#### REQUESTED ACTION:

It is requested that the Board of County Commissioners approve the following actions for the FY2019 Section 5310 Formula Grant for the Enhanced Mobility of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities with the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) in the amount of \$528,710:

- the Chair to sign the Authorizing Resolution, Application for Federal Assistant SF424 and the FDOT Certification and Assurances,
- the use of Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) Toll Revenue Credits,
- the Transit Director to sign the Grant Application Submittal Letter, Transportation Plan Certification, Proposed Budget, Standard Lobbying Certification, Leasing Certification, and Certification of Equivalent Service,
- authorize the Chair to execute the Grant Agreement contingent upon County Attorney and Risk Management approval,
- authorize the Transit Director to execute any additional follow-up documentation/resolutions and amendments necessary to secure these funds,
- authorize the County Manager to execute necessary budget change requests.

#### SUMMARY EXPLANATION and BACKGROUND:

Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) Section 5310, Formula Grant for Enhanced Mobility

of Seniors and Individuals with Disabilities provides formula funding to states to improve mobility for seniors and individuals with disabilities by removing barriers to transportation service and expanding transportation mobility options. This program supports transportation services planned, designed, and carried out to meet the special transportation needs of seniors and individuals with disabilities. The funds are distributed to states based on formulas for rural, small urban and large urban areas.

The grant will be used to purchase five new buses, three buses will be replaced in accordance with our Transit Asset Management Plan and two buses will be used for the expansion of two new paratransit routes, that are scheduled to start in October, 2019.

Florida Department of Transportation has developed an application process, award criteria and a contract management system to administer the program. Under the Section 5310 Program, at least 55% of program funds must be used on capital 5310 projects. The program is open to local governmental entities that operate a public transportation service and is eligible to receive direct grants under 5311 or 5307. Brevard County currently is eligible and receives 5307 grant funding.

Federal Transit Administration is now requiring Space Coast Area Transit (Brevard County) to maintain a Transit Asset Management Plan, so that all of our assets are kept in a state of good repair. As outlined in our Transit Asset Management Plan, we have scheduled target goals for replacement of our transit vehicles based on the Federal useful life of each vehicle type. This grant will allow Space Coast Area Transit to meet our target goals.

The total application amount is \$660,887, 80% (\$528,709.60) will be funded through the 5310 formula grant, 10% (\$66,088.70) is funded through the FDOT Toll Revenue Credits Program and 10% (\$66,088.70) will be funded by the County using monies received from the sales of Transit surplus vehicles.

## STATE OF FLORIDA COMMISSION FOR THE TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

This Memorandum of Agreement is between the COMMISSION FOR THE TRANSPORTATION DISADVANTAGED, hereby referred to as the "Commission," and

BREVARD	_ county(ies), and hereafter referred to as the "Coordinator."

This Agreement is made in consideration of the mutual benefits to both parties; said consideration acknowledged hereto by the parties as good and valuable consideration.

#### The Parties Agree:

- I. The Coordinator Shall:
  - A. Become and remain totally apprised of all of the Transportation Disadvantaged resources available or planned in their designated service area. This knowledge will be used to plan, coordinate, and implement the most cost effective transportation disadvantaged transit system possible under the economic and other conditions that exist in the designated service area.
  - B. Plan and work with Community Transportation Coordinators in adjacent and other areas of the state to coordinate the provision of community trips that might be handled at a lower overall cost to the community by another Coordinator. This includes honoring any Commission-approved statewide certification program that allows for intercounty transportation opportunities.
  - C. Arrange for all services in accordance with Chapter 427, Florida Statutes, and Rule 41-2, FAC, and as further required by the Commission and the local Coordinating Board approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan.
  - D. Return any acquired profits or surplus funds originating through the course of business as the Coordinator that are beyond the amounts(s) specifically identified and approved in the accompanying Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan. Such profits or funds shall be returned to the Coordinator's transportation system or to any subsequent Coordinator, as a total transportation system subsidy, to be applied to the immediate following operational year. The Coordinator will include similar language in all coordination contracts to assure that transportation disadvantaged related revenues are put back into transportation disadvantaged services.

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#### E. Accomplish this Project by:

- Developing a Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan for approval by the local Coordinating Board and the Commission. Coordinators who are newly designated to a particular service area shall submit a local Coordinating Board approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan, within 120 calendar days following the execution of the Coordinator's initial memorandum of agreement with the Commission, for approval by the Commission. All subsequent Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plans shall be submitted and approved with the corresponding memorandum of agreement. The approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan will be implemented and monitored to provide for community-wide transportation services for purchase by non-sponsored transportation disadvantaged persons, contracting social service agencies, and other entities that use local, state, or federal government funds for the purchase of transportation for the transportation disadvantaged.
- 2. Maximizing the use of available public school transportation resources and public fixed route or fixed schedule transit services and assuring that private or public transit, paratransit operators, and school boards have been afforded a fair opportunity to participate to the maximum extent feasible in the planning process and in the development of the provisions of the Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan for the transportation disadvantaged.
- 3. Providing or arranging 24-hour, 7-day per week transportation disadvantaged service as required in the designated service area by any Federal, State or Local Government agency sponsoring such services. The provision of said services shall be furnished in accordance with the prior notification requirements identified in the local Coordinating Board and Commission approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan.
- 4. Complying with all local, state, and federal laws and regulations that apply to the provision of transportation disadvantaged services.
- 5. Submitting to the Commission an Annual Operating Report detailing demographic, operational, and financial data regarding coordination activities in the designated service area. The report shall be prepared on forms provided by the Commission and according to the instructions of said forms.

#### F. Comply with Audit and Record Keeping Requirements by:

Utilizing the Commission recognized Chart of Accounts defined in the Transportation Accounting Consortium Model Uniform Accounting System for Rural and Specialized Transportation Providers (uniform accounting system) for all transportation disadvantaged accounting and reporting purposes. Community Transportation Coordinators with existing and equivalent accounting systems are not required to adopt the Chart of Accounts in lieu of their existing Chart of Accounts but shall prepare all reports, invoices, and fiscal documents relating to the transportation disadvantaged functions and activities using the chart of accounts and accounting definitions as outlined in the above referenced manual.

- Assuming the responsibility of invoicing for any transportation services arranged, unless otherwise stipulated by a purchase of service contract or coordination contract.
- 3. Maintaining and filing with the Commission, local Coordinating Board, and all purchasing agencies/entities such progress, fiscal, inventory, and other reports as those entities may require during the period of this Agreement.
- 4. Providing copies of finance and compliance audits to the Commission and local Coordinating Board as requested by the Commission or local Coordinating Board.
- G. Retain all financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, and any other documents pertinent to this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after termination of this Agreement. If an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the records shall be retained until resolution of the audit findings. The Coordinator shall assure that these records shall be subject to inspection, review, or audit at all reasonable times by persons duly authorized by the Commission or this Agreement. They shall have full access to and the right to examine any of the said records and documents during the retention period.
- H. Comply with Safety Requirements by:
  - 1. Complying with Section 341.061, F.S., and Rule 14-90, FAC, concerning System Safety; or complying with Chapter 234.051, F.S., regarding school bus safety requirements for those services provided through a school board; and
  - 2. Assuring compliance with local, state, and federal laws, and Commission policies relating to drug testing. Conduct drug and alcohol testing for safety sensitive job positions within the coordinated system regarding pre-employment, randomization, post-accident, and reasonable suspicion as required by the Federal Highway Administration and the Federal Transit Administration.
- I. Comply with Commission insurance requirements by maintaining at least minimum liability insurance coverage in the amount of \$200,000 for any one person and \$300,000 per occurrence at all times during the existence of this Agreement for all transportation services purchased or provided for the transportation disadvantaged through the Community Transportation Coordinator. Upon the execution of this Agreement, the Coordinator shall add the Commission as an additional named insured to all insurance policies covering vehicles transporting the transportation disadvantaged. In the event of any cancellation or changes in the limits of liability in the insurance policy, the insurance agent or broker shall notify the Commission. The Coordinator shall insure that contracting transportation operators and coordination contractors also maintain the same minimum liability insurance, or an equal governmental insurance program. Insurance coverage in excess of \$1 million per occurrence must be approved by the Commission and the local Coordinating Board before inclusion in the Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan or in the justification of rates and fare structures. Such coverage may be provided by a self-insurance program established and operating under the laws of the State of Florida and written verification of insurance protection in accordance with Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, shall be provided to the Commission upon request.

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J. Safeguard information by not using or disclosing any information concerning a user of services under this Agreement for any purpose not in conformity with the local, state and federal regulations (45 CFR, Part 205.50), except upon order of a court, written consent of the recipient, or his/her responsible parent or guardian when authorized by law.

#### K. Protect Civil Rights by:

- 1. Complying with state and federal laws including but not limited to laws regarding discrimination on the basis of sex, race, religion, age, disability, sexual orientation, or national origin. The Coordinator gives this assurance in consideration of and for the purpose of obtaining federal grants, loans, contracts (except contracts of insurance or guaranty), property, discounts, or other federal financial assistance to programs or activities receiving or benefiting from federal financial assistance and agreeing to complete a Civil Rights Compliance Questionnaire if so requested by the Commission.
- 2. Agreeing that compliance with this assurance constitutes a condition of continued receipt of or benefit from federal financial assistance, and that it is binding upon the Coordinator, its successors, subcontractors, transferee, and assignees for the period during which such assistance is provided. Assure that all operators, subcontractors, subgrantee, or others with whom the Coordinator arranges to provide services or benefits to participants or employees in connection with any of its programs and activities are not discriminating against those participants or employees in violation of the above statutes, regulations, guidelines, and standards. In the event of failure to comply, the Coordinator agrees that the Commission may, at its discretion, seek a court order requiring compliance with the terms of this assurance or seek other appropriate judicial or administrative relief, to include assistance being terminated and further assistance being denied.
- L. To the extent allowed by Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, and only to the monetary and other limitations contained therein, indemnify and hold harmless the Commission and all of the Commission's members, officers, agents, and employees; purchasing agency/entity officers, agents, and employees; and the local, state, and federal governments from any claim, loss, damage, cost, charge or expense arising out of any act, action, neglect or omission by the Coordinator during the performance of this Agreement, whether direct or indirect, and whether to any person or property to which the Commission or said parties may be subject, except that neither the Coordinator nor any of its sub-contractors will be liable under this section for damages arising out of injury or damage to persons or property directly caused or resulting from the sole negligence of the Commission or any of its members, officers, agents or employees; purchasing agency/entity, officers, agents, and employees; and local, state, or federal governments. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any agency/entity or Coordinator to which sovereign immunity may be applicable. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency/entity or political subdivision of the State of Florida or the federal government to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any Agreement or contract. Notwithstanding the foregoing, pursuant to Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, no agency or subdivision of the state shall be required to indemnify, insure, or assume any liability for the Commission's negligence.

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- M. Comply with standards and performance requirements of the Commission, the local Coordinating Board approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan, and any purchase of service contracting agencies/entities. Failure to meet the requirements or obligations set forth in this MOA, and performance requirements established and monitored by the local Coordinating Board in the approved Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan, shall be due cause for non-payment of reimbursement invoices until such deficiencies have been addressed or corrected to the satisfaction of the Commission.
- N. Comply with subcontracting requirements by executing or negotiating contracts for transportation services with Transportation Operators and Coordination Contractors, and assuring that the conditions of such contracts are maintained. The requirements of Part 1, Paragraph E.5. through M are to be included in all contracts, subcontracts, coordination contracts, and assignments made by the Coordinator for services under this Agreement. Said contracts, subcontracts, coordination contracts, and assignments will be reviewed and approved annually by the Coordinator and local Coordinating Board for conformance with the requirements of this Agreement.
- O. Comply with the following requirements concerning drivers and vehicles:
  - 1. Drivers for paratransit services, including coordination contractors, shall be required to announce and identify themselves by name and company in a manner that is conducive to communications with the specific passenger, upon pickup of each rider, group of riders, or representative, guardian, or associate of the rider, except in situations where the driver regularly transports the rider on a recurring basis. Each driver must have photo identification that is in view of the passenger. Name patches, inscriptions or badges that affix to driver clothing are acceptable. For transit services, the driver photo identification shall be in a conspicuous location in the vehicle.
  - The paratransit driver shall provide the passenger with boarding assistance, if necessary or requested, to the seating portion of the vehicle. The boarding assistance shall include opening the vehicle door, fastening the seat belt or utilization of wheelchair securement devices, storage of mobility assistive devices, and closing the vehicle door. In certain paratransit service categories, the driver may also be required to open and close doors to buildings, except in situations in which assistance in opening/closing building doors would not be safe for passengers remaining on the vehicle. Assisted access must be in a dignified manner. Drivers may not assist wheelchair up or down more than one step, unless it can be performed safely as determined by the passenger, guardian, and driver.
  - 3. All vehicles shall be equipped with two-way communications in good working order and be audible to the driver at all times to the base.
  - 4. All vehicles providing service within the coordinated system, shall have working air conditioners and heaters in each vehicle. Vehicles that do not have a working air conditioner or heater will be scheduled for repair or replacement as soon as possible.

- P. Comply with other requirements as follows:
  - 1. Transport an escort of a passenger and dependent children as locally negotiated and identified in the local Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan.
  - 2. Determine locally in the Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan, the use, responsibility, and cost of child restraint devices.
  - 3. Transport with the passenger at no additional charge, passenger property that can be carried by the passenger and/or driver in one trip and can be safely stowed on the vehicle. Additional requirements may be negotiated for carrying and loading rider property beyond this amount. Passenger property does not include wheelchairs, child seats, stretchers, secured oxygen, personal assistive devices, or intravenous devices.
  - 4. Provide shelter, security, and safety of passengers at vehicle transfer points.
  - 5. Post a local or other toll-free number for complaints or grievances inside each vehicle. The local complaint process shall be outlined as a section in the local Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan including advising the dissatisfied person about the Commission's Ombudsman Program as a step within the process as approved by the local Coordinating Board.
  - 6. Provide out-of-service-area trips, when determined locally and approved by the local Coordinating Board, except in instances where local ordinances prohibit such trips.
  - 7. Keep interior of all vehicles free from dirt, grime, oil, trash, torn upholstery, damaged or broken seats, protruding metal or other objects or materials which could soil items placed in the vehicle or provide discomfort for the passenger.
  - 8. Determine locally by the local Coordinating Board and provide in the local Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan the billing requirements of the Community Transportation Coordinator. All bills shall be paid to subcontractors within 7 calendar days after receipt of said payment by the Coordinator, in accordance with Section 287.0585, Florida Statutes.
  - 9. Maintain or have access to a passenger/trip database on each rider being transported within the system.
  - 10. Provide each rider and escort, child, or personal care attendant adequate seating for paratransit services. No more passengers than the registered passenger seating capacity shall be scheduled or transported in a vehicle at any time. For transit services provided by transit vehicles, adequate seating or standing space will be provided to each rider and escort, child, or personal care attendant, and no more passengers than the registered passenger seating or standing capacity shall be scheduled or transported in a vehicle at any time.
  - 11. First Aid shall be determined locally and provided in the local Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan.

12. Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation shall be determined locally and provided in the local Transportation Disadvantaged Service Plan.

#### II. The Commission Shall:

- A. Recognize the Coordinator as the entity described in Section 427.011(5), Florida Statutes, and Rule 41-2.002(4), F.A.C.
- B. Attempt to insure that all entities with transportation disadvantaged funds will purchase transportation disadvantaged services through the Coordinator's system.

#### III. The Coordinator and the Commission Further Agree:

- A. Nothing in this Agreement shall require the Commission to observe or enforce compliance with any provision thereof, perform any other act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable state law. If any of the provisions of this Agreement is found by a court of law to violate any applicable state law, the purchasing agency/entity will at once notify the Commission in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Commission and the Coordinator to the end that the Coordinator may proceed as soon as possible with the provision of transportation services.
- B. If any part or provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall be binding on the parties hereto.

#### C. Termination Conditions:

- 1. Termination at Will This Agreement may be terminated by either party upon no less than thirty (30) days notice, without cause. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt required, or in person with proof of delivery.
- Termination for Breach Unless the Coordinator's breach is waived by the Commission in writing, the Commission may, by written notice to the Coordinator, terminate this Agreement upon no less than twenty-four (24) hours notice. Said notice shall be delivered by certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery. Waiver by the Commission of breach of any provision of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other breach and shall not act as a waiver or estoppel to enforcement of any provision of this Agreement. The provisions herein do not limit the Commission's right to remedies at law or to damages.
- D. This agreement will expire unless an extension is granted to the Coordinator in writing by the Commission, in accordance with Chapter 287, Florida Statutes.
- E. Renegotiations or Modifications of this Agreement shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing, duly approved by the Commission, and signed by both parties hereto.

Brevard County Board of County Commissioners Transit Services Department, d/b/a as Space Coast Area Transit, provides transportation services for its 589,000 area residents plus visitors. It totaled 2,480,172 passenger trips in FY 2017-2018. The system operates 20 fixed routes with 29 buses Monday-Friday, 19 fixed routes with 23 buses on Saturday, and three fixed routes on Sunday. We also operate 31 demandresponse routes Monday-Friday, eight on Saturday, and three on Sunday. Demand-response includes traditional paratransit, 14 contract routes to adult day training programs, and seniors at lunch. Demandresponse service is provided in house, and the drivers and buses are used in both demand-response and fixed route modes. Our Volunteers in Motion program has eight vehicles in which volunteer drivers provide demand-response trips. Space Coast Area Transit also has a contracted vanpool program with 71 vans leased to commuters and social service agencies.

Space Coast Area Transit's mission is "To provide quality transportation services that meet the needs of the public and enhances the quality of life of the community." Our program goals are safe driving, passenger safety, excellent customer service, and on time performance.

Fixed route ridership grew by double digits every year from 2007-2015; yet the past three years the ridership has declined. It leveled off to a 0.34% drop in FY 2017-2018. Our goal as a system is to regain ridership growth with promotional events, training, and a large ITS purchase that will provide real time bus schedule information and other improvements. At the end of last fiscal year we added a new fixed route in southwest Brevard County. We received approval to add two additional paratransit routes to meet demand for transportation for the visually impaired and other disabled persons, and increasing kidney dialysis.

(c) Who is responsible for insurance, training, management, and administration of the agency's transportation programs? (Maximum 100 words)

Ultimately the Transit Director is responsible for training, management and administration of the agencies transportation programs. Several members of our staff—including the Administrative Assistant, Manager of Operations and Maintenance, and Customer Service Manager also play an integral role in daily operations and management of these programs. Space Coast Area Transit is self-insured through the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners.

(d) How are the operations of the transportation program currently funded? What are the sources of the funding (e.g., state, local, federal, private foundations, fares, other program fees?)? (Maximum 200 words)

Space Coast Area Transit operations are funded through many transportation programs along with local funding. We utilize local funding as match to obtain the maximum funding from our grants. We receive grants from Federal Transit Administration (Section 5307, 5339, and 5310), Florida Department of Transportation (Block Grant, Corridor Grants), and Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged (Trip and Equipment, Planning Grants). Space Coast Area Transit also utilizes revenue from fares and advertising.

(e) How does your agency ensure that passengers are eligible recipients of 5310-funded transportation service? (Maximum 200 words)

Space Coast Area Transit will ensure eligibility of demand-response passengers by first conducting a phone interview with the potential rider followed by them receiving and submitting a formal application for documentation and verification. This process is in compliance with the approval of the Florida Commission for the Transportation Disadvantaged. We also have an ADA Paratransit application process.

Fixed Route Service provides reduced fares to seniors 60+, disabled, veterans, and students. Medicare cards are accepted as proof for reduced fare. A Space Coast Area Transit reduced fare ID is issued upon production of the required documentation.

(f) To what extent does your agency serve minority populations? Is your agency minority-owned? (Maximum 200 words)

Space Coast Area Transit is a local governmental agency that provides a fair and equitable service to all residents and visitors to Brevard Country. Passengers are required to submit applications for demand response service which are determined if eligible in accordance with the requirements and guidelines or the specific funding programs. Fixed route service is open and available to any individual to access the system on our local scheduled bus routes.

Service hours, planned service, routes, and trip types: Twenty Fixed Routes and 31 Demand-Response Routes (Paratransit and Contract), Monday-Friday 4:50am-11:45pm; Nineteen Fixed Routes and six Demand-Response Routes, Saturday 5:10am-11:45pm; three Fixed Routes and three Demand-Response Routes, Sunday 7:10am-6:15pm. Received approval from Board of County Commissioners to start two new Demand-Response Paratransit routes to meet increased demand from visually impaired and other disabled people and kidney dialysis in FY19-20 (after October 1, 2019).

Staffing-include plan for training on vehicle equipment such as wheelchair lifts, etc. We have two vehicle operator trainers under supervision of the Safety and Training Coordinator. New drivers go through 5 weeks of state certified training including bus maneuvering, route learning, ADA, wheelchair securement, drug & alcohol policy, defensive driving, our distracted driving policy, customer service, de-escalating conflicts, emergency procedures, as well as county and department policies. We have refresher training and recertification of defensive driving, customer service, and CPR at regular intervals. We have required Quarterly Employee Meetings, focusing on important safety and training topics.

Records Maintenance- who, what methods, use of databases, spreadsheets, etc. Maintenance records defect slips and work orders are kept electronically by the vehicle maintenance contractor. Pre-trip inspection forms are maintained in a paper file, training spreadsheets, DOT medical certificates, and driver's license records are kept on file by staff. Accident and Incident reports and records are maintained by the Safety and Training Coordinator. Driver files, including discipline, are maintained by the secretaries. The records retention schedule is followed in accordance with agreements or FL Statute Chapter 119.


Vehicle Maintenance- who, what, when, and where. Vehicle maintenance is done by our Maintenance Contractor, First Vehicle Services. They have well trained techs and support staff. They adhere to the maintenance plan in our contract, with all scheduled maintenance and inspections in our Cocoa and Melbourne shops. (We have done major shop renovations at both of our bases in the past two years, including new bus lifts). We outsource major engine, transmission, warranty repairs, and unusual diagnostic repairs to dealerships. We have the fully allowed ratio of spare buses to maintain service.

System safety plan. Space Coast Area Transit's SSPP is on file at the FDOT office.

**Drug-free workplace.** We have a Drug Free workplace. We revised our Drug and Alcohol Policy in response to a State Triennial Review, with Diana Byrne's input. We passed an FTA Drug and Alcohol Audit Feb. 14-16, 2018. We have a zero tolerance drug and alcohol testing policy.

5310 Grant funding will allow us to meet our mission, "To provide quality transportation services that meet the needs of the public and enhances the quality of life of the community."

The 5 buses will aid in reducing rising maintenance costs of older buses that have met their useful life. (We currently have no 5310 vehicles.) We have nine 2013 Champion International Defender buses with Maxx Force engines that Navistar advises have a lifespan of 10,000 hours. Seven of those nine buses have 10,000 hours. All of them have comparatively low miles, but we have replaced engines in five buses so far. FDOT has removed International buses from the TRIP's contracts. We are interested in purchasing two Freightliners as replacements.

We also have 2011 and 2012 Chevrolet Glaval Titan II's, some with over 200,000 miles. The Duramax diesel engines have been very reliable, but we have replaced transmissions in 2/3 of our Glaval fleet. We want to purchase three Ford E-450's; one will be utilized as a replacement and two for expansion for the two new paratransit routes.



This grant will be used to purchase five new buses for our aging fleet. Three buses will initiate the replacement projections of our Transit Asset Management Plan. The two expansion buses are for our new paratransit routes which are scheduled to start in October, 2019. The visually impaired community in Brevard County has been advocating for additional bus service. We also have increasing demand for kidney dialysis transportation, and contract routes to BAC and Bridges, especially from Promise in Brevard.

These new buses will aid us in keeping our fleet up to date and greatly reduce maintenance costs, particularly of our International buses. We will be commencing the switch from diesel to gasoline powered smaller cutaway buses with purchase of Ford E-450's. Our projections are this will save us money and maintenance of the elaborate diesel emissions packages on the current diesel vehicles.

Newer buses will reduce buses being out of service and improve reliability. Without these funds our bus replacements would be delayed. We would undoubtedly incur higher maintenance costs for replacing additional engines and transmissions.







- Amend fare policy and roll out day passes on fixed routes
- Start pilot for mobile fare collection
- Continue new safety initiatives and risk management review of incidents
- Begin construction of expanded employee parking on SR520 to allow for construction of new Cocoa Transit Center with expanded bus pull off and passenger waiting area on Varr Ave in Cocoa

#### Trends and Issues:

We are seeing an increase in paratransit demand as the new Promise in Brevard facility is attracting residents and their families from distant parts of the U.S. The increased ridership travels to Brevard Achievement Center and Bridges, cross county from West Melbourne to Rockledge. We have already added one contract route and changed routing for several others to accommodate the ridership increase. We successfully secured grant funding for our new Heritage High-West Melbourne fixed route, which will also serve the Promise in Brevard residential facility, bakery and café at Field of Dreams, and thrift store on Wickham Rd.

Ridership on fixed routes overall has dropped, current FY2017-2018 ridership is down 1.6% from last year. The decrease in ridership is attributed to a strong economy, continuing comparatively low gas prices, and a decrease in Eastern Florida State College ridership. Most other Florida transit systems continued to report declines in fixed route ridership in 2017. Total boardings per hour of 21.36 are still higher than found in West Palm Beach and St. Petersburg. Holiday service is now provided on Martin Luther King Day, Memorial Day, Labor Day and Veterans Day, leaving only 4 days per year without service. All fixed routes now operate on Saturdays.

Work on bus stops continues, shelters were added to stops in Titusville and at some other locations. FDOT has built accessible stops along long stretches of A1A and US #1 from Cocoa to Titusville. Space Coast Area Transit is currently working with the Space Coast TPO on a Bus Stop Assessment cataloging accessibility and amenities at each of the over 1,000 bus stops in the County.

Over 60% of visitors to the website now access the site through mobile devices. The website has been updated to be more tailored to mobile devices and focuses on providing user specific routing information. We are continuing to rebrand the new website address, 321Transit.com, especially on our vehicles, to emphasize the mobile feel and to eliminate the acronym SCAT.

While Space Coast Area Transit is able to leverage one dollar in local funding into \$10.66 in federal and state funds, having to rely on such a high amount of outside funding leaves the system vulnerable to funding changes beyond the county's control. In FY 2015, the latest data available, Space Coast Area Transit local funding was 18 out of 31 total transit systems in Florida.

# TRANSIT SERVICES DEPARTMENT SUMMARY

Now that the property at 1125 West King Street in Cocoa has reverted back to the county, Space Coast Area Transit will begin the process to demolish the existing buildings, one of which is uninhabitable, to utilize parking for employees. When this is accomplished, up to one half of existing parking of the terminal in Cocoa will be redesigned and reconstructed into a transfer center, Varr Ave., bus pull out, and passenger waiting area for four fixed routes in Cocoa. Once finished, the Cocoa Transit Center will be the first transfer point operated on county owned property.






