits the Board of County Commissioners' authority to impose assessments.

5.4.1 Levy of new non-ad valorem special assessments.

Brevard County shall not levy new non-ad valorem special assessments (excluding Municipal Service Benefit Units) without the approval of a majority of the electors residing within the boundaries of the district or other area of the County where the special assessments are proposed to be levied, voting thereon at a general election or special election called for purposes of such approval. (Amd. 11-3-98)

Infrastructure Sales Surtax

Florida Statute Section 212.055(2) provides for a County to levy a .5 percent or 1 percent levy of a sales tax if approved by a majority of electors in the County for construction of infrastructure. The maximum duration 15 years. However, unless there is an interlocal agreement with the municipalities for all the revenue raised by the sales tax, the municipalities are entitled to a share based upon a statutory formula.

The sales tax funds can be used "finance, plan, and construct infrastructure; to acquire any interest in land for public recreation, conservation, or protection of natural resources or to

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prevent or satisfy private property rights claims resulting from limitations imposed by the designation of an area of critical state concern; to provide loans, grants, or rebates to residential or commercial property owners who make energy efficiency improvements to their residential or commercial property...." "Infrastructure" Is further defined as "Any fixed capital expenditure or fixed capital outlay associated with the construction, reconstruction, or Improvement of public facilities that have a life expectancy of 5 or more years, any related land acquisition, land improvement, design, and engineering costs, and all other professional and related costs required to bring the public facilities into service." Purchasing a railway to simply abandon it would not qualify as a public facility. Common public facilities the sales tax could be used for are includes those facilities that are necessary to carry out governmental purposes, including, but not limited to, fire stations, general governmental office buildings, and animal shelters, regardless of whether the facilities are owned by the local taxing authority or another governmental entity; fire department vehicle, an emergency medical service vehicle, a sheriff's office vehicle, a police department vehicle, or any other vehicle, and the equipment necessary to outfit the vehicle for its official use or equipment that has a life expectancy of at least 5 years.

The Infrastructure sales surtax discussed here can be used to fund bonds for financing purposes, but cannot be used for operational costs if the railway facility could be purchased.

Staff Analysis:

The County's authority to impose taxes is limited by the Florida constitution and state law. In other words, counties do not have inherent power to impose taxes.

Authorization to impose taxes must come from the Florida constitution or state law. Art.

VII, §§ 1(a), 9(a), Fla. Const.

Brevard is currently preempted from passing an ordinance regulating plastic bags. Section 403.7033, Florida Statutes. The state statute specifically prohibits local

governments from enacting any regulation "regarding use, disposition, sale, prohibition, restriction, or tax of such auxiliary containers, wrappings, or disposable plastic bags."

There are currently two bills pending before the Florida Legislature to repeal the ban on local regulation of plastic bags, auxiliary items and polystyrene containers: <u>SB 182</u> and an identical bill <u>HB 6043</u>. Even if the preemption on local government regulation in Section 403.7033 is repealed, specific statutory authority would need to be enacted to allow local taxation of plastic bags.

I had multiple calls for rescue accompanied by a gang of un-needed fire fighters. The 911 call center can discover the rare cases where a full complement of personnel is needed.

Citizen Recommendation:

Save wear & tear on equipment. Save fuel. Reduce personnel. Stop featherbedding (mission creep).

Staff Analysis:

A firetruck doesn't always accompany an ambulance in every emergency within Brevard County Fire Rescue.

Emergency response protocols may vary depending on the nature of the incident and the specific needs of the situation. In September of 2002, BCFR implemented Pro-QA. Pro-QA is a process that guides our emergency vehicle dispatchers through an algorithm while collecting vital information from the caller. Pro-QA obtains the patient's condition, from that information an appropriate level shall be dispatched. If needed, Pro-QA instructs the caller with industry approved protocols, such as bystander cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR), safe positioning, etc., while the appropriate response is enroute. This process will take less than 30 seconds typically, a pre-alert will be sent to have crews moving toward their respective apparatus.

Call levels are listed as the following:

Alpha: Ambulance only

Bravo: Ambulance with lights and sirens, and Engine driving with normal traffic

Charlie: Ambulance and Engine both lights and sirens.

Over the last two years Brevard County has doubled our survivability rates of cardiac arrest patients. This is accomplished by having a minimum of 5 people on the scene (ambulance and fire truck) to manage a patient's airway, perform chest compressions, administer drugs, analyze the heart rhythm utilizing an ECG, and one person for information gathering and transport preparation.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendation as BCFR has already implemented Pro-QA.

Fire Rescue will continue to utilize the PRO-QA system to prioritize emergency calls and ensure that the proper number of responders arrive on scene to aid the citizens and visitors of Brevard County.

ARTICLE XVII. - REGULATION OF ILLEGAL ARCADE GAMING. Crosswinds immediate funding, Human Trafficking Safe Houses,

Citizen Recommendation:

Please see attached draft and disclaimer [citizen's proposed ordinance and resolution attached].

Staff Analysis:

Presently, the Florida Legislature has laws in place that address games/machines played at adult arcades. Specifically, Chapter 849, Florida Statutes, deals with gambling and slot machines, while section 546.10, Florida Statutes, focuses on skill-based amusement games or machines. Together, these provisions prohibit casino-style games typically played at adult arcades.

Gambling is prohibited by Chapter 849, Florida Statutes. Section 849.46, Florida Statutes, provides: "Whoever plays or engages in any game at cards, keno, roulette, faro or other game of chance, at any place, by any device whatever, for money or other thing of value, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083." This prohibition applies to all games of chance, which are common games at adult arcades.

The Legislature has specifically called out slot machines, making it unlawful to "manufacture, own, store, keep, possess, . . . or permit the operation of, or for any person to permit to be placed, maintained, or used or kept in any room, space, or building owned, leased or occupied by the person or under the person's management or control, any slot machine or device or any part thereof." Section 849.15(1)(a), Florida Statutes.

A slot machine is defined as:

any machine or device . . . that is adapted for use in such a way that, upon activation . . . such device or system is directly or indirectly caused to operate or may be operated and if the user, whether by application of skill or by reason of any element of chance or any other outcome unpredictable by the user, may . . . [r]eceive or become entitled to receive any piece of money, credit, allowance, or thing of value, or any check, slug, token, or memorandum, whether of value or otherwise, which may be exchanged for any money, credit, allowance, or thing of value or which may be given in trade.

Section 849.16(1)(a), Florida Statues.

Additionally, although Florida law provides certain exemptions for amusement games or machines, the Legislature has removed "casino style games in which the outcome is determined by factors unpredictable by the player or games in which the player may not control the outcome of the game through skill" from these statutory provisions, and specifically excludes the following from the definition of allowable amusement games or machines:

- Any game or machine that uses mechanical slot reels, video depictions of slot machine reels or symbols, or video simulations or video representation of any other casino game, including, but not limited to, any banked or banking card game, poker, bingo, pull-tab, lotto, roulette, or craps.
- 2. A game in which the player does not control the outcome of the game through skill or a game where the outcome is determined by factors not visible, known, or predictable to the players.
- 3. A video poker game or any other game or machine that may be construed as a gambling device under the laws of this [S]tate.
- 4. Any game or device defined as a gambling device in 15 U.S.C. [§] 1171, unless excluded under 15 U.S.C. [§] 1178.

Section 546.10, Florida Statutes.

Further, the activity this recommendation targets is regulated by the Florida Gaming Control Commission. See Sec. 16.712, Florida Statutes (providing that the Commission is to "[e]xercise all of the regulatory and executive powers of the state with respect to gambling, including, without limitation thereto, pari-mutuel wagering, cardrooms, slot machine facilities, oversight of gaming compacts executed by the state pursuant to the Federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, and any other forms of gambling authorized by the State Constitution or law, excluding games authorized by s. 15, Art. X of the State Constitution.").

Finally, the fines included in the recommendation would exceed the fines permitted under Florida Statutes Chapter 162 for enforcement of code violations. Chapter 162 states, "fine[s] imposed pursuant to this section shall not exceed \$250 per day for a first violation and shall not exceed \$500 per day for a repeat violation . . . [if] the violation [is found] to be irreparable or irreversible in nature, it may impose a fine not to exceed \$5,000 per violation." Section 162.09(2)(a), Florida Statutes.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024016 as the area of illegal arcade gaming is regulated by state law.

This article may be known and cited as the Regulation of Illegal Arcade Gaming Ordinance.

CEER #2024018 was received by the County from Eleanor E. Glover.

Citizen Statement:

Identifying properties that are zoned for legal use as a Vacation Rental or Resort dwelling. Registration for **Tourist Development Tax**

While researching the process which a resident must go through to obtain proper licensing to establish a "Vacation Rental" operation, I was very puzzled by the fact that the Tax Collector does not coordinate with zoning before issuing a license for the business of operating a "Vacation Rental". It would seem, that the application would ask; what is the zoning of your property? If the zoning was researched during the registration process, the zoning classification would eliminate the illegal "Vacation Rentals". The owner would be denied, up front and would not have to wait for a concerned citizen to report the illegal business to Code Enforcement. At this date, Code Enforcement is overwhelmed with the investigations of illegal "Vacation Rentals".

Staff Analysis:

As part of the Brevard County Tax Collector's process for issuing Business Tax Receipts for the operation of a vacation rental, the Tax Collector requests a review by Brevard County zoning staff. Staff processes approximately 100 such requests relating to vacation rentals annually. However, it has been the experience of staff that most of the vacation rentals for which a complaint has been received lack a Business Tax Receipt.

On August 22, 2023, the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners directed staff to prepare a report on the County's enforcement of unpermitted resort dwellings. It stated that this report should identify opportunities and challenges for more effective enforcement including, but not limited to, proactive enforcement, potential software improvements, fines imposed by the Code Enforcement Special Magistrate, due process challenges, and fiscal impacts. Staff did so, and the Board acknowledged receipt of this report on October 24, 2023. Since that time, the Florida Legislature has taken up consideration of legislation that would address certain concerns previously raised by the Board and members of the public. For instance, as of February 23, 2024, CS/SB 280 includes a requirement that vacation rental listings include a "unique identifier" issued by the State and allows local governments to access information on the properties associated with these identifiers through a newly established "vacation rental information system." Staff continues to monitor the 2024 Legislative Session and will provide the Board with any new opportunities for improvement that may result.

Staff will also continue to explore other technological opportunities to review more vacation rental properties for compliance consistent with Florida Statutes.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept the recommendation with revisions as detailed in the staff analysis.

Brevard Parks and Recreation to plant 140 trees in two parks, Chain of Lakes Park and Sand Point Park, as well as numerous mangroves in parks along the Lagoon. These trees have thrived due to the ongoing care of volunteers. Volunteers could also be utilized to pick up palm fronds, a time consuming endeavor of Parks and Recreation. Native trees planted in parks would provide shade to residents recreating in the parks, encouraging greater participation. Trees planted would reduce erosion along the Indian River Lagoon and reduce polluted stormwater runoff into the Indian River Lagoon. Native trees planted in parks would provide bird habitat. Be sure to plant the right tree at the right place, taking in account infrastructure, and the tree's requirements.

Staff Analysis:

Brevard County Parks and Recreation supports urban forestry, recognizing the economic, psychological, and environmental benefits of enhancing the quality of life for Brevard's residents. Parks Operations budgets annually for the purchase and planting of trees in county parks.

Staff already works regularly with volunteers who approach the County with tree donations and planting considerations. There is also a Memorial and Honorary Tree planting program where constituents may purchase and plant trees in parks and department-managed lands coordinated with County Parks and Recreation personnel.

Standards are necessary for establishment and survival rates when planting trees. Department staff may designate a park and an area within the park where donated trees may be planted. The volunteer/sponsor will contact the Department with a request for a tree planting(s), including the intended park(s), the location of the planting within the park(s), and the date and time of the requested planting. Department staff will evaluate the request and either confirm it or suggest alternatives to the request as required. When the request is approved, the volunteer/sponsor will be responsible for purchasing or acquiring the tree(s), arranging for transporting the tree(s) to the park, and properly planting it. The volunteer/sponsor is also responsible for maintaining, watering, and fertilizing the tree through establishment until it is self-sufficient. Selected trees should be nursery-grown in a container and shall be "Florida No. 1" or better in grading standards. Trees should be a minimum of 15 gallons in size, but a 30-gallon or larger container is preferable. County staff will provide the volunteer with a list of acceptable tree species per park use and environment.

County policy requires all volunteers to coordinate through the Brevardians Responding as Volunteers (BRAVE) program, which assists the County in providing expanded services to the public. Staff Analysis:

The applicable state statute pertaining to possession of cannabis is section 893.13(6)(b), Florida Statutes, which provides that "[I]f the offense is the possession of 20 grams or less of cannabis, as defined in this chapter, the person commits a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083." The statutory penalties include up to one (1) year in prison and/or a fine of up to \$1,000.1

The applicable state statute pertaining to possession of cannabis paraphernalia is section 893.147(1)(b), Florida Statutes, which provides that "[l]t is unlawful for any person to use, or to possess with intent to use, drug paraphernalia: ... [T]o inject, ingest, inhale, or otherwise

introduce into the human body a controlled substance in violation of this chapter. Any person who violates this subsection is guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s. 775.082 or s. 775.083." Again, the statutory penalties include up to one (1) year in prison and/or a fine of up to \$1,000.

While local governments are not able to "decriminalize" the possession of cannabis, because possession of cannabis is currently prohibited under state law, there is some existing authority for local governments to pass ordinances that provide for an optional civil citation in lieu of arrest and prosecution for a criminal offense. The relevant case law that considered this issue specifically dealt with Chapter 893, and the court held that "[A] local ordinance does not conflict with a state statute merely because it provides for a less severe penalty." The state has not expressly preempted this area of the law concerning penalties for violations involving possession of small quantities of cannabis. Several local jurisdictions in Florida have already enacted ordinances that address possession of cannabis in small quantities or possession of cannabis paraphernalia by making a civil citation an optional penalty for law enforcement.

Notwithstanding that it is legally possible to pass an ordinance such as that proposed in CEER #2024020, it is understood that there are various political, economic, and other policy considerations that relate to this question. However, such policy considerations are not within the purview of this memorandum.

Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024020 as the possession of cannabis and cannabis paraphernalia is addressed by state law.

Citizen Statement:

There has been a proliferation of vacation rentals in residential neighborhoods. Some are owned by individuals who reside in the area, and work to maintain the property and relations with neighbors. However, many vacation rentals are owned by individuals or entities who do not reside in the area. Little consideration is given to residents in the neighborhood by these out-of-the-area or out of state entities. Problems local residents are subjected to include failure to properly maintain grounds which affects adjacent neighbors, loud noises at inappropriate times, overcrowding, and other failures to comply with local ordinances. In addition, many of these properties are not registered with the local municipality or county as a vacation rental, making it impossible for neighbors to contact the owner if there is a problem that needs addressing. Finally, because the vacation rental isn't registered with the local municipality and county, funds that should be going to the city and county are never received, and are not available for the intended usage of such funds.

Citizen Recommendation:

My suggestion is two-fold. Since the State has made it impossible for local municipalities to regulate vacation rentals, funds from the Tourist Development Tax should be used to provide all local municipalities and unincorporated areas of Brevard with adequate funds to hire at least one code enforcement officer whose only job is to ensure all vacation rentals are registered and community issues are addressed. The funds for this additional code enforcement officer should not be allowed to be used to pay any exiting code enforcement officers. Existing officers would be charged with maintaining general code enforcement not related to vacation rentals. The additional officer would be charged specifically with code enforcement of vacation rentals and maintenance of the residential quality of tax payers' neighborhoods. It would be fiscally beneficial to lobby our State congress people to encourage them to pass a State regulation earmarking a percentage of the State's Sales & Use Tax

for vacation rentals and hotels to assist in funding additional code enforcement officers. Also needed is a way for residents to contact owners directly when there is a problem that needs addressing. Such issues might include overgrown plants encroaching on and damaging privacy fences, late night parties, parking that blocks a neighbor's driveway, etc. To accomplish this, I suggest that all owners (not managers) of vacation rentals in residential areas be required to send a letter to all surrounding property owners identifying themselves and providing a contact number. As with the contact information required by vacation rental owners to provide to their guests, this number should be manned and responsive at all hours in case of emergency. There should also be some sort of regulation to ensure a timely remedy for issues affecting the property of neighbors once the owner has been contacted. This suggestion is of limited effectiveness when there are so many vacation rentals not registered with the cities and county. The use of Tourist Tax Development funds to hire an additional code enforcement officer specifically for the management of code violations around vacation rentals would provide code enforcement the opportunity to identify, fine and register entities who have failed to properly register as a vacation rental.

Staff Analysis:

- 1st citizen recommendation: Funds from Tourist Development Tax (TDT) being used to provide all municipalities and unincorporated areas of Brevard with an additional Code Enforcement Officer dedicated to vacation rental-related enforcement.
 - Staff Response: Speaking to the unincorporated Brevard portion of this
 recommendation, Brevard County Code Enforcement has sufficient staff to process
 its current caseload. As the County generally operates on a reactive basis to Code
 Enforcement complaints, adding a single officer who is focused only on vacation
 rentals would provide limited benefit.
- 2nd citizen recommendation: Lobby State legislators to encourage them to pass legislation earmarking a percentage of sales tax in order to fund additional officers.
 - Staff Response: Brevard County has sufficient Code Enforcement staff to respond to its current complaint volume. Given this, a Board initiative to lobby the legislative delegation to fund a position through sales tax would be unnecessary.
- 3rd citizen recommendation: Impose a requirement that owners of vacation rentals have publicly listed numbers that is manned and responsive at all hours.
 - Staff Response: The County requires the designation of a local manager for those operating a vacation rental under a conditional use permit or on a property where the use is permitted with conditions. Under County Code, the local manager is required to address complaints within 1 hour. These requirements do not apply to

those vacation rentals operating on properties for which the "resort dwelling" use is a permitted use.

County staff has not identified imposing this type of expanded local regulations on such operations as having significant benefit, because most properties which are investigated for issues relating to vacation rentals are operating unlawfully per the County's zoning regulations. The County has recently taken steps to more aggressively investigate and fine this activity.

Within the past year, the Board has focused on addressing the issue of vacation rentals. On August 22, 2023, the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners directed staff to prepare a report on the County's enforcement of unpermitted resort dwellings. It stated that this report should identify opportunities and challenges for more effective enforcement including, but not limited to, proactive enforcement, potential software improvements, fines imposed by the Code Enforcement Special Magistrate, due process challenges, and fiscal impacts. Staff did so, and the Board acknowledged receipt of this report on October 24, 2023. Since that time, the Florida Legislature has taken up consideration of legislation that would address certain concerns previously raised by the Board and members of the public, which staff continues to track. For instance, as of Feb. 23, 2024, CS/SB 280 includes a requirement that vacation rental listings include a "unique identifier" issued by the State and allows local governments to access information on the properties associated with these identifiers through a newly established "vacation rental information system." Staff continues to monitor the 2024 Legislative Session and will provide the Board with any new opportunities for improvement that may result.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioner reject the recommendation.

Citizen Recommendation:

Test your work.

Staff Analysis:

- 1. The current code does not have an auto-populate feature turned on at this time. There are, however, browser based auto-populate features, such as in Chrome, that may be turned on for this purpose. Implementing an auto-populate feature in this application would not allow users the option to turn off the feature if necessary. The Auto-Populate Feature is a handy tool and can be implemented using most browsers.
- 2. Pages clearing during an application session could be a result of many variables such as network status, application processes, number of users accessing application, cached commands, computer memory status, computer processor status, browser type, number of browser windows open, as well as other potential components that are involved in opening a webpage. Without specific machine diagnosis, it is impossible to determine why the webpage cleared unintentionally.
- 3. Losing form data online is frustrating and safeguards, such as the recommendation, are beneficial to users. Currently when the Clear form button is selected a pop-up "Are you sure you want to clear the form?" is displayed thereby confirming the user's action to clear prior to losing data.

This appears to be a very specific request by an end user for an application. Although the end user encountered frustration during the use of a County application, it does not appear that changes to the application would enhance this user's experience.

Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendation.



Staff Analysis:

Chapter 316, Florida Statutes, known as the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law, was enacted to make uniform traffic laws apply throughout the state and its political subdivisions. No local authority may enact or enforce any ordinance on a matter covered by the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law unless expressly authorized, nor may any local authority pass or attempt to enforce any ordinance in conflict with its provisions.

As noted in the citizen's recommendation, section 316.293, Florida Statutes, regulates motor vehicle operating noise and noise abatement equipment modifications. Likewise, section 316.3045, Florida Statutes, regulates the operation of radios or other mechanical or electronic soundmaking devices or instruments in motor vehicles. There is no Brevard County ordinance applicable to motor vehicles which conflicts with these statutes.

Law enforcement agencies in Brevard County, including the Brevard County Sheriff's Office are authorized to enforce sections 316.293 and 316.3045, Florida Statutes. Law enforcement

agencies exercise discretion in enforcing the provisions of the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law, and the Board of County Commissioners has no jurisdiction or authority in this regard.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024024, as there is no Brevard County vehicle noise ordinance in need of repeal, and the Board of County Commissioners is without jurisdiction to enforce the provisions of the Florida Uniform Traffic Control Law.





The beach parks need to be maintained better, and if not they should be sold to beachside cities that can maintain them properly and invest the money for improvements.

Citizen Recommendation:

Create a coastal management team. This team can be part natural resources part public works that manages natural resources, maintains infrastructure, and facilities public engagement.

Staff Analysis:

Brevard County Parks and Recreation operates and maintains twelve beach parks. Each park is assigned a maintenance service level (mode) to ensure safe, functional, and aesthetically appealing parks and facilities. Parks are divided into maintenance modes by park type, its usage, visibility, volume of visitation and the number and complexity of its facilities and amenities. Staff perform daily maintenance and preventative maintenance and repair as required.

When an event(s) occur that require a team approach, Parks and Recreation staff collaborate with staff from the Natural Resources Department, Public Works Facilities Management and other departments and agencies to meet the needs of the parks. The department has established procedures with jurisdictional law enforcement to enforce park rules, maintain public safety and trespass violators. Cooperation between Parks and Recreation and municipalities within Brevard County ensures special events in the beach parks are appropriately permitted.

Currently, a team composed of Parks and Recreation, Public Works Facilities Management and contractors are engaged in a \$1M renovation for beach park bathrooms. In fiscal year 2022 – 2023, a collaboration between departments resulted in an investment of \$1.1M to repair and renovate dune crossover structures. Parks and Recreation assists Natural Resources in beach renourishment projects by providing staging areas and access points.

Staff recommends rejecting the recommendation as it is already being implemented.

CEER #2024026 was received by the County from Lora Losi.

Citizen Statement:

There is excessive money spent on needless and potentially harmful grounds maintenance. There are several cost cutting measures that will save money and help the environment.

Citizen Recommendation:

Eliminate the use of herbicides in and around county ponds. This will prevent possible runoff to the IRL and again save money by not having to revegetate any seagrass effected. The county already owns 3 harvesters for aquatic vegetation removal. One is even small enough to remove unwanted and invasive vegetation in small ponds. Edge vegetation filters, cleans, and slows runoff.

Likewise, drop or lower the use of excessive pesticides, especially on lawns, The treatment of potable water supplies to remove these and other pollutants is EXTREMELY costly.

Reschedule mowing and tree trimming on county properties for MANY fewer repetitions. Longer grass holds water better and therefore reduces runoff. Trees with lower branches and mass are more wind resistant.

<u>Staff Analysis</u>: Public Works - Natural Resource Management - Parks and Recreation – Mosquito Control

Aquatic vegetation management in stormwater ponds and drainage systems throughout the County is conducted by multiple county departments and preventative maintenance is undertaken to address public health & safety, flooding concerns, and improve downstream water quality.

Public Works: The Road and Bridge Program maintains 85 stormwater ponds and employs a variety of mechanical methods as well as limited herbicide treatments. In 2020, our herbicide spray program was outsourced to an approved licensed contractor that sprays two (2) retention ponds on a spray interval of

six (6) times a year at an annual cost of \$1,369.56 (<1% total maintenance budget). A ½ mile No Spray Zone buffer was established around major bodies of water, such as the Indian River Lagoon. The contractor is not allowed to apply herbicide treatments within this No Spray Zone.

Each year the Public Works Department reviews the spray frequency and locations as part of the contract renewal process, making adjustments to ensure the appropriate combination of herbicide and mechanical equipment are being used in consideration of the environment and available resources.

Natural Resource Management (NRM): In 2019, NRM launched an aquatic vegetation harvesting program, which is currently expanding from one team of three employees to two teams, each with a dedicated harvester. Note that the third harvester mentioned in the citizen-recommended action is only suitable for limited use due to its small capacity. It is primarily intended for smaller projects. Several local cities have also initiated similar programs.

Subsequent to launching its aquatic vegetation harvesting program, the use of aquatic herbicides in NRM-maintained ponds has all but been eliminated: staff who are licensed applicators limit aquatic herbicide use only to those locations where mechanical equipment would risk damage to stormwater infrastructure. During 2023, less than one (1) gallon of herbicide was used throughout all NRM-maintained stormwater ponds.

NRM does not broadcast pesticides or fertilizers on any turf areas it maintains. Mowing specifications at NRM-maintained locations call for the maintenance of a three-to-five-foot buffer of higher turf and/or appropriate vegetation immediately upslope of pond shorelines. Mowing at NRM-maintained stormwater pond sites is performed on a monthly cycle. Tree trimming at NRM-maintained sites is performed infrequently, always under the supervision of an International Society of Arboriculture certified arborist and is only conducted when necessary to assure vehicular maintenance access or to address public safety concerns.

Parks and Recreation: Parks Operations coordinates with Mosquito Control for the treatment of cattails only in park ponds. Cattails harbor mosquito larvae as well as contribute to shallowing out ponds where a determined depth is preferred. Moreover, Parks Operation ponds are maintained with vegetative filter strips to intercept undesirable contaminants from runoff before they enter a water body. Steps are taken to protect water bodies by maintaining a minimum ten (10) foot buffer zone for any pesticide applications.

The Environmentally Endangered Lands Program uses a limited amount of aquatic herbicide in wetland environments to control invasive and non-native species.

Parks Operations' maintenance plan includes regular mowing that helps the grass stay healthy and strong. Grass blades are maintained at an ideal height to promote photosynthesis and nutrient absorption and allow early signs of disease or insect infestations to be seen. Additionally, Parks Operations prunes young trees and manages tree architecture. As the tree matures, removal of lower branches is practiced where branches may interfere with pedestrian and vehicle travel, drainage flow, or grounds maintenance equipment.

Mosquito Control: Ponds are often not a source of mosquito breeding due to natural predation of local fish and invertebrates, so limited herbicide applications are needed in ponds. If a pond is found to breed mosquitoes (e.g., newly constructed ponds), Mosquito Control normally first tries to stock native mosquitofish from one of its fish hatcheries to help establish the fish population. However, if significant mosquito or mosquito-borne disease levels are detected in or around a pond and fish are not deemed effective (e.g., when vegetation is too dense for fish to access larvae), the Department may apply herbicides to cut off mosquito breeding quickly and at the source.

Mosquito Control supports the County's harvesting program whenever and wherever harvester applications are practical for aquatic vegetation management. However, the mosquito life cycle is very brief, often less than a week, so harvesting alone cannot keep up with widespread mosquito production to sufficiently protect public health, especially once mosquito larvae or pupae are detected.

Mosquito Control does not control shoreline vegetation unless it is found to harbor significant mosquitoes and/or is determined to be a public health risk due to associated diseases. Local mosquitoes are known to utilize the shelter of aquatic vegetation during their immature (i.e., larval and pupal) life stages, so dense areas are sometimes treated to allow access of predators to mosquitoes. The Department normally considers native shoreline vegetation to be a benefit to water quality and, therefore, supportive of native mosquitofish, invertebrates, and other natural predators of mosquitoes.

Mosquito Control normally doesn't apply pesticides to lawns directly since they are usually not sufficient habitat for mosquitoes. Nevertheless, any pesticides used by the Department are tested and approved by the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to help reduce mosquitoes and associated disease risk. Pesticide spraying is only conducted as needed, when state surveillance thresholds are reached, not on a predetermined schedule. An integrated management approach is employed which also includes various non-pesticide methods such as water level management in salt marsh breeding areas (i.e., mosquito impoundments), native mosquitofish stocking (from the Department's hatcheries), waste tire disposal, and even public education to encourage residents to eliminate water holding containers.

Mosquito Control conducts only the minimum mowing and tree trimming required for access to mosquito management areas (e.g., mosquito impoundments) and office facilities. Office facilities are only maintained to safely store vehicles, equipment, and supplies, and to support operations overall.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendation as the County continues to utilize a variety of vegetation control methods and treatments to provide expected service levels to citizens in an environmentally and fiscally responsible manner.

Citizen Statement:

Citizen Recommendation:

In the long run BUYING ADDITIONAL AND MAINTAINING WETLANDS would save taxpayers greatly in IRL restoration and property damage. Instituting the use of Low Impact Development techniques for future development would also help.

Staff Analysis:

In 1990, Brevard's citizens voted to tax themselves for the purchase of environmentally sensitive lands. The Brevard County Environmentally Endangered Lands Program (EEL) has received donations of and/or had mitigation projects on approximately 1,686 acres of land. This total includes 871 acres of wetland mitigation land donations, 161 acres of wetland mitigation projects on EEL-managed lands, and approximately five acres of other land donations of wetlands. In 2022, Brevard County voted to extend the EEL Program for another 20 years. Ballot language read, "...to acquire, improve and maintain wildlife habitat, wetlands, woodlands, and lands that protect Indian River Lagoon and St. Johns River,..."

Additionally, Brevard County Comprehensive Plan, Conservation Element, Objective 5, entitled Wetlands, establishes policies that address land uses in wetlands - prioritizing the protection of wetlands during development design and permitting reviews and requiring "no net loss" of functional wetlands through mitigation.

In February 2022, Coastal Management Element, Objective 14, entitled Coastal Development and Redevelopment, was adopted into the Comprehensive Plan to address "Peril of Flood" in accordance with Section 163.7138(2)(f)1-6, F.S. These 13 new policies include language that creates procedures to allow consideration of the changing dynamics of flooding, sea level rise, and storm surge in growth management decisions through nature-based design standards and/or Low Impact Development.

Lastly, on February 6, 2024, the Board directed that land acquisition for the EEL Program should have a specific and scientific focus on lands that directly benefit the Indian River Lagoon and St. Johns River. EEL's staff is currently working on implementing this direction.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024027, as it is already being implemented.

Staff Analysis:

Brevard County licenses irrigation contractors. See e.g. Sec. 22-529, Brevard County Code of Ordinances, including as a class of competency "irrigation specialty contractor." There are currently 69 active licensees certified by the County, and 5 certified by the State and registered with the County. Broader local licensing requirements are generally preempted under Fla. Stat. Sec. 489.117. For those certified by the County, the

educational materials our test providers draw from include information on pollution and the prevention of runoff.

Contracted landscapers are required by law to receive training and certification from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS) for the application of pesticides and fertilizers. Each individual seeking certification must satisfactorily pass an examination. Through UF/IFAS Extension Brevard County, we regularly provide the training and continuing education needed to obtain and recertify these required certifications. Examples are listed below.

Pesticide Applicator Trainings and Continuing Education

Chapter 482 (Structural Pest Control) of the Florida Statute states that all general use and restricted use pesticides applied within 10 feet of any building (i.e., "for-hire" contracted landscapers) must be applied by licensed applicators, or in certain instances, supervised by a licensed applicator. Licenses and certifications must be maintained and recertified with continuing education provided by FDACS approved education, such as by UF/IFAS Extension. For landscape professionals, we provide training and continuing education for Commercial Lawn and Ornamental, Limited Commercial Landscape Maintenance, and Special ID Card holders.

Fertilizer Applicator Training and Continuing Education

Florida law states that all commercial fertilizer applicators must have a Limited Urban Fertilizer (LUF) certification from FDACS. To get this certification, each commercial applicator must be trained in the Green Industries Best Management Practices Certification Class (GI-BMPs) and receive a certificate of completion from UF/IFAS and Florida Department of Environmental Protection. We regularly provide this training at UF/IFAS Extension Brevard County.

Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Certified Professional

The Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Program offers a Florida-Friendly Landscaping™ Certified Professional (FFLCP) designation to individuals who have completed the required training in FFL principles and are familiar with the latest UF/IFAS recommendations. These trained professionals have demonstrated the ability to recognize and address common landscape issues by using environmentally sustainable landscape management practices that help preserve and protect Florida's water and natural resources. UF/IFAS Extension Brevard County provides the required in-person Field Module training, annually, for landscapers pursuing the FFLCP designation. This is a voluntary program.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that CEER# 2024028 be rejected by the Board of County Commissioners, as there is already a mechanism in place for lawn and landscape contractors to receive education and licensing for the use of pesticides, herbicides, fertilizer, irrigation, and landscape debris.

CEER #2024029 was received by the County from Vincent McDermott.

Citizen Statement:

As residents of Brevard County, we are blessed by the natural resource systems that surround us - the beaches and the unique Indian River Lagoon on the east and the St. John's River and its wetlands and flood plains on the west. At the same time, we are fortunate to have a robust and growing economy attributable to the high-tech industry supporting space exploration and our national defense. But with growth and development comes pressure on the quality of our natural resources as evidenced by the poor health of the IRL that can be attributed to urban and agricultural runoff, inadequate sewage treatment, outmoded septic systems, and similar sources of contamination.

By 2026, Brevard County will have spent over \$500,000,000 to initiate the restoration of the Indian River Lagoon. This is in addition to funding from other state and federal programs designed to remediate the degradation of our most precious natural resource that has occurred over decades. The recent financial investments in the IRL are showing promise; hopefully that funding will continue by renewing the sales tax to support the SOIRL program for the next decade.

All of the ongoing IRL restoration efforts will be for naught if we do not learn from our past mistakes and develop a long-term strategy to balance our appetite for continued economic development with the desire to conserve both the IRL and the St. John's River watersheds.

Citizen Recommendation:

As a professional AICP planner with over 50 years of practice, I recommend that the County undertake and adopt a long-term, comprehensive growth management plan that will address our expanding population that will have specific strategies, land use and development policies, and committed sources of funding to implement the plan. This plan should not be the traditional comprehensive plan that has incremental periodic updates and revised at the request of an applicant.

The growth management plan would be prepared through a transparent process that will actively include a broad range of stakeholders eventually adopted by the County Commission. The plan needs to be forward-thinking and sustainable. It needs to address the impacts of climate change including sea level rise; transportation and infrastructure improvements (water supply, wastewater treatment) to support projected growth; land use techniques including acquisition and transfer of development rights to assure real estate equity; low impact development practices and stormwater management; measures to address housing affordability and the needs of the unhoused; and financial policies to assure an income stream to fund the strategies and policies. By having an enforceable growth management plan, we can surely maintain and enhance the quality of life we have come to enjoy in Brevard County for now and for the next generation.

Staff Analysis:

Such issues are addressed through the existing (statutorily mandated) comprehensive plan process, addressing the very transparency concerns noted in the request. Fla. Stat. Sec. 163.3181 mandates public participation in this process. Additionally, the comprehensive plan process promotes objectivity and carries significant weight in related decision-making.

Illustrative of the ability to incorporate such initiatives into the comprehensive plan process, in February 2022, Objective 14 - Coastal Development and Redevelopment, was adopted into the Coastal Management Element to address "Peril of Flood" in accordance with Section 163.7138(2)(f)1-6, F.S. These 13 new policies include language that creates procedures to allow consideration of the changing dynamics of flooding, sea level rise, and storm surge in growth management decisions through nature-based design standards and/or Low Impact Development.

Staff will continue to work to ensure such growth management policies are considered in the several efforts the County is currently undertaking. This would include amendments to the County's Planned Unit Development zoning classification as well as the implementation of an Area of Critical State Concern (ACSC) in the South Beaches, which is overseen by Florida Commerce, and will be a public process with an opportunity for public and stakeholder input.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject this recommendation as the County is required to follow the statutorily mandated process.

As residents of Brevard County, we are blessed by the natural resource systems that surround us - the beaches As residents of Brevard County, we are blessed by the natural resource systems that surround us - the beaches and the unique Indian River Lagoon on the east and the St. John's River and its wetlands and flood plains on the west. At the same time, we are fortunate to have a robust and growing economy attributable to the high-tech industry supporting space exploration and our national defense. But with growth and development comes pressure on the quality of our natural resources as evidenced by the poor health of the IRL that can be attributed to urban and agricultural runoff, inadequate sewage treatment, outmoded septic systems, and similar sources of contamination.

Problem Description:

By 2026, Brevard County will have spent over \$500,000,000 to initiate the restoration of the Indian River Lagoon. This is in addition to funding from other state and federal programs designed to remediate the degradation of our most precious natural resource that has occurred over decades. The recent financial investments in the IRL are showing promise; hopefully that funding will continue by renewing the sales tax to support the SOIRL program for the next decade.

All of the ongoing IRL restoration efforts will be for naught if we do not learn from our past mistakes and develop a long-term strategy to balance our appetite for continued economic development with the desire to conserve both the IRL and the St. John's River watersheds.

As a professional AICP planner with over 50 years of practice, I recommend that the County undertake and adopt a long -term, comprehensive growth management plan that will address our expanding population that will have specific strategies, land use and development policies, and committed sources of funding to implement the plan. This plan should not be the traditional comprehensive plan that has incremental periodic updates and revised at the request of an applicant.

Recommendation Description

The growth management plan would be prepared through a transparent process that will actively include a broad range of stakeholders eventually adopted by the County Commission. The plan needs to be forward-thinking and sustainable. It needs to address the impacts of climate change including sea level rise; transportation and infrastructure improvements (water supply, wastewater treatment) to support projected growth; land use techniques including acquisition and transfer of development rights to assure real estate equity; low impact development practices and stormwater management; measures to address housing affordability and the needs of the unhoused; and financial policies to assure an income stream to fund the strategies and policies. By having an enforceable growth management plan, we can surely maintain and enhance the quality of life we have come to enjoy in Brevard County for now and for the next generation.

CEER #2024033 was received by the County from Terri Friedlander, representing the Pineda Safety Committee.

Citizen Statement:

There has been a steady increase in population in the area and traffic on the Pineda Causeway between 195 and Wickham Road. Speeding is excessive on the Pineda and may be the cause of some recent crashes. The speed limit of 45 mph is basically ignored, especially during rush hour. To date, there have been at least 2 school buses that have been rear-ended with injuries.

Citizen Recommendation:

Additional flashing signals reminding about the 45mph speed limit would be helpful. Also, it has become increasingly dangerous for vehicles to enter and exit the Grand Haven subdivisions at Peninsula Circle and Fringetree Lane. For safety purposes, a traffic signal appears to be warranted. There is also a frequent backup of vehicles heading westbound on the Pineda. Longer turning lanes on the Pineda at the Wickham intersection would be beneficial.

Staff Analysis:

Pineda Causeway between Interstate 95 (I-95) and Wickham Road is a county-maintained arterial roadway with a 45-mph posted speed limit. There are two existing flashing speed feedback signs, one at each end, which have proven to have limited success in reducing the speed of motorists on Pineda Causeway. Drivers are familiar with these devices and choose to disregard them. It is suggested in the citizen recommendation that additional speed feedback signs be provided to slow the speed of traffic, however, at a high cost to install of \$15,000 each and maintain annually at

\$5,000 on average, these electronic signs are not justified by the marginal benefits they provide. The concern about excessive speeding is a frequent complaint that only law enforcement has the greatest control over.

It is also suggested in the citizen recommendation that a traffic signal should be installed at the intersection of Pineda Causeway and Peninsula Circle/Fringetree Lane. A traffic signal warrant analysis was performed in 2021, in accordance with the criteria established by the Federal Highway Administration in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices, the national standard for traffic control which details the conditions that could allow for the installation of a traffic signal. The study determined that a traffic signal at this location is not warranted. The study was to consider alternative improvements if the results of the safety analysis indicated a trend or an unusual number of crashes that would be mitigated by signalization. However, this was not the case as the crash history does not indicate crash patterns susceptible to correction by the installation of a traffic signal. Installation of signals at unwarranted locations is a technical violation of State and Federal Laws as well as County Code.

Motorists experience significant delays at the intersection of Pineda Causeway and Wickham Road during peak hours due to the bottleneck that occurs because of increasing traffic volume through this signalized intersection. Signal system retiming and optimization are occurring annually, rather than the typical 3 to 5-year frequency, to improve traffic flow. Further, Brevard County Public Works is already in design to lengthen the existing right and left turn lanes approaching the intersection from the west and south. The extension of turn lanes will improve the efficiency of the signal operation and the movement of traffic through the intersection. Construction is anticipated to start by late Fall 2024 barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board accept the recommendation to extend the turn lanes at the intersection of Wickham and Pineda as the engineering design for this project is already in progress.





Citizen Statement:

HERBICIDES AND SAVING THE LAGOON - COUNTY INCREASED HERBICIDES BY 2.5 TIMES COST IN 2021. That year the Lagoon report card went from an F++ to an F-- WHILE THE 2 COUNTIES WHICH STOPPED THEIR USE OF GLYPHOSATE, their IRL portions improved. That was the last year of the report card.

Given the priority of voters in Brevard concerned about the decline of the Indian River Lagoon, I would ask that the County reevaluate the decision in 2021 to increase the spraying of herbicides from \$85,370 annually (Aquatic Vegetation Management Services) for past 3 years to 2 and half times for 2 additional districts, to \$221,454.19. I believe this decision to increase this budget will cost the counties millions to the harm these chemicals cause the IRL.

In 2008, the sea grass looked better than 1943. Since 2010, we have lost 98% of sea grass biomass (58% lost compounded with thinning). Even where nutrient loading is good, seagrass is dying suggesting another factor at play.

Since 2011, we have lost almost all the seagrass in the lagoon. What changed in 2011? The muck didn't change. The septic didn't change. The sewage plants didn't change. In fact, FDEP wrote a report in which they said the decline was due to something else other than nutrient loading.

Citizen Recommendation:

The recommendation is for a Moratorium for 2 years on the spraying of glyphosate in any area near the IRL or that drains to the IRL to evaluate the impact.

Unfortunately, currently Florida Statute 487.051(2) preempts cities and counties from enacting any regulations restricting the use of pesticides including herbicide. But Brevard County can at least decrease the use of gylphosate (like other areas of lagoon on that are seeing improvements).

And it is possible that this action may be an cost-effective way to help save the lagoon.

We know the lagoon is resilient - given the 90's lagoon recovery due to the F.S. 403.086 which required Wastewater treatment conversion (deepe injection wells) to AWT preventing raw sewage from going in lagoon regularly. By not using herbicides we could see an equally strong recovery.

This proposal would have the additional cost of aquatic weed control to be funded via the SOIRL Tax, as well as funding FIT (who has testing lab for glyphosate) to measure levels in water near these locations (baseline) in subsequent years of lagoon tax until 2026 to be able to have scientific data to evaluate the impact of the tax use.

Given the CCMP (EPA approved Lagoon Plan) includes pollution and specifically Glyphoshate monitoring, this recommendation would be consistent with the IRL Council agreement and Lagoon Ordinance 16-15 to implement the CCMP. Therefore, it is recommended that baseline measurements be obtained under SOIRL throughout the lagoon for glyphosate.

Staff Analysis:

The Citizen Recommendation statement above includes three requests:

- 1. Adopt a 2-yr moratorium on County use of glyphosate in any area near the Indian River Lagoon;
- 2. Fund aquatic weed control with the Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Tax; and
- 3. Measure glyphosate levels in the IRL to establish baseline conditions and evaluate the impact of a moratorium.

1) Brevard County Public Works stopped using glyphosate in ditches within a half-mile of the lagoon more than 3 years ago. At the same time, Natural Resources and Mosquito Control reduced their use of glyphosate county-wide substantially, which is used only for sites posing human health or safety concerns with no feasible alternative for weed control. Municipalities in Brevard have also been reducing their use of glyphosate. A multi-jurisdictional discussion of lessons learned from experience using alternatives to glyphosate was conducted during the July 2023 Citizen Oversight Committee meeting to help inform future management decisions by all local jurisdictions.

Mosquito Control employs an integrated mosquito management program which utilizes various habitat management (impounded wetland management), biological control (native fish hatchery/ stocking) and cultural control (public education) techniques to protect public health, but US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-approved pesticides ultimately are necessary to support the public health mission as well, and invasive aquatic vegetation control is one of those important tools. Local mosquitoes are known to utilize the shelter of aquatic vegetation during their immature (i.e., larval and pupal) life stages; and invasive aquatic plant species have the capacity to provide significant mosquito breeding habitat when given the opportunity to clog waterways and grow out of control. Glyphosate is known to be effective at controlling such aquatic vegetation, so completely removing it from the rotation could negatively impact public health due to potential increases in mosquitoes and associated disease risk. Nevertheless, Mosquito Control has taken steps to reduce glyphosate usage over the last few years, particularly in areas adjacent to the Lagoon.

Alternative herbicide products and methods are limited, and invasive aquatic vegetation and associated mosquitoes have become more difficult to manage when glyphosate usage has been reduced, so this option has not been more cost-effective thus far.

2) Physical/mechanical removal of vegetation from stormwater ponds and drainage ditches was recognized by the County several years ago as an alternative to aquatic herbicides. Public Works has expanded its fleet of mechanical equipment and added field crews to handle the time-intensive process of mechanical ditch maintenance. Natural Resources has purchased multiple harvesters and added field crews to harvest stormwater ponds.

Aquatic vegetation harvesting was added to the SOIRL Project Plan in 2020 as a project type eligible for funding. Funds are allocated to demonstrate or purchase capital equipment needed to initiate or expand harvesting programs, not to fund seasonal maintenance. Currently, there are 10 vegetation harvesting projects approved in the SOIRL Plan. Of these, 6 have been completed, 3 are underway, and 1 is being withdrawn by the municipality. Entities (municipalities, other government agencies, homeowner associations, etc.) are encouraged to apply for this funding during the annual application cycle.

3) The Ocean Research & Conservation Association, Inc., (ORCA) conducts water column glyphosate testing four times per year at 26 sites in the IRL and annually at 11 sites in Brevard. They also test for glyphosate in fish tissue collected from the lagoon across four counties (Brevard, Indian River, St. Lucie, and Martin).

Florida Institute of Technology conducted a study in 2023, funded by the IRL National Estuary Program, to evaluate the impacts of glyphosate on seagrass. *Ruppia maritima* (widgeon grass) and *Halodule wrightii* (shoal grass) were exposed to three different concentrations of glyphosate for several weeks. This experiment found no statistically significant adverse impacts of acute toxicity at 1 part per million (Fox et. al, 2023), which is more than 1,000 times higher than the 0 to 0.73 parts per billion concentrations measured by ORCA in Brevard over the last five years.

Staff Recommended Action:

- 1) Reject the recommendation to adopt a 2-yr moratorium on the use of glyphosate in any area near the IRL due to its use already being minimized for over 3 years and the County's continuing need for very limited use associated with flood relief and vector control;
- Reject the recommendation to fund aquatic weed control with the Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Tax due to capital expansions of harvesting programs already being funded by SOIRL and maintenance activities not being an eligible expense for SOIRL; and
- 3) Reject the recommendation to measure glyphosate levels in the IRL to establish baseline conditions and the impact of the moratorium due to monitoring already being conducted by ORCA and their findings indicating that lagoon concentrations are 1000 times lower than the concentrations found by a Florida Tech experiment to cause acute toxicity for local seagrass species.

Yes. Article causes much concern and many questions.

The issue of glyphosate (and other herbicides used for aquatic weed control) are not being adequately addressed.

With the amount of glyphosate and other herbicides that are being applied in Florida on residential properties, in stormwater ponds, in stormwater conveyances and along IRL tributary shorelines, it's no big surprise to see bioaccumulation.

Several issues need to be better understood: nutrient loading associated with chemical spraying in aquatic systems (treat vegetation and allow to decay in place); acute and chronic toxicity thresholds; and synergistic impacts of multiple stressors. A recent article in Science is a red flag warning that the chemicals we introduce into aquatic systems can have complex trophic interactions and unforeseen consequences. (https://www.sciencemag.org/news/2021/03/after-more-2-decades-searching-scientists-finger-cause-mass-eagle-deaths).



Bioaccumulation of glyphosate in IRL manatees is not surprising considering it's the one of the most commonly and intensively used herbicide to manage aquatic plants along the lagoon. Unfortunately there is a lack of data on glyphosate and the IRL.



From a nutrient management standpoint, chemically treating shoreline vegetation, killing it and letting it decompose in place makes no sense to me. It's no different than throwing grass clippings in the Lagoon.

Three research papers that keep me up at night are attached: 1. Impacts to the seagrass Ruppia; 2. Impacts to microalgae/cyanobacteria growth (lab study): 3. Persistence in seawater.

The combination of ecological concerns and documented human health concerns strongly suggest that we need to re-think glyphosate use in the IRL watershed.

Staff Analysis:

The Board of County Commissioners (the Board) revised the Uniform Advisory Board Ordinance (the Ordinance) in 2022. These revisions included a list of advisory boards on the County's website, consideration of a member's absence, meeting frequencies, time, and location of advisory board meetings, requiring advisory boards to submit annual written reports, and dissolution of advisory boards by the Board. At that time, the formation of advisory boards remained except for the consolidated Parks and Recreation and Library advisory boards. This consolidation reduced the number of County advisory boards.

The advisory board staff liaison monitors each advisory board activity for compliance with the Ordinance. On October 10, 2023, staff brought forward, and the Board approved a restructuring of the South/Central Brevard Parks and Recreation Advisory Board to address the lack of quorum that had occurred.

Additionally, we have advisory board information on the County's website, which provides the public with a continuous process of applying for advisory boards that they are interested in serving. With this continuous acceptance of applications, the County can replace members who are not meeting the attendance requirements established by the Board and avoid an advisory board not meeting a quorum.

Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject this recommendation as the Board has already established a process that addresses advisory board participation in Sections 2-213 (5) and (6) of the Brevard County Codes of Ordinances.

Citizen Statement:

Certain parks in Brevard are Tourism Parks with Premium Amenities, such as Lifeguards, showers, bathrooms, playgrounds etc. These parks are more expensive to maintain and are a burden to Brevard County residents as well on the local cities (like Cocoa Beach, Lori Wilson) to provide Fire/Police services. The cost of Lifeguards is being born by the Brevard County taxpayers while the cities benefit by collecting the increased parking revenue as a result of these premium service. Brevard County residents are paying multiple cities (or their passes) to access former county parks. The issue is Brevard County is giving away the Tax-payer paid parks Paid to Cities who then charge for parking. This creates double taxation because we pay for parks and recreation in our tax bill. Then as more cities have acquired over the years, former County parks, we have multiple taxation at each park. Brevard County Parks like Lori Wilson, are a burden to the local city who respond with Fire/Police. This ties into the sneaky vote with another agenda label where Brevard passed using TDC tax for Lifeguards. There are legal challenges that may come from that vote. The legal issue per Attorney General is you can only use the TDC tax for what was in the ballot - which did not include Lifeguards; and AG also did legal opinion cannot be used for Lifeguards. Satellite Beach council member, at the State Delegates requested state change the law to allow TDC tax to be used for Lifeguards. I believe it is a bad decision to cheat the Brevard County residents out of equal access to the parks the Brevard Taxpayers helped the County acquire with each city have its own fees that vary across the County while the cities profit while Brevard County continues to provide lifeguards at these

parks, i.e. Nance Park (acquired under Save the Coast). I would like to thus propose a solution. Nance (premium facilities paid for by Brevard, Lifeguard paid for by Brevard, playground funded by State) - park funded by County under Save the Coast program with matching funds from state. THERE IS NO SIGN TO SAY A PARKING PASS IS AVAILABLE BECAUSE CITY WANTS THE REVENUE - this is cheating the brevard County residents. Hightower and Pelican Parks in Satellite Beach - former County Parks given to city - is charging a differential in fee but County refuses to enforce their Interlocal Agreement and Deed Restriction (golf carts, rental cars, tourists from out of Country). The bad publicity on a daily basis from the poor management of these facilities is bad for tourism.

Citizen Recommendation:

Proposed Solution: Brevard Designation Premium Tourism Parks Program with interlocal agreement with Cities 1. To charge for Parking at "Tourism Designated Parks' as defined as those County parks which have Lifeguards provided by the County and have a minimum number of parking spaces - i.e. State Sand Renourishment defines Tourism Parks as having 100 parking spaces. Many people, i.e. some I know from Viera want Premium services - so in additional to Tourists, this provides more facilities for locals who want to pay for a premium parks. 2. County sells a "Premium Park Annual Pass" decal per tag for frequent visitors and locals to these Premium Parks as part of the interlocal agreement. This could be handled by Tax Office (collects a handling charge). The barrier island is not open to residents until the causeways are inspected. Once the bridges open, BCSO checks driver licenses to allow access. So if the premium parking decal was a different color for barrier island residents, these vehicles could be fast tracked back onto the barrier island by BSCO without the need to check drivers license residency.

Staff Analysis:

The Board of County Commissioners has reviewed and discussed the subject of paid parking several times in the past. Each time, the Board collectively has made clear its desire not to have parking fees associated with any County owned or operated beach access park. Thus, this CEER recommendation conflicts with the Board's previously stated policy direction.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024036 as it is inconsistent with the direction previously provided by the Board.

Citizen Recommendation:

Brevard needs to add an impact fee for parks so that developers are paying their share for this added growth. Yes, I realize this gets passed onto the new homebuyer in these new areas.

Other Counties, like Fort Lauderdale, have this impact fee. In this way, developers would be contributing to the added cost of parks needed for the rapid development Brevard is experiencing.

Staff Analysis:

As the problem statement associated with this request mentions Viera, it should be noted that the infrastructure requirements associated with the need for parks as the DRI develops is addressed through Development Order. As of the 2022 status report, the developer had donated 161.7 acres for parks west of I-95. An additional 208 acres may be donated under the Order as development benchmarks are met.

The County's Policy as it relates to the acceptable level of service for total developed acreage of County owned or managed parks is governed by Chapter 3, Policy 1.3 of the Comprehensive Plan. It states that there should be 3 acres per 1,000 people living in unincorporated Brevard County. The County currently exceeds this target. Additionally, the imposition of an impact fee is governed by statutory requirements. See e.g. Fla. Stat. Sec. 163.31801. In order to impose an impact fee related to Parks, the County would need to demonstrate a need.

Any impact fee imposed as a result of a study demonstrating a need would need to be "proportional and reasonably connected to, or has a rational nexus with, the expenditures of the funds collected and the benefits accruing to the new residential or nonresidential construction."

The Parks and Recreation Department continues to improve annually with increasing maintenance and capital expenditures, included in each year's budget since 2017/2018, the County has invested \$90.8 million in over 150 Capital Improvement Projects across the County Park system, including playgrounds, field renovations, field lighting, pavilions and crossovers, docks, and boardwalk replacements.

Unfortunately, we do not know if someone has already done a records request for the information we want. It would save on staff time (for duplicating work), if all records requests fulfilled were online and searchable.

Citizen Recommendation:

Requesting Brevard County create a page on their website which has all of the Public Records Requests (fulfilled) in a table with a link to the digital response files provided.

Staff Analysis:

Access to Brevard County's records is governed by Florida's Public Records law, Chapter 119 of the Florida Statutes. Administrative Order 47, Coordination of Public Records Requests, outlines Brevard County's procedures for processing and responding to public records requests. County staff uses the Public Records Request Software to respond to public records requests.

Currently, the results of fulfilled public records requests are not available on the County's website. However, anyone can request the results of a previously fulfilled public records request.

If all fulfilled public records requests were made available on a publicly accessible page on the County's website, changes would need to be made to the way public records requests are

processed. These changes would increase the amount of staff time devoted to public records. Staff would need to ensure all documents comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act before making them available on the County's website. Optical character recognition would need to be performed on scanned paper documents for a search function to be able to read the documents. Fulfilled public records requests resulting in large file sizes would need to be broken into multiple smaller files by staff to allow access by a variety of operating systems and prevent lengthy download times. The Records Coordinator would need to devote additional time to working with department Records Custodians to achieve compliance and uniformity across all County departments on these additional tasks.

Additional consideration would need to be given to review and redaction of documents if all fulfilled public records requests were available to the public online. For example, the County routinely receives property-related records requests from property owners whose home address is exempt from public disclosure. An unredacted copy of the record may be given to the property owner, but it would need to be redacted before being made available to the public on the County's website to prevent disclosure of exempt records.

The Brevard County Information Technology Department developed the Public Records Request Software currently used by staff. This department would be responsible for developing and implementing a public-facing search function for fulfilled public records requests. Development would take a minimum of a few months for a search function that searches the title and description fields for fulfilled requests, or longer for a more complex search function that searches the fulfilled request documents themselves.

The search function would need to be compatible across multiple operating systems and prioritize user-friendliness. However, the effectiveness of any search function can be compromised by several factors. For example, if a requestor misspells a search term or uses acronyms or abbreviations, the search function may fail to yield the desired results.

Adoption of this recommendation would result in a significant increase in staff time spent on public records requests and require a minimum of a few months of development time by the IT Department. The results of previously fulfilled public records requests are already available upon request. It is anticipated that implementing this recommendation would have limited utility for a small number of citizens.

Staff Analysis:

Section 212.055, Florida Statutes, entitled "Discretionary sales surtaxes; legislative intent; authorization and use of proceeds" authorizes discretionary sales surtaxes.

Section 212.055(2), Florida Statutes, entitled the "Local Government Infrastructure Surtax" specifically states that the "governing authority in each county," i.e., the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners, may levy a discretionary sales surtax of 0.5 percent or 1 percent.

Section 212.055(6), Florida Statutes, entitled the "School Capital Outlay Surtax" specifically states that the school board of each county may levy a discretionary sales surtax at a rate that may not exceed 0.5 percent. Section 212.055(6)(d) further states that surtax revenues collected by the Department of Revenue shall be distributed to the school board.

On July 31, 2014, the School Board of Brevard County, acting as the governing body of the School District of Brevard County, Florida, passed Resolution 2014-01, finding:

Section 212.055(6) of the Florida Statutes authorizes the levy of a one-half cent school capital outlay surtax for the purposes of funding school projects in capital

outlay, school security and technology needs, upon approval by a majority vote of the electors of Brevard County. Proceeds will be used for critical improvements to school facilities, school security and technology needs.

On November 4, 2014, the one-half cent school capital outlay surtax was approved by a majority vote of the electors of Brevard County, and the levy of the tax was for the period of January 1, 2015 to December 31, 2020.

On November 3, 2020, a majority of the electors of Brevard County voted to "extend the existing half-cent surtax approved by voters in 2014, to upgrade aging schools in Brevard County with critical school facility renewal projects, school security and technology modernizations that keep schools safe and conducive to learning...for six years."

The Brevard County School Board's half-cent surtax is a school capital outlay surtax levied pursuant to Section 212.055(6), Florida Statutes and it has been extended, or renewed, once. The School Board's half-cent surtax is not a local government infrastructure surtax. Further, pursuant to Section 212.055(6)(d), Florida Statutes, the school capital outlay surtax revenue collected by the Florida Department of Revenue is distributed to the Brevard County School Board, the governing body of the School District of Brevard County. Moreover, under subsection 2.9.3.1 of the Brevard County Home Rule Charter, the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners does not have any power of review of the budget of the School District.

In conclusion, the premise of this citizen recommendation is that the Brevard County School Board's half-cent school capital outlay surtax is an unauthorized second local government infrastructure surtax adopted pursuant to Section 212.055(2), Florida Statutes. The School Board's half-cent school capital outlay surtax is separately authorized by Section 212.055(6), Florida Statutes, and the Board of County Commissioners is without jurisdiction to "eliminate" such surtax as recommended.

The FIT studies document the top 20 muck flux sites which do not include the canals being dredged in. Many of the muck projects of the Lagoon Plan are canals.

A promise was made to follow the science, and the science is provided and we are not following it.

Essentially the taxpayers of Brevard are paying for the richest property owner canal dredging - where seagrass does NOT grow.

The lagoon plan indicated removing muck which impedes seagrass from growing. Seagrass grows in the IRL not canals, where for the most part lagoon tax is not dredging.

Further, there is a legal requirement of the Infrastructure tax that it is spent on capital projects. The BOCC of 2016 warned that Brevard would be sued for use of this tax for MUCK dredging which is maintenance - so failure to address this problem could be a fiscal cost for Brevard. The people care about the lagoon. What is not in the lagoon plan is pollution as required by the CCMP (EPA approved NEP plan); and AWT sewage plant updgrades as promised in BOCC meetings and numerous Florida Today articles that helped sell the idea of the Lagoon Tax.

Please adjust the lagoon plan accordingly to be legally compliant.

Staff Analysis:

The Citizen Recommendation statement above includes three requests:

- 1. Reduce the number of muck dredging projects in the Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Project Plan;
- 2. Include Advanced Wastewater Treatment upgrades in the SOIRL Project Plan; and
- 3. Follow the science.
- 1) Muck dredging projects significantly improve water quality, water clarity, dissolved oxygen levels in the water, and the potential for seagrass recovery. Dr. John Trefry calculated nearly a decade ago that without dredging, the amount of excess nutrients being released by decaying muck deposits would continue to feed harmful algal blooms for more than 100 years. To heal the lagoon in time for current generations to enjoy it, sources of pollution must be reduced and existing pollution accumulated in muck deposits must be removed.



The Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Plan is updated annually. The 2024 Update was brought to the County Commission for consideration on February 20th. Figure 1 shows the annual allocation of SOIRL funds by project type, with a large decrease in allocation for muck removal in 2019 and a nearly constant allocation since 2019. The initial plan that was posted for public review prior to the 2016 vote for the tax allocated 66% of the funds for muck removal. The 2019 Plan Update reduced the funding for muck to 43% (30% for removal plus 13% for interstitial treatment of the water that is separated from the muck). The adopted 2023 Plan Update allocates 37% of the funding for muck (26% for muck removal plus 11% for interstitial treatment). The 2024 Plan Update also allocates 37% of the funding for muck (29% for muck removal and 8% for interstitial treatment).

- 2) Upgrading Wastewater Treatment Plants to tertiary treatment levels was included in the initial plan that was posted for public review prior to the 2016 vote for the tax. The 2016 Plan allocated 3% for this purpose. This allocation increased to 7% in the 2019 Plan Update and has been at a constant 6% every year thereafter.
- 3) The SOIRL Project Plan is based on science and the economic principle of return on investment. Cost effectiveness is calculated for every individual project. The performance of different project types is measured in the field and summarized in the annual updates. Actual costs, measured benefits, new scientific data and publications are used each year to update the cost effectiveness calculations. Muck dredging priorities are based on years of field work funded by the Florida Legislature in the Indian River Lagoon. The latest results of Drs. Fox and Trefry were published in December in the journal, Frontiers in Marine Science.

CEER #2024042 was received by the County from Sandra Sullivan.

Citizen Statement:

Brevard is historical development growth with increasing needs for transportation dollars. According to TPO we have a fiscal cliff coming on transportation. Declining gas Tax revenues. FDOT District 5 has only allocated less than 5% to transportation capacity needs in next 5 years. The availability of funding is compounded with SB102, developers will get 75% discount on property tax on those middle america units; and with latest vote, our commissions thought it wise to give these developers an exemption on transportation imact fees. According to County budget 2024, Brevard has a \$699 million deficit on transportation capacity needs.

Transportation impact fees have not been updated in nearly quarter century - despite paving costs up nearly 26.6% and materials up 17% this year alone according to FDOT 5 last TPO meeting in December 2023. The last transportation Impact fee study in 2016 recommended a 65% increase on single family homes.

(b) An increase to a current impact fee rate of not more than 25 percent of the current rate must be implemented in two equal annual increments beginning with the date on which the increased fee is adopted.

(c) An increase to a current impact fee rate which exceeds 25 percent but is not more than 50 percent of the current rate must be implemented in four equal installments beginning with the date the increased fee is adopted.

CFX tried in 2021 to take over our east/west corridors (520, 192, 528) to turn them into toll roads. This would be a burden on residents and small business alike, which could be devastating during an economic downturn. Once you agree to hand off those roads, you can't ever get them back. Google MDX and Miami and see the lawsuits. This would be a bad deal for Brevard. Brevard residents would rather fund these roads for a few years with a surtax than a permanent tax by CFX.

The concern is whether the state is intentionally not funding capacity needs to push Brevard onto CFX where tolls would fund these capacity needs. The problem with that is all toll revenue goes to Central Florida. Let's be proactive.

Citizen Recommendation:

The recommendation is to proactively fund transportation capacity needs:

- 1. Do Transportation Impact Fee study to determine needs for tax adjustment
- 2. Proactively start a half cent Transportation Infrastructure Surtax

You would be in good company for increasing impact fees - so not to burden all the taxpayers. As the Brevard School Infrastructure surtax terms out in 2026, it is recommended that Brevard proactively initiate a 1 cent sales Infrastructure Sales Surtax to address:

- 1. 1/2 cent Lagoon and related sewage infrastructure (lagoon renewal with changes).
- 2. 1/2 cent Transportation infrastructure

It is my understanding that this planning would need begin in 2024 with referendum language.

- (1) CHARTER COUNTY AND REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM SURTAX.—
- (a) Each charter county that has adopted a charter, each county the government of which is consolidated with that of one or more municipalities, and each county that is within or under an interlocal agreement with a regional transportation or transit authority created under chapter 343 or chapter 349 may levy a discretionary sales surtax, subject to approval by a majority vote of the electorate of the county or by a charter amendment approved by a majority vote of the electorate of the county.

The half cent sales portion of the tax for transportation can also help with the cost of replacing causeways into fixed bridges for matching funds from the state and federal government. The causeways are where most of the muck accumulates according to the FIT scientific reports.

Staff Analysis:

A detailed evaluation of existing capacity and maintenance backlog issues as well as potential revenue generating options was conducted by Public Works in February 2022. It included the requirements and process for implementing the Infrastructure Sales Tax as well as several other alternatives. It was forwarded to the Board for further review and consideration.

In 2015, an Impact Fee Study was completed at a cost of approximately \$164,000 (\$44,000 of which was expressly related to the Transportation Impact Fee element). In September of 2016, the Board elected to allow a moratorium on Transportation Impact Fees that was imposed at the time to sunset, accepted the Impact Fee Study, and retained the current fee schedule (the Transportation Impact fee was last modified in 2006, based on a study from 2000). In Fiscal Year 2023, the County collected \$15,255,352 in Transportation Impact Fees.

In order to adopt a higher fee, certain statutory procedures must be adhered to. This would include any increase being based on the most recent localized data. Depending on the percentage increase, a study and workshops may be required, the fee increase may have to be imposed incrementally, and it may require a 2/3 vote of the Board. It should be noted that, at all times, it is the duty of the County to ensure such impact fees are "proportional and reasonably connected to, or has a rational nexus with, the need for additional capital facilities and the increased impact generated by the new residential or commercial construction," and "the impact fee is proportional and reasonably connected

to, or has a rational nexus with, the expenditures of the funds collected and the benefits accruing to the new residential or nonresidential construction." As impact fees generally may not be increased more than once every 4 years, these fees cannot be indexed to CPI.

Staff Recommended Action:

Staff recommends adhering to current Board direction, absent other Board direction such as modifying Brevard County Code of Ordinances and fee schedules to implement the 2015 impact fee study or conducting a new study.

Absent new Board direction, staff recommends rejecting CEER # 2024042.

FDOT District 5 has only allocated less than 5% to transportation capacity needs in next 5 years. The availability of funding is compounded with SB102, developers will get 75% discount on property tax on those middle america units; and with latest vote, our commissions thought it wise to give these developers an exemption on transportation imact fees. According to County budget 2024, Brevard has a \$699 million deficit on transportation capacity needs.

Problem Description:

Transportation impact fees have not been updated in nearly quarter century - despite paving costs up nearly 26.6% and materials up 17% this year alone according to FDOT 5 last TPO meeting in December 2023. The concern is our Commission will put the cost of infrastructure burden on you the taxpayer. We need to fix impact fees so developers pay their share of infrastructure. Look at the Growth in Port St. John - Sewage plant went from 85% - 96% capacity in half a year. Now you are scambling to figure out how to pay for a new sewage plant that costs \$170 million. A plant replacement was \$50 million in 2018. Despite the skyrocking cost of infrastructure (over 30% in a year), impact fees have not been increased in 32 years. They don't even have a CPI increase - which is imperative.

RESIDENTS GOT AN INCREASE IN infrastructure tax on April 7th commission meeting, while the developers do not get an inflation increase in infrastructure impact tax. Brevard raised your sewer tax 4.41% for inflation in April another increase following last year.

The concern is ultimately the taxpayers are going to be burdened with the cost of infrastructure because our commissioners do the will of the lobbyists and developers #WeTheMoney vs #WeThePeople. The BOCC cancelled the Budget Workshop in Feb 2023, to hide the severity of the infrastructure needs. Like the dump, which the commissioners kicked the can down the road on a decision until Sarno ran out of dump space - for a dump that takes 5 years to build. It is the concern, that this crisis management is also happening for infrastructure. For that reason, additional tax burden on the people will be coming.

"The charter provision? which was approved by county voters in 2008 with 73.12% support? generally limits the amount the county can increase property tax revenues to the lesser of 3% or the rate of inflation.

However, the commissioners can surpass that cap if four of five agree there is a "critical need" to do so."

Citizen Recommendation:

Brevard County needs to initiate an Impact Fee study to avoid tax increases to the property tax. Doing an impact fee study was discussed at the Budget workshop in 2021 but no action followed up the discussion though clearly the need is there.

Should be giving development credits for redevelopment due to the period of time that has passed 20-60 years we are in a new infrastructure cycle.

A study would look at the projected infrastructure costs with anticipated growth projects and be able to determine fees appropriate with Brevard as fastest growing area of Florida.

Obviously the growth areas has changed in decades - and a need for a new impact fee study is paramount.

To Commission Feltner's comment that this increased tax would be passed by the developer onto the new home - yes, that may be, but it should not be passed onto everyone who have already paid their share for impact fees incorporated into their home cost.

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Staff Analysis:

As defined under Florida Stat. Sec. 200.065, the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners have not raised taxes in any of the last 7 years. In 2015, an Impact Fee Study was completed at a cost of approximately \$164,000. In September of 2016, the Board elected to allow a moratorium on Transportation Impact Fee that was imposed at the time to sunset, accepted the Impact Fee Study, and retained the current fee schedule (the Transportation Impact fee was last was adopted in 2006). The County collected \$44,805,096 in aggregate impact fees in Fiscal Year 2023.

In order to adopt a higher fee, certain statutory procedures must be adhered to. This would include any increase being based on the most recent localized data. Depending on the percentage increase, a study and workshops may be required, the fee increase may have to be imposed incrementally, and it may require a 2/3 vote of the Board. It should be noted that, at all times, it is the duty of the County to ensure such impact fees are "proportional and reasonably connected to, or has a rational nexus with, the need for additional capital facilities and the increased impact generated by the new residential or commercial construction," and "the impact fee is proportional and reasonably connected to, or has a rational nexus with, the expenditures of the funds collected and the benefits accruing to the new residential or nonresidential construction" (see Fla. Stat. Sec. 163.31801). As impact fees generally may not be increased more than once every 4 years, these fees cannot be indexed to CPI.

County staff adheres to Statutory requirements in its assignments of impact fee credits.

Staff Recommended Action:

Staff recommends adhering to current Board direction, absent other Board direction such as modifying Brevard County Code of Ordinances and fee schedules to implement the 2015 impact fee study or conducting a new study.

Absent new Board direction, staff recommends rejecting CEER # 2024044.

CEER #2024045 was received by the County from Sandra Sullivan, affiliated with the group WAVESaction LLC.

Citizen Statement:

When Hightower and Pelican Beach parks (unfunded liabilities) were given to the then insolvent city of Satellite Beach in 2012 (D4 Commissioner then a resident of Satellite Beach), the interlocal agreement and deed restrictions required no differential in fee. The whole deal, given the alleged embellment of CRA moneies as documented by state agency raises questions on that transaction, since the city did not have the means to maintain the parks. The only good news is that these beach parks had deed restrictions and interlocal agreement. We the taxpayers who funded the acquisition of our County Parks through our taxes - and expect the deed restrictions to be enforced. Unfortunately, Satellite Beach's Parking Management plan creates a differential in fee – a violation of those agreements. 1. Only golf carts from Satellite Beach are exempted for parking (other golf carts cannot park). IHB and SPS golf carts cannot park at Hightower or Pelican without getting booted. 2. Rental cars cannot get a parking pass which means snowbirds (who may even have winter residences) who fly here cannot get a free annual parking pass. 3. Anyone from outside the US who comes to visit – for extended stay – cannot get a free annual parking pass. i.e., my sister comes to visit each winter for a few weeks. The constant booting of tourists is bad for tourism- and are harming IMO our tourism - yet they want TDT monies for lifeguards. There are many instances of questionable booting of people who claim to have a pass. Further while the County owned these parks,

Hightower was funded by a federal agreement for the bathrooms, boardwalk and beach access. This LW541 agreement required the Hightower park (FCT and County park) to remain conservation lands in perpetuity. The conservation easement on Hightower former County Park has been removed which would be another violation of the park interlocal agreement and deed restrictions. Lastly, the county was a joint application partner with Satellite Beach on the FCT state land acquisition. Again there are alleged violation of those agreements which the county was party to those agreements and made the required Comprehensive Plan changes including (capping density, no moving density bonus, etc.)

Citizen Recommendation:

Enforce the deed restrictions and interlocal agreement for Hightower/Pelican Parks and take back these parks back as Brevard County parks to facilitate all the above issues above. This is owed to the taxpayers of Brevard as the responsible action.

Staff Analysis:

When Brevard County conveyed Hightower Beach Park and Pelican Beach Park to the City of Satellite Beach in 2012, the deeds¹ included the following deed restriction in pertinent part,

The property described in Exhibit "A" is to be used solely as a public beach park and for purposes providing public recreational use and related activities.... Any user fees required by the City must be applied uniformly with no differential in the amount charged to the public.... In the event this Property is not used or ceases to be used for the stated purpose and under the stated conditions, then all right, title and interest in the Property shall revert to the party of the first part (County) which shall thereafter have the right to reenter and repossess the Property conveyed herein.... (Parenthetical added).

In 2022, the City of Satellite Beach proposed a beach parking fee program that would have imposed a user fee on non-City residents to park at Hightower Beach Park and Pelican Beach Park, while allowing City residents to park for free. On November 9, 2022, at the direction of the Board of County Commissioners, the County Attorney sent correspondence to Satellite Beach objecting to the proposed program and expressing the Board's intent to take action to enforce the deed restrictions. That correspondence is attached.

¹ The deed for land commonly known as Hightower Beach Park was recorded on May 9, 2012, at OR Book 6597, Page 592, in the Public Records of Brevard County, and the deed for land commonly known as Pelican Beach Park was recorded on May 9, 2012, at OR Book 6597, Page 785, in the Public Records of Brevard County.

In response to that correspondence, Satellite Beach substantially revised its parking fee program to comply with the deed restrictions. As adopted, the Satellite Beach Annual Beach Parking Permit Program² allows residents of the City and non-residents alike to apply for annual parking permits to park at Hightower Beach Park and Pelican Beach Park at no cost. To obtain the annual parking permit, a person must apply online and show proof of a valid registration and ownership of the vehicle. These requirements apply to both residents and non-residents, alike. Therefore, whether an applicant is a resident or non-resident, if he or she does not own the vehicle which he or she would like to park, he or she cannot apply for the annual permit. For those persons without an annual parking permit, the cost is \$2.50 per hour or \$10 per day, irrespective of whether the person is a resident or non-resident. The deed restriction requiring the user fees to be applied uniformly with no differential in the amount charged to the public, therefore, is not violated.

The information from Satellite Beach's Beach Parking program indicates owners of golf carts (LSVs) registered with the State of Florida, and not registered with the city of Satellite Beach, will need to obtain annual permits for parking (which are at no cost). Owners of golf carts which are registered with the City are not required to obtain an annual permit, and similar to non-resident LSVs, they also park at no cost. Golf carts which are not registered with the State or with the City are not allowed to park at Hightower Beach Park and Pelican Beach Park, regardless of whether they are owned by a resident or non-resident.³

Brevard County is not aware of any current violation of the restrictions in the Hightower Beach Park or Pelican Beach Park deeds relative to the LW541 agreement referenced in the CEER, nor is the County a party to that agreement.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024045, as the Board of County Commissioners already enforces the deed restrictions when an actual violation is threatened or occurs.

Dear Honorable Mayor Osmer and City Council Members:

I write to you at the direction of the Board of County Commissioners of Brevard County. On November 2, 2022, the Satellite Beach City Council approved on first reading proposed Ordinance No. 1228. If adopted, the ordinance will create a beach parking fee program applicable to the City's public beach accesses and beach parking areas. This includes two beach parks — Pelican Beach Park and Hightower Beach Park — which were formerly owned by Brevard County. The deeds transferring Pelican Beach Park and Hightower Beach Park from Brevard County to the City of Satellite Beach each contain the following deed restriction: "Any user fees required by the City must be applied uniformly with no differential in amount charged to the public."

The ordinance professes that "the City has designed a Beach Parking Fee Program to meet the deed restrictions...." However, as explained herein, the annual parking permit program set forth in Ordinance No. 1228 clearly creates a differential user fee and thus violates the deed restrictions.

Ordinance No. 1228 will impose a user fee on non-City residents in the form of a \$25 per year, per vehicle charge to obtain a parking permit. City residents, however, will not be required to pay any user fee in order to obtain a parking permit. Rather, the City will "pay for" resident parking permits by transferring ad valorem tax revenues from its general fund to a new beach park maintenance restricted fund. The agenda report for the first reading of Ordinance No. 1228 described the scheme as follows:

The Committee felt that since the City residents already pay for the maintenance of the parks and accesses through their taxes, that the Annual Permits for the City residents would be paid by the residents' taxes in the amount of the permit per vehicle, and that non-City residents should pay for Annual Permits for their vehicle. ...Our position is that the Committee's strategy meets the terms of the Deed Restrictions since the Annual Permit charge is the same. The only caveat is that the City is paying for the cost of our residents' permits with their own taxes. (emphasis supplied).

The central problem with the City's strategy is that, by definition, a user fee is not a tax, and a tax is not a user fee. The most significant traits that distinguish user fees from taxes are (1) user fees are charged in exchange for a particular government service, (2) the service provided benefits the party paying the fee in a manner not shared by other members of society, and (3) user fees are paid by choice, in that the party paying the fee has the option of not utilizing the governmental service and thereby avoiding the charge. See I-4 Commerce Center, Phase II, Unit I v. Orange County, 46 So. 3d 134, 136 (Fla. 5th DCA 2010); Gargano v. Lee County, 921 So.2d 661, 667-68 (Fla. 2d DCA 2006) (citing State v. City of Port Orange, 650 So. 2d 1, 3 (Fla. 1994)).

Ordinance No. 1228 will not impose a user fee on City residents. City residents will not pay for a parking permit, but rather, the City will pay for resident permits with City tax revenues. The party paying for the permit will not receive benefits in a manner not shared by other members of society, because the City, not the resident, is the party making payment, while the resident enjoys the benefit. Finally, City residents have no ability to avoid paying for the resident parking permit program, as the program is funded by ad valorem taxes. Whether a City resident elects to obtain one parking permit, ten permits, or no permit will have no impact on that resident's City ad valorem taxes.

The fact that the ordinance will create a user fee only as to non-City residents was further illustrated by a slide titled "Estimated Annual Revenue" presented at the November 2 City Council meeting. That slide indicated that non-resident permit user fees would generate an estimated \$30,000 in new revenue annually. However, City resident permits were not estimated to generate any new revenue, because residents would not actually be charged for the permits. The slide noted that the charge for resident permits would be "deducted from general fund," and that "permittees see no charge."

Ordinance No. 1228 creates a program in which non-City residents will be charged a \$25 annual user fee per vehicle, while City residents will not be charged a user fee at all. That plainly violates the Pelican Beach Park and Hightower Beach Park deed restrictions requiring that any user fee be applied uniformly with no differential in amount. The Board of County Commissioners intends to take action to assure that the City honors its legal commitments and complies with the deed restrictions.

Through this letter, the County has now communicated clearly in writing exactly how the City's proposed parking fee program violates the deed restrictions. I trust that this information will inform your further consideration of Ordinance No. 1228. Should you have any questions, I will be happy to discuss this matter with Attorney Beadle and your professional staff.

When Hightower and Pelican Beach parks (unfunded liabilities) were given to the then insolvent city of Satellite Beach in 2012 (D4 Commissioner then a resident of Satellite Beach), the interlocal agreement and deed restrictions required no differential in fee. The whole deal, given the alleged embellment of CRA moneies as documented by state agency raises questions on that transaction, since the city did not have the means to maintain the parks.

Problem
Description:

The only good news is that these beach parks had deed restrictions and interlocal agreement. We the taxpayers who funded the acquisition of our County Parks through our taxes - and expect the deed restrictions to be enforced.

Unfortunately, Satellite Beach's Parking Management plan creates a differential in fee - a violation of those agreements.

- Only golf carts from Satellite Beach are exempted for parking (other golf carts cannot park). IHB and SPS golf carts cannot park at Hightower or Pelican without getting booted.
- 2. Rental cars cannot get a parking pass which means snowbirds (who may even have winter residences) who fly here cannot get a free annual parking pass.
- 3. Anyone from outside the US who comes to visit for extended stay cannot get a free annual parking pass. i.e. my sister comes to visit each winter for a few weeks.

The constant booting of tourists is bad for tourism - and are harming IMO our tourism - yet they want TDT monies for lifeguards. There are many instances of questionable booting of people who claim to have a pass.

Further while the County owned these parks, Hightower was funded by a federal agreement for the bathrooms, boardwalk and beach access. This LW541 agreement required the Hightower park (FCT and County park) to remain conservation lands in perpetuity. The conservation easement on Hightower former County park has been removed which would be another violation of the park interlocal agreement and deed restrictions.

Lastly, the county was a Joint application partner with Satellite Beach on the FCT state land acquisition. Again there are alleged violation of those agreements which the county was party to those agreements and made the required Comprehensive Plan changes including (capping density, no moving density bonus, etc).

Enforce the deed restrictions and interlocal agreement for Hightower/Pelican Parks and take back these parks back as Brevard County parks to facilitate all the above issues above. This is owed to the taxpayers of Brevard as the responsible action.

Staff Analysis:

Citizen Recommendation: Prohibit Non-Emergency Votes Under Board Reports

Meetings of the Board of County Commissioners are subject to Florida's Government in the Sunshine Law, section 286.011, Florida Statutes, commonly referred to as the Sunshine Law. The Sunshine Law does not mandate that an agency provide notice of each item to be discussed via a published agenda. The courts have rejected such a requirement because it could effectively preclude access to meetings by members of the public who wish to bring specific issues before a governmental body. See Hough v. Stembridge, 278 So. 2d 288 (Fla. 3d DCA 1973); Yarbrough v. Young, 462 So. 2d 515 (Fla. 1st DCA 1985). Accordingly, the Sunshine Law does not require the Board of County Commissioners to consider only those matters on a published agenda.

The Board of County Commissioners occasionally conducts business of a non-emergency nature during Board reports. Should a controversial matter arise during Board Reports, the Board of County Commissioners will exercise its good judgment and discretion in deciding whether to vote on the matter, or to postpone its consideration to a future meeting.

Pursuant to section 2.9.6 of the Brevard County Home Rule Charter, the Board of County Commissioners has adopted policy BCC-97, providing rules of parliamentary procedures for the orderly transaction of business. Significantly, any provision of such rules may be suspended by majority vote of, or waived by, the Board of County Commissioners to the extent such a suspension or waiver would not be inconsistent with applicable law. *See* sections III. K.1. and III.M, BCC-97. Thus, even if the Board amended BCC-97 as recommended by the citizen, the Board could suspend or waive such a prohibition against voting during Board reports.

Citizen Recommendation: Prohibit Cancellation of Budget Workshops

The Board of County Commissioners schedules its meetings to occur regularly throughout a given year, and the schedule of meetings is typically approved by the Board prior to the upcoming calendar year. Other than the hearings (not workshops) required by the Florida Truth in Millage process to adopt the County's budget for the upcoming fiscal year, there is no requirement to hold additional budget development meetings, including workshops. Whether to schedule a budget workshop, or to cancel or postpone a scheduled workshop, is a discretionary decision for the Board of County Commissioners.

Citizen Recommendation: Require Commissioners to Report on Assignments in Board Reports

There is no statutory, Charter, or Code of Ordinances requirement that commissioners provide updates on the various board and committee meetings they are assigned to attend during the

Board Reports portion of meetings. The subject matter of each commissioner's Board report is left to the discretion of the individual commissioners.



Staff Analysis:

Citizen Recommendation: Fiscal Impact Statement for SB102 (2023) for next 30 years

Senate Bill 102 (2023), the Live Local Act, was drafted to allow for certain affordable housing projects to be entitled to potentially full or partial ad valorem tax exemptions depending on the type of project being developed. For example, pursuant to the updated language in Section 196.1978(3), Florida Statutes, a qualified property may be entitled to an ad valorem property tax exemption of 75 percent or 100 percent depending on the project. To be eligible for these

exemptions, the property owner needs to satisfy certain criteria and submit the necessary paperwork to the property appraiser. The statute ultimately will allow certain projects to be exempt from ad valorem property tax when they otherwise would not have been.

While the specific financial impacts to counties were not specifically identified by the Florida Legislature, a general statement was made in the Staff Analysis for the Live Local Act that provided, in pertinent part, as follows: "[I]ocal governments may incur expenditures and lost revenues in implementing [the Live Local Act] with regards to . . . administering new ad valorem tax exemptions. . . ."

A fiscal impact statement of the Live Local Act would be of limited benefit to County operations. The Live Local Act, as it relates to land use matters, is a mandate that the County is bound by law to adhere to, regardless of its fiscal impact. Additionally, any fiscal analysis would involve broad speculation.

Citizen Recommendation: Join Pasco County's Suit against the State to Determine the Constitutionality of SB102 (2023)

At the time of this writing, Pasco County has not filed suit against the State regarding the Live Local Act. The recommendation to join Pasco County in its lawsuit against the State should be rejected. After conferring with the Pasco County Attorney's Office, Pasco County is not presently in the process of suing the State of Florida over the constitutionality of the Live Local Act. While the County can continue to monitor legal challenges to the Live Local Act, Pasco County has not initiated a case for the County to join.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024048.

Citizen Statement:

I was alerted by another resident that wished to participate that the county has closed the Speak Up Brevard website on December 31st and prior to the policy deadline. Per policy BCC-95, the county is required to accept filings through January 1st.

The early closing of the website may mislead residents of the submission timeline, and preclude their suggestions from being included with the rest of the citizen suggestions. Keeping the website open allows the opportunity for efficiency saving suggestions to be received in the format provided by the Speak Up Brevard policy.

The close date and time is not posted on the website, and even after a resident specifically requested it be added earlier this month to assist and inform residents.

Citizen Recommendation:

Brevard County should leave the Speak Up Brevard submission website open through at least midnight on January 1st, to be in compliance with county policy BCC-95.

- Due to the early website closing this year, Brevard County should immediately open the website and extend the deadline to allow residents additional time to participate.
- The website open and close date and time should be clearly posted on the website for the benefit of Brevard residents that wish to participate.
- Submissions (including this one) that are emailed to the county during the current cycle should be added to the website so that they are available and searchable on the website with the other 2023 submissions.

Staff Analysis:

County Charter stipulates procedures shall include among its provisions, "An annual filing date" for Speak Up Brevard recommendations. County Policy stipulates "The annual filing for submission shall be July 15, 2011, for the initial year and January 1 of each year thereafter." Staff was notified by email on Dec. 31 by county residents Kristin Lortie and Terry Mott, and on Jan. 1 from county resident Sandra Sullivan, that Speak Up Brevard ended early. Upon review, it was determined that since 2017 the software used for Speak Up Brevard has shut the program down at 5 a.m. on Dec. 31. We notified residents who emailed the County Manager's Office that any CEER recommendation submitted through 5 a.m. Jan. 1 would be included, and they have been. Due to the Jan. 1 timeframe mentioned in the Board Policy, staff adjusted the software to continue through Jan. 1, 2024.

The close date and time is not posted on the website, and even after a resident specifically requested it be added earlier this month to assist and inform residents.

- Brevard County should leave the Speak Up Brevard submission website open through at least midnight on January 1st, to be in compliance with county policy BCC-95.
- Due to the early website closing this year, Brevard County should immediately open the website and extend the deadline to allow residents additional time to participate.
- The website open and close date and time should be clearly posted on the website for the benefit of Brevard residents that wish to participate.
- Submissions (including this one) that are emailed to the county during the current cycle should be added to the website so that they are available and searchable on the website with the other 2023 submissions.

I. OBJECTIVE:

To provide a process for Citizens as individuals or as an organized group of individuals to submit formal written recommendations for the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of Brevard County Government.

II. REFERENCE:

A. Brevard County Home Rule Charter Section 2.9.10.

III. DIRECTIVES

- A. The County Manager, within this policy document, shall establish and recommend to the Board of County Commissioners a process and procedures whereby the Board can review and formally vote to accept, accept with revisions, or reject recommendations on the enhancement of the effectiveness and efficiency of County Government.
- B. An annual filing date with a review period shall be established for receipt of submission and final vote of the Board of County Commissioners.
- C. The County Manager will solicit, under this policy and process, recommendations that promote the efficiency and effectiveness of County government as the intent of the Charter amendment was not to address citizen grievances or specific citizen service requests.
- D. Any individual or organized group may submit recommendations intended to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of County Government by submitting to the County Manager an electronic or hardcopy of the "Citizen Efficiency and Effectiveness" form attached to this policy. Upon submittal, the form will be reviewed and acted upon according to the following procedure.
 - The annual filing date for submission shall be July 15, 2011 for the initial year and January I of each year thereafter.

- The form will be available for download and submission on the County Internet Homepage. Hardcopies of the form will be available by request from the County Manager's Office.
- 3. Within forty five (45) days of receipt of the recommendation the County Manager's Office shall evaluate and comment upon the recommendation with a recommendation for the consideration of the Board of County Commissioners. If necessary the County Manager's Office will also forward the recommendation to the County Attorney for a review of the legality of the recommendation.
- The County Manager after completion of the above referenced reviews will forward the recommendation and review package to the Board of County Commissioners for their review.

Citizen Recommendation:

I would like to see a targeted campaign to inspire these entities to work together incorporating a systems approach to resolve the many complex challenges facing Brevard. In some cases there is duplication of efforts where we even have entities competing with each other for the same grants. But if people work together on projects, they are more likely to get larger grant requests approved and also resolve the issues in a more cost-effective manner. As for Brevard's government entities, I would like to see each agency working with the individual HOA Boards when they have any problems within the Board's specific community. And I would also like to see the individual HOA Boards be encouraged to create special ad hoc committees of community volunteers to assist the government entities. I believe using this type of one-voice, one-community focus would be very helpful in the Brevard Natural Resources Management Department's current project to create a stormwater management education program for the Viera East community. Thank you for your consideration.

Staff Analysis:

Natural Resources Management recognizes the value of working together and the importance of working with Homeowners Associations (HOAs) to better manage stormwater ponds. HOAs are responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 4,000 stormwater ponds within the Indian River Lagoon watershed in Brevard County, about ten times as many stormwater ponds as the County.

The Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Program is currently developing a citizen science/outreach program to partner with HOAs to improve stormwater pond management and reduce stormwater inputs to the Indian River Lagoon (IRL). Funding to start this program was added in the 2023 Update to the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan. After program funding was approved, staff began researching other citizen science pond management programs to develop a pilot program for implementation in Brevard. Our program will recruit volunteers from HOAs (that manage at least one stormwater pond) within the IRL watershed of Brevard County. A grant proposal was recently submitted to the IRL Council/Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program to seek additional funding to support a pilot program for this education/outreach campaign.

Additionally, stormwater pollution prevention presentations to adults are conducted as part of the County's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit compliance. The Brevard County Stormwater Program often conducts presentations at the request of HOAs. Many HOA volunteers are already active in County stormwater pollution prevention efforts, placing storm drain markers throughout our community to further education efforts. The Brevard County Stormwater Program is also working with the Viera East Community Development District (VECDD) on an educational grant for stormwater pond best management practices. Part of the project includes targeted educational outreach to HOAs within the VECDD area. The mission of the grant project is to reduce nutrients in stormwater ponds, prevent erosion, and use green stormwater infrastructure to create buffer zones.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept the recommendation with revisions as some programs are already underway and program expansions are currently being developed.

As a resident volunteer on behalf of the Viera East Community Development District (VECDD) Board of Supervisors, for the past few years I've been working with the Brevard County Natural Resources Management Department on a project to create a stormwater education and pond restoration program for the Viera East Community.

While we've made progress in this endeavor, to increase the potential impact of the programand to help Viera East residents improve the resiliency and quality of life within the community--l'm recommending the following:

?That the Brevard County Natural Resource Management Department broaden the scope of this project and become the lead agency in forming a joint Task Force to conduct a 3W's Resiliency Campaign 2024 to improve the quality of life for Viera East residents and to create a model education program for HOA communities within the 3W's areas listed below:

Water: Create a stormwater education and pond maintenance & restoration program.

Wildlife: Create an education program to teach residents how to live in harmony with the wildlife that surrounds the community.

Waste: Create 1) an education program re all aspects of waste (the cost of waste and what the average resident can do to help reduce costs, i.e. recycling); and 2) create a strategy to plan and design a commercial composting facility to be constructed within and maintained by the Viera East community.

The Task Force would include one or more representatives from the following organizations: Brevard County Natural Resources Management Department (lead agency), the Viera East Community Development District, the St. Johns River Water Management District, the Marine Resources Council, the Florida Institute of Technology, UF/IFAS, St. Johns Riverkeepers, Brevard

Zoo, Waste Management, Keep Brevard Beautiful, Recycle Brevard, and the Viera East Community Association Board of Directors.

The essence of the overall 3W's campaign is to inspire and teach the Viera East community leadership at all levels--including each of the individual HOA Boards of Directors--that to maximize the resiliency of the community, especially in reducing its long-term risk of flooding--all residents need to be involved in the process. And in order to inspire public engagement, residents need to be educated in these three areas.

Citizen Recommendation:

As a long-term volunteer for several government and nonprofit entities in Brevard, I know that we have the expertise to create programs (both online in person) in these three areas, and in many cases, the programs have already been created.

For example, I've been through the St. Johns River Water Management Districts stellar online seminar regarding stormwater management that was created for Community Association Managers (CAMs). Recently I asked the District if they would consider slightly modifying the program so that it was targeted to homeowners rather than CAMs. And I received a favorable response from the District.

Another example: I've completed several stormwater & shoreline restoration classes offered by UF/IFAS, and much of the information is currently available online and could easily be incorporated into a comprehensive education program that could be promoted via a campaign for community homeowners.

Yet another example: A few years ago, I was a volunteer for the Brevard Natural Resources Management Department's/Brevard Zoo's Oyster Restoration Program for the Indian River Lagoon. I raised 250 oysters and also participated in helping to create a reef in the Lagoon. I'm also a Florida Master Naturalist, and while I was attending one of the Oyster Restoration Program classes, I noticed that the procedures being used to restore the Indian River Lagoon could also be used to restore the shorelines of the ponds within our HOA communities, as long as we changed the vegetation to accommodate freshwater species. At that time, I asked Dr. Marty Main, Director for the Florida Master Naturalist Program if he would create a program to specifically teach Florida Master Naturalists how to restore the shorelines of freshwater ponds. While it took four years to roll out, the new course (Freshwater Restoration) was announced in October 2023 and will soon be available in Brevard County.

My hope is that we will inspire many Florida Master Naturalists living in Brevard to attend this new program and help assist the community in restoring our ponds and educating residents regarding how they can help maintain them. I believe the majority of residents do not understand that the ponds adjacent to their homes flow unfiltered into our waterways.

In sum: I believe we simply need to create a community campaign to energize the community and also obtain the commitments from the HOA master association (Viera East Community Association) and the individual HOA Boards of Directors to help in the process of bringing the education programs into the Viera East community by actively being involved in the program: such as promoting the program via their individual websites, inviting guest speakers at their meetings, participating and hosting workshops, and other myriad educational activities. As an added note, I would be happy to volunteer to help organize the campaign.

Some background information re the community:

The Viera East Community Development District (VECDD) is an unincorporated, master-planned community that was created in 1991 as a special tax district governed by a five-member board of supervisors.

This VECDD encompasses 2,825 acres east of Interstate 95 from Wickham Road northward into Rockledge, including 31 subdivisions, a residential population of about 12,000, with about 300 businesses, and a champion golf course (Viera East Golf Club).

And the VECDD is responsible for the construction, operation and maintenance of the community's infrastructure, an 85-pond stormwater system, conservation areas, paved trails and sidewalks, Woodside Park, and its golf course.

Staff Analysis

The Board of County Commissioners recognizes the value of working together and the importance of partnerships that result in a more resilient Brevard. Outreach efforts involve overseeing contracted stormwater pollution prevention presentations as part of the County's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit compliance.

The County has implemented programs that address the first W of the 3W's, Water. The Lagoon Loyal program was developed to address the thousands of pounds of excess algae-feeding nutrients that flow to the Indian River Lagoon, polluting both groundwater and stormwater. This program is the cornerstone of the outreach efforts required under the county's NPDES permit. Additionally, the Save Our Indian River Lagoon (SOIRL) Program is currently developing a citizen science/outreach program to partner with Homeowners Associations (HOAs) to improve stormwater pond management and reduce stormwater inputs to the Indian River Lagoon (IRL). Funding to start this program was added in the 2023 Update to the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan. After program funding was approved, staff began researching other citizen science pond management programs to develop a pilot program for implementation in Brevard. Our program will recruit volunteers from HOAs that manage at least one stormwater pond within the IRL watershed of Brevard County. A grant proposal was

recently submitted to the IRL Council/Indian River Lagoon National Estuary Program to seek additional funding to support a pilot program for this education/outreach campaign.

Regarding the second W, Wildlife, the Board does not have jurisdiction relevant to wildlife protection. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission or United States Fish and Wildlife Service would need to spearhead efforts regarding outreach for fauna. Additionally, as noted in the citizen recommendation, the University of Florida Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (UF/IFAS) has a Florida Master Naturalist Program that teaches those who teach others about Florida's unique ecosystems and wildlife. UF/IFAS Brevard Extension continues to work with Natural Resources to assist and educate the citizens of Brevard when appropriate.

The last W, Waste, is partially addressed by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection's Waste Reduction Section. This section is responsible for promoting and monitoring statewide recycling and waste reduction programs as well as the recycling and proper management of household hazardous waste, medications, mercury lamps (fluorescent) and devices (thermostats), batteries, and scrap electronics. Grants and technical assistance are provided to local governments for the implementation of solid waste management programs. As required pursuant to 403.7032 Florida Statutes, and Chapter VIII of Brevard's Comprehensive Plan, Brevard County's Solid Waste Department provides outreach by a Recycling Coordinator and a Recycling Educator who attend community events, civic organization meetings, school functions, and other events as appropriate. The Solid Waste webpage provides a plethora of educational materials including a Recyclopedia, Recycling Kids' Corner, and other links and media.

Although not located in the Viera East community, Florida Recyclers of Brevard (Sarno Road) is a commercial composting facility. At the current Brevard County Solid Waste Management locations, there is neither the space nor the personnel to engage in composting. Lastly, composting results in odors that are not normally compatible adjacent to residential uses unless high-cost management and maintenance equipment is employed.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject the recommendations as they are already implemented, being developed, or are not under the jurisdiction of Brevard County.

Staff Analysis:

The mission of the National Park Service is to "conserve the scenery and the natural and historic objects, and the wildlife therein and to provide for the enjoyment of the same in such manner and by such means as will leave them unimpaired for the enjoyment of future generations."

The potential conversion of the Indian River Lagoon (IRL) to a national park brings both advantages and drawbacks. The prospect of gaining greater public recognition as a national park has the potential to attract more tourists, providing a boost to the local economy. The IRL could benefit from an increase in federal funding for lagoon access facilities and conservation efforts. However, there are notable concerns as well. Access restrictions to the park, including the imposition of entrance fees, may pose challenges for visitors and residents. Use restrictions, including limitations on commercial and recreational fishing could be implemented to protect national interests. The anticipated rise in property value around the park could become another barrier for lower-income communities, potentially leading to issues of accessibility and affordability. Furthermore, local control of management decisions for the IRL will be diminished, leading to legal complexities. The divergence in priorities between federal, state

and local governments may introduce decision-making challenges and delays, impeding restoration efforts and conflicting with local priorities.

Biscayne National Park is the largest marine park in the National Park System and offers a window into possible impacts of the Indian River Lagoon becoming a national park. The park follows two basic sets of rules; (1) rules common to all national parks and (2) rules that apply only in Biscayne National Park. Rules that apply to all national parks include the Historic Sites Act, Endangered Species Act, National Environmental Policy Act, and Clean Water Act. Rules specific to the park include its enabling legislation, which expresses the purpose of the park; the park superintendent compendium, which details items such as closures, speed limits, camping, personal watercraft and unmanned aircraft; and General management plans, which guide park actions in order to achieve the missions of resource preservation and protection.

Effective January 1, 2024, Biscayne National Park increased its docking and camping fees per the table below. Eighty percent of docking fee revenue stays at Biscayne National Park to fund projects related to visitor experiences. Recent examples of fee revenue improvements include improved park signage, updated comfort stations, picnic tables and grills. The remaining twenty percent of collected fees is allocated for visitor experience improvements at non-fee parks throughout the National Park system.

In 2014, a Fisheries Management Plan was adopted with regulatory options, however specific regulations must be approved by Florida's Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. Five years later, Biscayne National Park was sued by the National Parks Conservation Association for failing to implement its plan to create a marine reserve and phase out commercial fishing in the park. The following is a statement by Dr. Melissa Abdo, Sun Coast Regional Director for the National Parks Conservation Association: "Because of the Park Service's failure to act, overfishing has led to the severe decline of many reef fish species and the degradation of Biscayne's marine environment. This damage is leaving Biscayne's coral reef ecosystem less resilient to climate change, coral bleaching, coral disease, and pollution."

The process for designating the Indian River Lagoon as a national park requires an assessment of its natural, cultural, and recreational significance, followed by a study of its suitability and

feasibility. If deemed nationally significant and feasible, legislation is proposed in Congress, and upon approval through an act of Congress, the management is transferred to the National Park Service, marking its designation as a national park.

The Brevard County Board of County Commissioners have been working to promote more uniform, county-wide development practices using Low Impact Development (LID), energy efficiency, and future-ready technology in a variety of ways.

As part of its Comprehensive Plan, which is applied uniformly county-wide to development, in February 2022, Objective 14 - Coastal Development and Redevelopment, was adopted into the Coastal Management Element to address "Peril of Flood." These 13 new policies create procedures to allow consideration of the changing dynamics of flooding, sea level rise, and storm surge in growth management decisions through nature-based design standards and/or Low Impact Development.

The Florida Building Code new energy conservation standards went into effect on January 1, 2024. The conservation measures consist of code changes for both commercial and residential development which include, but are not limited to:

- Increased percentage (now 100%) of higher efficiency permanently installed luminaires and lamps are required for residential development
- Reduced existing home alteration new lighting requirement exception limit
- Enhanced insulation requirements
- Updated efficiency requirements for heat pumps and other equipment for commercial and residential development
- Extensively revised interior lighting requirements for commercial developments
- Updated HVAC standards for commercial development
- Updated standards for testing for building air leakage

Additionally, the Board provided an exception to permitting fees for residential solar photovoltaic projects from 2018 to 2024. This incentive applied to thousands of projects and was intended to promote adoption of more energy efficient technology.

Staff will continue to explore ways to promote further innovative policies.

Staff Analysis:

The Citizen Statement and Recommendation's initial segment "Reduce / eliminate duplicate services from non-profit organizations ..." could be interpreted to mean either services between non-profit organizations or County services which are also provided by non-profits. If the submitter meant the former, then the County has no authority to dictate service provision from non-profit organizations. If it is the latter, the Department is not aware of any local non-profit organizations which offer unnecessary duplicative services.

Departmental services, such as the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), offer similar services (assistance with energy bills) as some local religious organizations, but the Department is not aware of any non-profit organizations providing such assistance. There are some local non-profit organizations that offer small rehabilitation services, such as Aging Matters in Brevard, Inc's Home Improvement Program, which is focused on environmental

modifications to improve accessibility, safety, and security of the home. Some of these same types of improvement efforts (grab bars, wheelchair ramps, etc.) could also be performed under the Department's Repair, Rehabilitation, and Reconstruction Program, but the rules and regulations guiding each program (including eligibility) is different and there is significant demand for these services indicating that there is little wasteful, duplicative service availability.

The remaining portion of the statement and recommendation, "...while developing replicable pathways achieving and assuring earned success by supporting the State of Florida Chamber of Commerce 'Prosperity Initiative'", appears to be referring to the Florida Chamber of Commerce's Florida Prosperity Project (FPP). The Florida Chamber of Commerce's website identifies the FPP as a "Chamber-led approach to cut childhood poverty in half - A key objective of the Florida Equality of Opportunity Initiative and essential for achieving the Florida 2030 Blueprint goals overall"¹. Further, a review of the FPP website shows that the identified promising practices² are led by non-profit organizations and not governmental agencies. Additionally, the Brevard County scorecard³ indicates decreasing overall poverty rates, decreasing rates of children in poverty rates, decreasing crime data, and increasing per capita income. Of the FPP's 10 Root Causes of Poverty¹, several do not appear to be under the purview of the County (for example, Lack of Employment Opportunities appears to be private sector or CareerSource Brevard focused and Lack of Quality in Education & Workforce Development appears to be primarily the domain of the School Board of Brevard County and CareerSource Brevard). The root causes that appear to have a Brevard County Government overlap (housing, transportation, etc.) are already addressed through current programs and services within multiple County Departments as funding allows.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners reject CEER #2024058.

Staff Analysis:

The long-term strategic planning discussed as part of this recommendation is best addressed through the comprehensive plan process. The process is objective, allows for public and stakeholder participation, and carries significant weight in related decision-making. The County's efforts in 2022 in amending the Coastal Management Element of the Comprehensive Plan is an example of such an effort, during which 13 policies were adopted to include language that creates procedures to allow consideration of the changing dynamics of flooding, sea level rise, and storm surge in growth management decisions through nature-based design standards and/or Low Impact Development. This process included review by several of the listed agencies, including the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

Staff would also note that the County is currently in the process of implementing an Area of Critical State Concern in the South Beaches Area. This process, which is overseen by our partners at Florida Commerce, will involve public and stakeholder input (such as the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission), and is expected to have a significant impact on several of the issues raised here, including wastewater infrastructure, additions to educational resources, and growth management.

Staff will continue to advance effective growth management policies consistent with Board direction.

Staff Recommended Action:

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners accept the recommendation with revisions as detailed in the staff analysis.

Brevard is blessed. We have a celebrated environment with beaches, our Lagoon and wetlands; a thriving business community; strong educational institutions; nationally recognized tourism resources; and more-the world's leading Space Port.

Problem Description:

Where many communities boast "quad-modal" transportation infrastructure systems (aviation, rail, road, and sea) to support and drive their growth, Brevard may be the only "penta-modal" community that is adding Space to its other drivers. This unique opportunity is the result both of its choice location for the launching of rockets and the leadership of our County Commission, Economic Development Commission, Space Florida, and others over the past decades.

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The question that we face is this:

• Can we join forces as a community to build synergy as we develop and integrate these changing demands into our infrastructure and at the same time sustain our environment and quality of life? If we cannot, we have seen the type of community disruption that can take place, for example in Boca Chica, Texas. The issue posed then is this: What leadership role should the Brevard County Commission play in understanding and planning this development over the next 20-30 years and beyond? Failure to do this is likely to lead to substantial deterioration in our environment, inefficient development, and citizens' dissatisfaction with their quality of life.

We urge the County Commission to recognize the dramatic changes that are taking place here today and accelerating into the future, and to work with Space Florida to characterize, quantify, and plan for this development.

Recommendation Description

We recommend that the Commission use its unique Brevard leadership role to engage key organizations, beginning with Space Florida, to form a task force made of the entities involved in the planning, permitting, and implementation of future projects in order to characterize and quantify the coming growth.

This "inventory" should lead to a planning process that moves our community forward, while balancing growth and quality of life synergistically, and avoiding conflicting demands and unplanned problems. This effort should be transparent to and involve the public.

Utilizing these agencies and organizations to create and implement a unified plan now, rather than reacting to growth in a piecemeal manner as it occurs, will save the County considerable time and money in the future.



- Thank you and the Staff for recognizing the importance of "long-term, strategic planning" and especially Brevard's Comprehensive Planning Process.
- Chapter 12, Intergovernmental Coordination of the County's Comprehensive Plan appears to call for very much the type of "planning process that moves our community forward, while balancing growth and quality of life..." that we asked for in our Speak Up submission; and which may protect the \$550M we as citizen voters are spending to restore the Lagoon.
- Specifically, Policy 1.14 states:
 - Brevard County shall take steps necessary to coordinate with the Spaceport Florida Authority, the Economic Development Commission of Florida's Space Coast and the Space Coast Development Commission on promotional efforts concerning those areas of the County uniquely suited for the development of space commerce and the National Space Policy.
- Other key provisions include:
 - Policy 2.2: Brevard County shall coordinate with appropriate local governments and Florida Department of Environmental Protection in the maintaining of a Wetland Ordinance for uniform regulation of these valuable resources. Specific guidelines are set forth in the Conservation Element and described in the criteria below.
 - o Policy 2.4: Coordination between the County and Port Canaveral.
 - And other Policies call for coordination on sewer service, potable water, land development impact on traffic. (Policies 1.12, 1.6, and 2.1.B/3.10)
- Based on our discussions with Space Florida, it appears that we currently have a
 great opportunity for these requirements to be initiated cooperatively.
 - Space Florida has already begun an Environmental Master Plan that, as we understand it, will include all (or virtually all) current and future identified space related development projects, however their analysis may be narrowly focused on limited environmental issues and may not consider other aspects such as those called out above.
 - Likewise, Space Florida is completing its Maritime Intermodal Transportation Study aka "Wharf Study"
- We urge the County to move swiftly to initiate a comprehensive planning process with Space Florida that also give visibility to the taxpayer/voters of Brevard.
- The IRL Round Table and Brevard Indian River Lagoon Coalition are eager to participate and assist.






Example From Recent Department Of Environmental Protection Agency's IRL BMAP Update



The Florida Department of Environmental Protection Agency Basin Management Action Plan (BMAP) uses the health of IRL Seagrass to measure whether the targets set for nutrient reduction are working. From 2009-2021, the **Seagrass Mean Deep Edge** decreased and the **Seagrass Areal Cover Over Time** dropped from thousands of acres to essentially 0.

Kennedy Space Center Development Is And Will Continue To Be Substantial – Cumulative Environmental Impacts Are Not Addressed Through The Process Of Permitting Projects One At A Time



Potential Impacts from Development:

Adding significant amounts of freshwater runoff from new development into the impoundments and then ultimately into the IRL in the area where clams are being cultured to restore the IRL could be disastrous.

Seagrass restoration and growth could be deterred by additional freshwater going into the system.

The expected increase in launch rates could cause closures of Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge and Canaveral National Seashore for 100 days or more each year.

An open flow of water once existed between the Banana River and the Indian River through Banana Creek as shown on this 1950's brochure. Oysters, clams, fish and waterfowl abounded. In the early 1960's, Banana Creek was severed by a dirt causeway and the Shuttle Crawlerway. Impoundments for mosquito control were constructed and saltmarshes disappeared as they transitioned into freshwater lakes. Impoundments are now reconnected to the estuaries through culverts. Rejuvenated saltmarshes have returned to their role as critically important nursery areas for juvenile fish, shrimp, crabs, and seagrass. They must be protected.

There is No Clear "Owner" for Overall Spaceport Development or Environmental Issues

KSC Master Plan:

Identifies the most suitable areas of KSC for future development, taking factors including development capacity, the environment, and sea level rise into account.

Cape Canaveral Spaceport Master Plan 2017:

Allowing continuing piecemeal decision making and failure to provide appropriate corrective actions will guarantee a continuing decline and ultimate destruction of the Indian River Lagoon as we know it.

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
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
