### Subject:

Permission to Participate in and Accept the 2019 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grants

### Fiscal Impact:

Federal and State grant awards to fund law enforcement in the amount of \$55,079 and \$149,196, respectively. Cost of advertising is responsibility of Sheriff's Department

### Dept/Office:

Brevard County Sheriff's Office

### Requested Action:

It is requested that the Board of County Commissioners grant permission to participate in and accept the 2019 direct and county-wide Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant applications; designate the Brevard County Sheriff's office as the Point of Contact and authorize the Chairman to execute the necessary documents and Budget Adjustments.

### Summary Explanation and Background:

The U.S. Department of Justice has notified the Sheriff's Office of the availability of the 2019 Edward Byrne Memorial JAG - Local Solicitation. Brevard County is eligible to receive a direct allocation of \$55,079 available for FY 2020. Units of local government applying for this grant must use the funding for law enforcement purposes.

The funding is used to enhance Criminal Investigations by funding a Deputy Agent position that focuses on Fraud and Identity Theft. The Sheriff's Office is proposing to continue using the funding for this position and associated operational expenses. The financial and investigative impact of fraud and identity theft is impacting state and local law enforcement and the reality is that these crimes are rapidly becoming one of the most prevalent crimes in Brevard County. The Agency believes this position and the operational expenses

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement recently notified Brevard County of its intent to open the 2019 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant program. Brevard County is slated to receive \$149,196 in FY 2020. Units of local government applying for this grant must use funding for law enforcement programs.

For the last 17 years, the Prisoner Transportation program has provided coordinated transportation of arrestees to the county jail from the field by Brevard's Law Enforcement agencies. The program allows law enforcement agencies who find it difficult to transport arrestees to the County Jail Complex the ability to have arrestees picked up by the Sheriff's Office. This results in law enforcement officers being able to return

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to patrol functions more quickly and creates a safer community. Over the last 3 years, this program has transported over 17,000 arrestees and saved over 19,000 law enforcement patrol hours.

As a condition of the grant, the County and the Cities must come to a consensus on how the funds are to be used and provide a letter of support for that use. The Sheriff's Office has coordinated the support of the cities to use the funds for the Prisoner Transportation program and has received the necessary letters of support.

On October 22<sup>nd</sup>, the Board of County Commissioners granted permission to advertise a Public Hearing to consider the two grant applications. The Public Hearing was advertised on November 14<sup>th</sup> and the associated cost was funded by the Sheriff's Office.

## Program Narrative

The Brevard County Sheriff's Office is proposing to continue a position created in 2010 to investigate Fraud and Identity Theft.

The Sheriff's Office will track all grant draw downs and grant expenditures separately from all other funding sources, including Federal, by creating a separate fund for the receipt of the funds and for the personnel costs and expenses. The creation of the separate fund will ensure that the grant funds are not co-mingled with any other funds or expenses received or incurred by the agency.

The financial and investigative impact of fraud and identity theft is being felt by state and local law enforcement. The reality of this concerning issue is that these crimes have become one of the most prevalent crimes in Brevard County. For the past 3 years (2016, 2017 and 2018) the Federal Trade Commission has ranked Florida as one of the top states in the nation in complaints with Identity Theft as well as other fraud.

Residents and visitors of Brevard County are prime targets of identity thieves due to the numerous tourist attractions, military installations and senior population. Today's economic crime suspects are utilizing technology, opportunity and jurisdictional boundaries to their advantage. Criminals have "no Boundaries" and to effectively combat their illegal activities, law enforcement must work from a coordinated and centralized approach that allows for the sharing of resources and communication to effectively identify fraudulent schemes that target multiple victims reaching across many jurisdictional boundaries.

There are two factors in Brevard County that breeds fraudulent activity. The first is the fact that millions of tourists in the State of Florida rely on credit card use to facilitate their visits, activities, and expenditures while patronizing the many attractions that our county offers. This fact alone makes Brevard County a target rich environment for the many aspects of fraud related crimes. The tourist arena makes the instruments needed for credit card and other forms of fraud related crimes easily assessable to the criminal element.

The second perspective that must be considered is that the tourist attractions not only make credit card information assessable to the criminal element, but also draws the criminal element to our county. Tourism also provides a fertile ground to the many types of counterfeiters. The passing and usage of counterfeit instruments such as checks, currency and credit cards has been on the increase both due to the economy and the ease of production with the technological advance in laser jet printers available to regular consumers. In addition, contractor fraud has remained prevalent on the Space Coast of Florida, particularly in reference to the many contractors that show up to victimize the citizens of Brevard County following natural disasters. This goes beyond the norm of the fraud perpetrated on the senior citizen community by fraudulent contractors.

The investigation of Consumer Fraud and Identity Theft cases in Brevard County include Credit Card Fraud, Forgery and Uttering of Monetary Instruments, Theft of Identity and other schemes to defraud.

In order to track and collect the data to report on the progress of the grant, all consumer fraud and identity theft cases will maintained and tracked independently from all other BCSO investigative casework.

The agent will work closely with local and state law enforcement jurisdictions, the State Attorney's Office and the Office of Statewide Prosecution to present evidence of impact of fraud and identity theft, investigating, assembling, and presenting evidence on consumer fraud, identity theft or credit card skimming styled cases for prosecution. In addition, the agent will work toward building stronger public/private partner relationships and establish a strong multi-jurisdictional partnership to effectively and efficiently address this problem by sharing information, resources and remove jurisdictional boundaries.

## Abstract

Consumer fraud and identity theft have become one of the most prevalent crimes in Brevard County. During calendar year 2017, the state of Florida was ranked No.1 in these crimes. Residents and visitors of Brevard County are prime targets of identity thieves due to the numerous tourist attractions, military installations and senior population. In addition, contractor fraud has remained prevalent on the Space Coast of Florida, particularly in reference to the many contractors that show up to victimize the citizens of Brevard County following natural disasters. This goes beyond the norm of the fraud perpetrated on the senior citizen community by fraudulent contractors.

Our strategy involves going beyond traditional management approaches by availing all of our resources to our criminal justice partners and the community with the enhancement of our Economic Crimes Task Force, a comprehensive multi-jurisdictional and multi-discipline approach to combating fraud and identity theft. As part of this effort, a dedicated computer forensic examiner will be available to assist in cases where suspects are utilizing technology, opportunity and jurisdictional boundaries to their advantage.

Specifically this position will:

- Provide a coordinated approach that allows for the sharing of resources and communication to effectively identify fraudulent schemes that target multiple victims reaching across many jurisdictional boundaries.
- Enhance the ability to investigate complex cases through the examination of computer and other electronic media by a trained forensic specialist who is able to examine, uncover and extract data that identifies victims and evidence of these intricate schemes.
- Enhance our investigative efforts by improving and enhancing the investigator's technological capability, improved Digital Forensics support with enhanced technology and specialized training of criminal justice staff and partners on the latest trends and techniques associated with the investigation and prosecution of consumer fraud and identity theft.

## Problem Identification

Brevard County does not have sufficient funds budgeted to fund this program and is in need of grant funds. The Brevard County Sheriffs Office is the primary law enforcement service provider for over 207,000 citizens who live in the unincorporated areas of Brevard County. However, the Brevard County Jail services the entire county population of over 552,000 citizens and the 3 million tourists that visit Brevard each year. The Brevard County Jail has an average daily population of over 1,400 inmates and process over 20,000 arrested persons annually. Brevard County is a linear County 26 miles wide and 72 miles long. Transporting arrested persons from the field to one location in the north end of the county (the jail's location) is logistically difficult and extremely time consuming. When deputies/officers arrest a person in the central and south ends of the county, they have to transport prisoners as much as 60 miles one way to the county jail. In doing so, they often leave an assigned patrol zone that is usually left vacant until the deputy/officer returns. This creates officer safety problems for existing patrol units with little or no backup. In many cases, deputies/officers would be out of service for up to 4 hours transporting and booking prisoners, one at a time or collectively, into the county jail. The uncoordinated prisoner transport process also creates an impediment to the timely booking process for corrections officers at the county jail. Many of the municipal police departments hold arrestees until shift change and transport all arrestees at once to the county jail. This creates a surge of inmates during times when disruptive schedule changes occur in the jail personnel. Additionally, Correctional Officers must complete and correct booking packages taking additional time to process the arrestee. As a result, prisoner booking at the county jail has been a very time consuming and inefficient process. Moreover, prior to the implementation of this program, 30% of the booking packages completed by the local police departments were incomplete or incorrectly submitted. An acceptable error rate is between 5 to 10%, and with this program in place, the error rate can be maintained at a rate below 10%, as it is currently 0%!

## Project Summary (Scope of Work)

The project submitted by the Brevard County Sheriffs Office is the continuation of the Prisoner Transportation/Booking System Improvement Program. The program is currently in the fourteenth year of successful implementation. The current program provides for the coordinated prisoner transportation to the county jail for the Sheriffs Office and all the municipalities in Brevard County. The Grant will be funding salaries and benefits for the three (3) Correction Deputies. Time sheets and Pay Stubs for each employee assigned to the program will be provided as backup to document these of the grant funds. Without the continuation of these funds, this program will

not be able to continue due to the limited funding provided by the Brevard County Board of County Commissioners for Sheriff's Operations.

As the Sheriff's Office continues to provide the countywide transportation of people arrested throughout the county to the jail facility, we will continue to coordinate adequate staffing to process the incoming arrestees, as well as controlled queuing of those processed, and enhanced efficiency of the booking process. Arrest paperwork will continue to be examined when the prisoner is picked up by the Transportation Deputy, ensuring booking officers will have standardized, completed paperwork expediting the booking process. Subsequently, all municipalities in Brevard County will continue to benefit from this program. During the past year, the program transported 6,100 prisoners and saved over 6,000 law enforcement patrol hours. In addition, errors in the booking packages submitted to the Booking Unit for the previous year were below the 10% threshold, they were 0%. Thus, the benefits to the patrol resources of the over one thousand police officers and deputy sheriffs in Brevard County are positive and far reaching. These include: increased officer safety, increased citizen safety, increased patrol coverage and a significant increase in the overall efficiency of the law enforcement patrol deployment in Brevard County.

Grant funds will be used to pay partial salaries and benefits for three (3) federally grant-funded positions for the Brevard County Sheriff's Office. These three (3) positions will be available to support the Prisoner Transportation/Booking System Improvement Program by coordinating prisoner transport.

The minimum performance for this position, including minimum timeframes for prisoner transport, as well as the availability for this position will be in accordance with the local employment agreement and/or position description. This position will be overseen and managed by the Brevard County Sheriff's Office. Documentation to support costs and activities will consist of timesheets, payroll records, paystubs, and/or agency records systems. All documentation to support use and expenditure of grant funds, including the establishment/sustainment of a net personnel increase, will be available for review during grant monitoring.

The deliverable for this agreement is the quarterly performance of the tasks and activities described in the scope of work, 8 hours a day for a 40 hour work week in accordance with local agency employment agreement and/or position description. Brevard County will request reimbursement of allowable costs identified in Section 4, pages 1-2 on a quarterly basis.

This project is on going as long as the grant funding is available and it is in the 15th year. The grant has eliminated thousands of hours of police transport of arrestees to the Brevard County Jail.

The positions funded by are employed on a continual basis.

Grant funds will also be used for the purchase of a prisoner transport cage. Transporting a prisoner can be a potentially dangerous assignment for corrections officers and adherence to proper safety protocols are obviously critical. While a majority of prisoner transports are accomplished without incident there is always the possibility of an arrestee escaping and causing harm to themselves or others including the officer. The inmate transport unit provides safety features to protect the arrestee in case of an accident and it provides protection for the officers. Documentation of deliverables must be maintained by the subrecipient and/or implementing agency and made available for monitoring. Example documentation for the purchase of items and services include, but are not limited to procurement records (including quotes, competitive solicitation/bids, etc.), purchase orders, packing slips, delivery/receivable documents, invoices and proof of payment, etc.

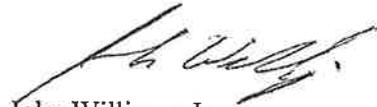
